

The Gospel of Matthew: Many Things in Parables

Discussion Guide for January 10 and 11, 2026

Summary

This week's message introduces Jesus' use of parables in Matthew 13 and invites us to consider how and why we listen to Jesus' teaching. Parables are not puzzles meant to confuse sincere seekers, nor are they secret codes to overanalyze. They are earthly stories designed to reveal deep, kingdom truths to those who are willing to follow Jesus with open hearts.

Using the historical context of Matthew's Gospel, we see that Jesus begins speaking in parables at a turning point—after growing rejection from religious leaders. Parables both reveal and conceal, they illuminate truth for disciples while exposing the spiritual dullness of those who resist repentance. Jesus explains that understanding the “secrets of the kingdom” is a gift given to those who belong to Him.

Ultimately, the sermon emphasizes that parables are meant to point us to the King and His Kingdom. They invite us into deeper intimacy with God, challenge us to examine the posture of our hearts, and call us to treasure God's Word as a gift. To truly understand Jesus' teaching, we must not only hear His words—we must follow Him.

Intro Prayer

God, thank You for revealing Yourself through Your Word. We confess that at times our hearts can become distracted, resistant, or dull. As we reflect on Jesus' teaching, soften our hearts, open our eyes, and tune our ears to hear what You want to say to us. Help us approach Your Word with humility, faith, and a desire to follow You more fully. Amen.

Ice Breaker

Have you ever misunderstood something because you didn't have the full context or right perspective? What changed once things became clear?

Discussion Questions

1. Why did Jesus begin teaching in parables at this point in His ministry?
2. What does Jesus mean when He says the “secrets of the kingdom of heaven” are given to some and not to others?
3. How does the condition of a person's heart affect their ability to understand Jesus' teaching?

4. Why is it important not to over-analyze parables or search for hidden symbolism beyond their main point?
5. What does this sermon teach us about how parables point to the King and His Kingdom rather than just moral lessons?
6. How does Jesus' reference to Isaiah 6 help explain the seriousness of rejecting God's truth?

Life Application

This week, intentionally set aside time to engage with Scripture—not out of obligation, but as a gift from God. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you listen with an open heart and to reveal what God wants you to understand about His Kingdom and your life as a follower of Jesus.
