Main Idea: God has sent his son to dispel our darkness, saving us from sin and death.

Head Change: To know Jesus promises his presence to anyone who receives him.

Heart Change: To feel God's nearness in every circumstance.

Life Change: To rely on Christ, even when our path is dark and unclear.

**What do you love most about Christmas?
What holiday traditions do you get most
excited about this time of year?**

Christmas is one of our most important and beloved holidays, but it takes place during the darkest time of the year. That is a strange contrast, but it's not an accident. Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us. It reminds us that God has entered our wintry darkness of sin to bring us light, love, joy, and peace. Jesus has come so that we might be with God now and into eternity.

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This series focuses on the names of Jesus in the book of Isaiah. These names were given during a very uncertain time in Israel's history, when God's people were threatened by all sorts of dangers. They cried out to God for help and he promised to send the Messiah, Jesus, to rescue them from their darkness. This promise is as relevant to us today as it was when Isaiah was written.

You may feel pretty distant from Isaiah and the ancient Israelites, but when we read God's promises you will find that they comfort and encourage you, no matter what darkness you are going through today.

Read Isaiah 7:10–14.

Ahaz, the leader of God's people, is facing down two armies, one from Syria and one from Ephraim. In the midst of this chaos, God promises Ahaz that neither army will overcome his people. It seemed like an unbelievable, even overly optimistic promise. **Put yourself in Ahaz's shoes: what are his options at this point in the story?**

In verse 10, God goes a step further, offering to give Ahaz a sign to confirm his promise. **Why do you think God offered Ahaz a sign to confirm his promise?**

What biblical promises are difficult for you to believe?

The promise God gave to Ahaz in Isaiah 7 is extended to us (Matthew 1:22–23). God has seen us in our distress and darkness and sent us a miracle, a child called Emmanuel. He did not come to defeat the armies of Syria and Ephraim but our true enemies, sin and death. In Jesus, that promise is offered to us, the church. God has met our true need by wiping away our sin and offering us his presence. **What encouragement does God’s provision give you in your current circumstances?**

No matter what you are going through today, God offers you his presence. He wants to be with you so that you can have peace and assurance of his goodness. **In what ways do you need God today? This week?**

In what ways does God’s presence feel like enough, or not enough, for what you are going through?

LAST WORD

In the dead of winter, when we are surrounded by darkness, we celebrate the light of Jesus. We gather in decorated homes to give one another good gifts as signs of our love.

This is Christmas: that in our darkness and spiritual coldness, God has sent light into the world and has given us the gift of his Son as a sign of his love. More than that, Jesus took on our sin, rose from the grave so that we might be saved, and promises to be with us until he returns.

Christmas is not just a sentimental holiday; it is the good news that for us a child is born, a Son has been given, and his name is Emmanuel, God with us.

DEEPER WALK

Read: Read Matthew 1:18–23 and 28:16–20. Take note of the promise of Emmanuel in both Jesus’s birth and Great Commission. He came to us and is with us even now.

Pray: Pray to see God's presence in your life more clearly. Even though he may feel far away, his presence never leaves us.

Memorize: Memorize John 1:11–12, “He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him. But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God.”

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Session 2: Wonderful Counselor

SESSION GOALS

Every session has a point—what each participant should walk away from the discussion knowing, feeling, and doing.

Main Idea: Jesus is our Wonderful Counselor, eager to guide us from darkness into his light.

Head Change: To know no problem is too big for Jesus to handle and no sin too bad that he will stop loving us.

Heart Change: To feel confident in approaching Jesus for counsel and guidance.

Life Change: To tell Jesus our fears, sorrows, and sins so that we might be healed.

OPEN

Are you more likely to ask for too much advice or to never ask for advice at all? Why?

Some of us are eager to ask for advice but often feel paralyzed at the prospect of making a decision. We want to confirm the decisions we are about to make are smart and can struggle with decision anxiety. Some of us rarely ask for advice, thinking that it reveals some kind of weakness.

When we look at Jesus, we find a Wonderful Counselor who is eager to guide us. But we must turn to him in honesty and be willing to act on whatever guidance he gives us.

VIEW

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LAST WORD

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Read: Read John 5:1–15. Examine the way Jesus treats the paralyzed man. Think about your problems and ask yourself, “Do I want to be made well?”

Pray: Pour your heart out to God. Tell him what scares, bothers, and concerns you. Confess your sins to him. Then take time to read his Word and listen for his guidance.

Memorize: Memorize Hebrews 4:15–16, “For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses. Instead, we have one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet he never sinned. So let us keep on coming boldly to the throne of grace, so that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.”

Main Idea: In Jesus, we find a father who pursues us with unending and redeeming love.

Head Change: To know our Everlasting Father sees us as his beloved children.

Heart Change: To feel seen, known, accepted, and loved by our Everlasting Father.

Life Change: To behold God's great love for us.

What is your favorite memory of your father or someone who was a father figure to you?

Fathers are incredibly influential in our lives. Even if a father is absent, it can change the course of a child's life. Sadly, many of us have wounds from our fathers that have never fully healed. Our fathers loom large in our lives, to the point that we are even tempted to think of God as just a bigger, more powerful version of our earthly fathers. But this is totally backwards. God, our Everlasting Father, is far greater than you can ever imagine and redeems us where our earthly father failed.

Before viewing the session, here are a few important things to look for in J.D. Greear's

teaching. As you watch, pay attention to how J.D. answers the following questions.

What are the four different types of fathers J.D. described?

In what ways do our views of our earthly fathers affect our view of God?

What type of father is God?

Watch Session 3: *Everlasting Father* (11 minutes).

REVIEW

We are all deeply influenced by our fathers, for good and for bad. Our relationship, or lack of a relationship, with our fathers influences our view of God, *the* Everlasting Father. We often project the hurts and hang-ups we received from our earthly fathers onto God. But, as J.D. taught, we need to flip that perspective. Instead of seeing God as a heavenly version of our earthly fathers, we need to see our earthly fathers—in their faults and in their goodness—as flawed representatives of our Everlasting Father.

What is/was your earthly father like?

What kind of relationship did you have with your father as a child? As an adult?

In what ways do you want to be like your earthly father?

What do you wish you could change about your earthly father?

The good news we find in Jesus is that our heavenly Father is far greater than our earthly fathers. Even the best father is just a shadow of

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What is the importance of the name I AM?

What does it mean to “take the Lord’s name”?

Watch Session 4: *I AM* (9 minutes).

REVIEW

The name Yahweh, meaning “I am,” was the name God gave himself—he used it over 6,500 times to refer to himself in the Old Testament. It may seem like a strange name, but through it we see that God is the fulfillment to our deepest needs. He is the source and supply for our security, courage, strength, and salvation.

In what ways do you feel insufficient for, vulnerable toward, or anxious about your current circumstances?

In this session, J.D. mentioned a few times when God came to his people in need and said “I AM.” He is our healer, our sanctifier, our righteousness, the ever present one, our shepherd, our provider, and our defender. **In what ways do you need God today?**

When we pray, we can sometimes ask only for the things we think we need to solve our problems but forget to ask God to be our I AM. **In what ways can you seek God’s presence and ask for his involvement in your current circumstances?**

Jesus also used the name I AM for himself. He called himself the bread of life, living water, the door to salvation, the good shepherd, the way, the truth, and the life. In our greatest areas of brokenness and pain, our needs are met in Jesus.

What do you feel like you need right now to be secure, happy, or whole? In what ways could Jesus meet that desire?

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
