Sermon Summary

- 4. How do Joseph's dreams reveal God's plan, and how should we respond to God-given visions or dreams today?
- 5. What does Joseph's story teach us about the importance of perspective when facing trials or hardships?
- 6. How can we become "grace hunters," as Helen Thorne suggests, in the midst of life's messes?
- 7. Share a time you were careless with your words. What was the impact of that? Discuss why it is important for Christians to be wise in what they say and when they say it.

This week let's challenge ourselves to step back and look at the bigger picture in our own lives. Where can we see God's hand at work, even amid challenges? Let's commit to trusting God's plan and timing, seeking to be grace hunters who find His glory in the everyday.
