

#### The Storehouse: God's Design for Generosity

Malachi 3:6–12, Nehemiah 10:37–39, Acts 4:32–35, 1 Corinthians 16:1–2

# DAY 1: FROM OWNERSHIP TO STEWARDSHIP READING: MALACHI 3:6-12

The prophet Malachi confronts us with a challenging question: "How have we robbed God?" The answer cuts to the heart of our relationship with resources—through withholding tithes and offerings from the storehouse.

When we hold back from the storehouse, we're not punishing the church or protecting ourselves. We're robbing our own hearts of the expansion God wants to bring. The Israelites were consumed with their paneled houses while God's house lay in ruins. What modern "paneled houses" consume our attention while the work of God's kingdom waits?

God's promise is stunning: windows of heaven opened, blessings poured out "until there is no more need." This isn't prosperity gospel—it's the principle that when we prioritize God's kingdom, our hearts follow our treasure, and we become people who experience His provision in profound ways.

# DAY 2: THE TEMPLE MADE OF PEOPLE READING: EPHESIANS 2:19-22

Jesus tells a story about a man who thought he could find peace and security in his wealth. Paul reveals something revolutionary: you are the temple of God. The Old Testament temple was magnificent—gold, silver, precious stones, the dwelling place of God's presence. But it was fixed in one location.

In the New Covenant, God chose a mobile temple: His people. You are not just attending church; you ARE the church. The same presence that filled Solomon's temple now dwells in you by the Holy Spirit. The storehouse is no longer a building in Jerusalem—it's the gathered body of believers, built on the foundation of Christ.

This transforms everything about generosity. When you give to the local church, you're not funding an institution or paying religious dues. You're fueling the primary agency through which God has chosen to bring His redemptive work into the world. Just as Jesus was physically present on earth during His ministry, the church—His body—is His presence now.

## DAY 3: THE FRAGRANT OFFERING READING: PHILIPPIANS 4:10-19

Paul writes to the Philippians about their financial support, but notice what he's really celebrating: "I seek the fruit that increases to your credit." The gift matters less than what giving does IN the giver.

He calls their generosity "a fragrant offering, an acceptable sacrifice, pleasing to God." Imagine that—your giving creates an aroma that rises into God's presence.

Where your money goes, your heart follows. Jesus made this clear. You cannot serve both God and money. One will be master, one will be servant. Generous giving through the storehouse is how we declare: "God, You are my master, and money is simply a tool for Your kingdom."

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# DAY 4: FIRST FRUITS AND THE PRIORITY PRINCIPLE READING: 1 CORINTHIANS 16:1-2 AND NEHEMIAH 10:37-39

Paul's instruction is simple but profound: "On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up." Not when it's convenient. Not if there's anything left over. First day. First priority.

The Israelites understood this as bringing the "first of our dough" to the storehouse. First fruits. The principle declares: "God, You get the first and best, not the leftovers." This isn't about legalism—it's about lordship. What we prioritize reveals what we worship.

Many of us operate on a different system: earn, spend, save, then give if there's anything remaining. God's system reverses this: earn, give, then live on the rest. It requires faith to believe that 90% with God's blessing goes further than 100% without it.

## DAY 5: THE STOREHOUSE IN ACTION READING: ACTS 4:32-35

Your giving helps provide income for pastors and staff who lead this work. Your generosity closes the gap between what God has assigned and the church's ability to accomplish it. When you hear stories of restoration, when you see people baptized, when you witness lives changed—you've had a part in that story through the storehouse.

This isn't about guilt or obligation. It's about the joy of partnership in the gospel. It's about the privilege of participating in what God is doing in your generation.
