1. Mary – The Willing Servant (Luke 1:26–38)

- ✓ A humble virgin from Nazareth, chosen by God.
- ✓ “Highly favoured” (vs 28) – of all the possible choices...
- ✓ Her response: “Behold the handmaid of the Lord...” (vs 38).

2. Joseph – The Obedient Protector (Matthew 1:18–25)

- ✓ A “just man” (vs 19) – righteous and merciful.
- ✓ Faced a crisis with grace.
- ✓ Obeyed God without hesitation (vs 24).

3. The Shepherds – Joyful Witnesses (Luke 2:8–20)

- ✓ Socially despised yet chosen for the first public announcement.
- ✓ Good news preached: “Good tidings of great joy” (vs 10).
- ✓ Their response: They hurried, saw, believed, proclaimed, and worshipped.
