Practical Applications:

- 1. This week, look for an opportunity to share your faith with someone, remembering that God can use ordinary people like us.
- 2. Evaluate your life for any "idols" or worldly influences that might be hindering your relationship with God. Consider what steps you need to take to remove them.
- 3. Spend time in prayer for persecuted Christians around the world who face opposition like Paul did in Ephesus.
- 4. Choose a person in your life who may not fully understand the Gospel. Pray for an opportunity to have a meaningful conversation with them about Jesus.

In what ways does the account of the seven sons of Sceva illustrate the dangers of using Jesus' name without a genuine relationship with Him?

How does the riot in Ephesus reveal the economic and social impact of the Gospel, and what implications might this have for our own society?

What can we learn from Paul's method of 'disputing daily' in the lecture hall of Tyrannus about effective discipleship and teaching?

How does the transition from synagogue to house meetings in Ephesus inform our understanding of church planting and growth strategies?

In what ways does the description of Diana worship and its parallels to later religious practices challenge us to critically examine our own faith traditions and practices?

Here's a 5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide

Day 1: The Power of the Gospel

Reading: Acts 18:1-11

Devotional: Paul's ministry in Corinth reminds us of the transformative power of the Gospel. Despite facing opposition, Paul persevered in preaching Christ crucified. God encouraged him, saying, "Be not afraid, but speak, and hold not thy peace. For I am with thee" (Acts 18:9-10). This promise extends to us today. Day 2: Common People, Extraordinary Impact

Day 3: The Holy Spirit's Work in Salvation

Reading: Acts 19:1-7

Devotional: Paul's encounter with the disciples in Ephesus highlights the essential role of the Holy Spirit in salvation. True faith in Christ is always accompanied by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. This passage reminds us to examine our own faith - do we merely know about Jesus, or have we truly experienced the transforming power of His Spirit? Pray for a deeper awareness of the Holy Spirit's presence in your life and for His guidance in all you do.

Day 4: Confronting False Teachings

Reading: Acts 19:8-20

Devotional: Paul's ministry in Ephesus led to a powerful confrontation between the Gospel and false spiritual practices. Many believers publicly renounced their past involvement with sorcery, burning their expensive magic books. This radical act demonstrates the complete life change that comes with true faith in Christ. Are there areas in your life that are incompatible with your faith? Ask God to reveal any compromises and give you the strength to fully commit to His ways.

Day 5: Standing Firm Amidst Opposition

Reading: Acts 19:23-41

Devotional: The riot in Ephesus illustrates the opposition that often arises when the Gospel challenges established cultural and economic systems. Despite the uproar, Paul and his companions remained steadfast in their mission. In our own lives, we may face ridicule, rejection, or even hostility for our faith. Remember that God is sovereign even in times of chaos and confusion. Pray for strength to stand firm in your convictions and for wisdom to navigate conflicts with grace and truth.
