A 5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide

Day 1: Empowered Witnesses

Reading: Acts 1:1-11

Devotional: As we begin our journey through Acts, we see Jesus giving His final instructions to the disciples before ascending to heaven. He promises them the Holy Spirit and commands them to be His witnesses "unto the uttermost part of the earth" (v.8). This passage reminds us that our mission as believers is to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with everyone we meet. Just as the disciples were empowered by the Holy Spirit, we too have been given the same Spirit to guide and strengthen us in our witness.

Reflect on how you can be a more effective witness for Christ in your daily life. Are there areas where you need to rely more on the Holy Spirit's power? Pray for opportunities to share your faith and for boldness to seize those moments.

Day 2: The Power of Pentecost

Reading: Acts 2:1-21

Devotional: The dramatic events of Pentecost mark the fulfillment of Jesus' promise to send the Holy Spirit. The disciples began to speak in other languages (that they did not know), demonstrating that God was doing something supernatural and pointing the hearers to the message coming from Peter. The Bible says that the Jews require a sign, and this was a sign to the unbelieving Jews so that they would hear God's message.

Consider how the Holy Spirit is working in your life today. Are you open to His leading and empowerment? Ask God to lead you by His Spirit and use you as a vessel to reach others with the gospel. Pray for the courage to step out of your comfort zone and share God's love with someone from a different background or culture.

Day 3: Healing in Jesus' Name

Reading: Acts 3:1-16

Devotional: The healing of the lame man at the Beautiful Gate demonstrates the power of Christ and the faith of the apostles. Peter and John didn't rely on their own abilities but on the authority of Christ. This miracle opened the door for Peter to preach the gospel and point people to Jesus as the source of true healing and salvation.

Reflect on areas in your life where you need healing - physically, emotionally, or spiritually. Bring these needs before God in faith, trusting in the power of Jesus' name. Also, consider how God might use your testimony of His work in your life to draw others to Him. Pray for opportunities to share your story and for eyes to see the needs of those around you.

Day 4: Boldness in the Face of Opposition

Reading: Acts 4:1-22

Devotional: As the apostles faced opposition from religious leaders, they remained steadfast in their commitment to preaching the gospel. Their bold declaration, "For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard" (v.20), challenges us to examine our own commitment to sharing the truth about Jesus, even when it's difficult or unpopular.

Ask yourself: What fears or hesitations hold me back from speaking boldly about my faith? Pray for the courage to stand firm in your convictions and for wisdom to know how to respond to those who oppose the gospel. Remember that the same Holy Spirit who empowered the apostles is also at work in you.

Day 5: United in Purpose and Prayer

Reading: Acts 4:23-37

Devotional: After facing threats, the early believers gathered to pray for boldness and for God's power to be displayed. Their unity in purpose and their reliance on God's strength resulted in continued growth in the church. The generosity and sacrificial giving of believers like Barnabas demonstrate the transformative power of the gospel in their lives.

Consider how you can contribute to the unity and mission of your local church. Are there ways you can be more generous with your time, talents, or resources? Pray for a spirit of unity among believers in your community and for God's power to be evident in your church's ministry. Ask God to show you how you can be part of His work in building His kingdom.
