

Pastors, I appreciate YOU!

Happy Pastors' Appreciation month to all of our conference pastors. You, and the ministry you accomplish, are to be valued and celebrated. You are a gift to the church. (Ephesians 4:11-13). I really like J.D. Greear's definition of our purpose: "We leaders of the church are simply servants who escort the bride to the heavenly groom." (Gaining By Losing, pg. 44) What a great privilege that Christ has presented to us, his servants. What a most high calling that we share.

So much so that I want the year of 2026 to be the "Year of the Pastor" in the Appalachian Conference. This means our focus will be on pastoral health. Well-being spiritually, mentally, and physically will be the goal. You will see this reflected in our events and resourcing for the year.

We want you to be blessed. As a conference ministry, we pray for you. In fact, each month our staff gathers and prays over the ministerial and church tithes and offerings that have been received, just like you do in your church!

Gloria and I have in our heart to be a pastor for our pastors. We are really enjoying seeing and hearing from you in the Pastors' Huddles that are being held across the conference. I also hope you are finding the text messages helpful in communicating with you. If there is anything we can pray with you about or do for you and your family, please let us know. We love you all.

LEADING WITH CARE: A WORD TO PASTORS AND CHURCH LEADERS

As Pastors & Leaders, you have been set apart and called to be shepherds who watch over your given flock. As shepherds of God's people, we are called to lead with compassion, wisdom, and strength. But leadership begins with stewardship of our own souls, bodies, and emotional health. We cannot care for others and not care for ourselves, or we will be trying to pour out of an empty cup, leading to burnout and potentially ineffective shepherding before we even realize it. Matthew 22:39 says, "Love your neighbor as yourself." But how do we live out God's design for caring for ourselves and others in ministry, while loving them and ourselves, without burning out or being empty? We often do really well at caring for others, just sometimes forget to apply the same principles to caring for ourselves. Here are some practical applications of the Word that were given to help us do both.

Caring for Yourself: Leading from Overflow

- ❖ Practice Sabbath Rest: Take one day each week to rest, worship, and disconnect from ministry demands. Your soul needs space to breathe.
- ❖ Protect Your Devotional Life: Guard time for personal prayer and Scripture, not just sermon preparation. Let God minister to you first; He is our daily ultimate fuel and power source. If we don't take time to plug ourselves in, our "battery" life will not be able to sustain us.
- ❖ Tend to Your Physical, Mental, and Emotional Health: Check in with your heart and mind. Seek counseling or spiritual direction when needed. Healthy leaders lead healthy churches. Pastors also need a Pastor or mentor that they can call on when they find themselves in need. Eat well, sleep enough, and move regularly. Your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit (1 Cor. 6:19-20). Just like the church as a physical building has to have regular upkeep and maintenance, even more so does the temple body you have been entrusted with so that you can fulfill your God-designed purpose

Caring for Others: Shepherding with Compassion

- ❖ Be Present and Listen: People need your presence more than your perfection. Listen deeply and respond with grace. You may not always have the answers and that is okay, be prepared to share that with your sheep and direct them to the Great Shepherd who does.
- ❖ Equip the Saints: Don't carry the load alone. Train and empower others to serve (Eph. 4:11-13). Team ministry is vital for spiritual growth of a congregation and ministry. Jesus had twelve disciples to help carry the Word forth to others and then subsequently believers were discipled and sent themselves. Ask yourself, how much more should we ask for help from others that Jesus has sent our way to reach the lost and advance the Gospel?
- ❖ Create a Culture of Care: Foster small groups, care teams, and prayer ministries that reflect Christ's love in action. The church is the body of Christ, with many members that have different functions. Be intentional about fellowship and discipleship within the church so that the team of believers Jesus has sent to you can be successful when they are called to "go out" and care for the needs of others.

