DAY 1: CREATED IN HIS IMAGE

READING: GENESIS 1:26-28

Before governments, institutions, or even the church, God established the family. When He said, "Let us make man in our image," He was creating something profoundly relational. You bear the image of the triune God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—in unity and love. Your home isn't merely a shelter; it's the first classroom of discipleship where God's character is discovered and displayed. Consider today: What does your home reveal about God's nature? Are forgiveness, grace, patience, and love being learned within yourself? The world is watching you to encounter God's character. Let your home be a mirror reflecting His image to everyone who enters.

Reflection: What one characteristic of God do you want your home to be known for this week?

DAY 2: PASSING DOWN TRUTH INTENTIONALLY

READING: DEUTERONOMY 6:4-9

Moses wasn't being dramatic when he commanded Israel to teach God's truth "diligently" to their children—he was being urgent. The Hebrew word suggests impressing truth like a seal on wax, leaving a permanent mark. Your home, whether full or just you, is a place where you can set the daily rhythms of faith. When you pray before leaving for work, discuss God at dinner, and make Scripture the most natural conversation topic, you're sealing eternal truth on young hearts. Don't wait for the next generation to "figure it out someday." Be intentional now. Hide God's Word in your heart so it overflows naturally in your life, shaping the next generation's faith foundation.

Reflection: What daily rhythm can you establish to make God's Word a natural part of your family conversations?

DAY 3: YOUR HOME AS MISSION BASECAMP

READING: JOSHUA 24:14-15

Joshua's declaration—"As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord"—wasn't a suggestion but a covenant commitment. Your home isn't the finish line of faith; it's the launch pad for mission. God commanded us to "be fruitful and multiply," which meant more than reproduction—it meant representation of His character throughout the world. Healthy homes build healthy communities. When your home is centred on Jesus, you naturally shine His love outward. This week, ask: Is our home fueling us for God's mission, or are we merely maintaining comfortable routines? God uses families on mission to bless nations. Your home can be a light to neighbours, coworkers, and friends who desperately need to see Jesus lived out authentically.

Reflection: Who is one person or family your household can intentionally bless this week?

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DAY 4: ESTABLISHING YOUR FAMILY VALUES

READING: 1 PETER 3:15-16

If you don't establish values for your home, the world will create them for you. Peter reminds us to always be prepared to explain the hope we have. Your family values become the filter through which you understand God's character and navigate every situation. They cut through cultural noise and reveal how God has intentionally positioned you to live. Consider what your life will be known for—not aspirationally, but practically. Will you be known for faith, hope, and love? For hospitality and generosity? For truth spoken in grace? Write your values down. Speak them aloud. Let them guide your decisions, shape your conversations, and define your legacy. Values transform a house into a home marked by God's presence and purpose.

Reflection: What three core values does God want to establish as the foundation of your home?

DAY 5: REDEEMED THROUGH IMPERFECTION

READING: GENESIS 50:15-21

Joseph's words to his brothers reveal a profound truth: "You meant evil against me, but God meant it for good." Your family doesn't need to be perfect to be used by God—it needs to be surrendered. From Abraham's dysfunction to David's household chaos, God has always written His perfect story through imperfect families. The enemy has attacked families throughout history because he cannot enter the set-apart family God designed. But God redeems what the enemy meant for destruction. Whether you're navigating divorce, single parenthood, blended families, or estrangement, grace remains God's foundation. The question isn't "Is my family perfect?" but "Is God present in it?" When He is, His presence changes everything. Your broken pieces become His masterpiece.

Reflection: What area of family brokenness do you need to surrender to God's redemptive power today?