Capture Balance and Discernment

- ❖ Know Your Limits: You are not the Savior. Jesus is. Learn to say no when needed and delegate wisely. Even though "no" is a two-letter word, it seems so difficult to say sometimes when you are the Pastor or in a leadership role because you just want to do all that you can, help everyone that you can, and fix everything that you can. Your limits will be tested; Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness demonstrating that. Seek God first, I promise He will hear you and answer you. The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures. Psalm 23:1-2
- ❖ Pray for Discernment: Ask God daily for wisdom to know when to rest, when to serve, and how to lead with love. Remember, ask and you shall receive. Asking God for the wisdom could be tagged as the easy part but then applying that wisdom and accepting it can be challenging. God knows all, sees all, hears all, and is all, trust Him completely. God has created you as His Masterpiece, He will hold it all together for you.

Dear Pastor and/or Leader, your well-being matters to God, to this denomination and conference, and to each of us reading this. Don't be afraid to reach out and ask for help; we all need it from time to time. We were called to help each other carry burdens and not bear them alone. When you care for yourself as God designed, you lead from a place of strength, not striving. You move from a place of just surviving to a peak of thriving. And when you model this balance, your church learns to live it too. Be blessed, renewed, refilled, and empowered.

50th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION AT FAITH TEMPLE

"Know therefore that the LORD your God is God; he is the faithful God, keeping his covenant of love to a thousand generations of those who love him and keep his commandments" Deuteronomy 7:9.

Fifty years ago, at Camp Meeting in Dubin, VA, a conversation occurred with Pastor Ray Furrow, future church members, and the Superintendent of the Virginia Conference, B.E. Underwood. Pastor Ray Furrow was asked if he would be interested in starting a church in Pearisburg, VA. Following in his father's, Rev. J.L. Furrow's, footsteps he happily and prayerfully agreed to do so.

He considered "pioneering" a new church a labor of love and proceeded to visit prospective attendees. A revival service began on July 4, 1975, in a storefront on the corner of Wenonah Ave. in Pearisburg. After eleven months of worship service in the Thomas building, 20 members agreed to apply for a \$45,000 loan from the IPHC loan fund, so that work could begin on a church building at 1523 Wenonah Ave.

In a miraculous way, people came and volunteered their time, tools, and other resources towards the construction of the church – the men coming from their secular jobs to work into the late hours and all day on Saturday – the ladies showing up with meals twice a day for the workers. Pastors and members from local PH churches would stop by to offer encouragement and support.

After two months of labor, the first service in the new building was held on August 1, 1976. Folding chairs were borrowed from the conference, lights hung down from the ceiling joist and the floor was bare concrete, but the presence of the Lord was there! When questioned about having the faith and courage to build a new church, Pastor Furrow would say, "It's a job that takes grits, grace and guts!" And when asked about finding help, he would just respond, "Anybody will help you do something, but nobody can help you do nothing."

Most of those precious saints who shared the vision with Pastor Ray are no longer with us. However, as they are now enjoying the reward of serving their Lord, future generations are being loved into the kingdom by current members of Faith Temple. It has been fifty years since Pastor Furrow, led by the Holy Spirit, called out to the community to come, hear the Word, be led by the Spirit to know the truth of the Bible, surrender themselves to it and worship the King of Kings and live accordingly!

On Sunday, July 13, 2025, the congregation of Faith Temple, in Pearisburg, VA, ended a weekend celebration of 50 years of God's faithfulness to the ministry of Faith Temple! The weekend celebration included music and Word from former pastors and their families – Pastor David Lawson, Pastor Jeff Rhea, Pastors Eric and Camie Pennington, and Pastor

Debra Hutton, with special singing and ministry on Sunday with the Furrow Family. Liam Furrow, the great grandson of Pastor Ray Furrow, made his singing debut on Sunday afternoon!

The Lord shared this word with former pastor, Eric Pennington, about the 50th anniversary. The Lord said to him, "Faith Temple would experience a Pentecostal harvest. Souls would be saved, and lost sheep would come back home. Get ready for a Pentecostal harvest!" Pentecost happened 50 days after Passover; 50 is associated with "Pentecostal." Pentecost means 50. It is the celebration of first fruits where Israel would offer a bread offering to thank God for a bountiful harvest for the year.

We, the congregation of Faith Temple PHC, look forward to continuing to be the hands and feet of Jesus in our community and beyond.

We believe God is calling a generation, not just the young, but all ages, to participate in the great harvest that is to come. Pray the Lord would raise up missionaries, church planters, and national workers to go into new fields of the Caribbean.



THE SPIRIT OF FIRE



The Holy Spirit is known to manifest in several different ways. For example, the Spirit of God descended upon Jesus at His baptism in the form of a dove. (Matthew 3:16) Blowing as a wind is another revelation of the Holy Spirit. Recall when Jesus told Nicodemus about the Spirit blowing like the wind. (John 3: 8) Perhaps the most well-known passage about the wind of the Spirit is found in the upper room. The disciples and other devoted people were praying when a mighty wind filled the house. (Acts 2:1,2)

The Spirit of Fire is also seen in several passages. Fire represents the powerful nature of God. It is also a symbol of God's presence. Fire also speaks of God's holiness. "For our God is a consuming fire" (Hebrews 12:29).

Protection

"He took not away the pillar of the cloud by day, nor the pillar of fire by night, from before the people" (Exodus 13:22).

God's fire protected His people during the darkest of nights. It also stood as a wall of protection between them and the Egyptian army, and they could not be touched by evil.

"And the angel of God, which went before the camp of Israel, removed and went behind them, and the pillar of the cloud went from before their face, and stood behind them: And it came BETWEEN the camp of the Egyptians and the camp of Israel; and it was a cloud and darkness to them, but it gave light by night to these: so that the one came not near the other all night" (Exodus 14:19-20).

King David faced many adversaries. He testified that God consumed his enemies.

"But the wicked shall perish, and the enemies of the Lord shall be as the fat of lambs: they shall consume; into smoke shall they consume away" (Psalm 37:20).

Direction

The fire of God also gave direction to His people. The burning bush that appeared before Moses is a great example. Moses was content to be a shepherd caring for the flock. But God called him to return to Egypt to set the people free.

"And the angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a flame of fire out of the midst of a bush: and he looked, and behold, the bush burned with fire, and the bush was not consumed" (Exodus 3:2).

The fire of God also turned the nation of Israel from idol worship. Recall when Elijah challenged the prophets of Baal. The challenge was to build an altar to your god, and the god that answered by fire would be worshipped as the True God. (I Kings 18:24)

The prophets of Baal prayed and cried at the altar of Baal the entire day. They jumped and screamed but there was no fire. However, when Elijah prayed, God sent fire from heaven to burn the offering! When the people saw the fire, they forsook Baal and turned to God. (I Kings 18:39)

God reflected His majestic power and glory through fire. On Mt. Sinai He chose to reveal Himself to the people by fire and lightning. Moses was invited on the mountain. The people remained at the base of the mountain. When the people saw the fire and lightning and heard the quaking, they feared God.

"And Mount Sinai was altogether on a smoke, because the Lord descended upon it in fire: and the smoke thereof ascended as the smoke of a furnace, and the whole mount quaked greatly" (Exodus 19:18).

Apostle John saw fire before the throne of God when he viewed scenes of the book of Revelation.

"And out of the throne proceeded lightnings and thunderings and voices: and there were 7 lamps burning before the throne, which are the 7 Spirits of God" (Revelation 4:5).

We must keep the zeal of fire for God burning in our hearts. The church at Ephesus had become so busy that they lost their love for God. Jesus warned them to return back to their first love.

"Nevertheless I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love" (Revelation 2:4).

This church was encouraged to turn back to Jesus, the first love. If so, they would overcome, and be granted the privilege of the tree of life, which is in the midst of the paradise of God. (Revelation 2:7)
