Weeds in your garden

A few years ago, I decided to remove the mulch from around my house. It was a big job! I diligently put down the landscape fabric around all the shrubs. The next step was spreading the 10 tons of river rock by hand around the house. It turned out looking great. My hope was that it was practical as well.

I thought that my weed problem was solved! That was my thought but not my reality. To my disbelief, there were weeds growing in the middle of my rocks. It's amazing how quickly a weed can sprout. A weed is a survival specialist. They can grow in a sliver of soil and thrive in a drought. The desired cultivated plants don't stand a chance when weeds begin choking them out.

As I was pulling weeds the other day, I was reminded of how sin can grow in an unchecked heart. It requires work and diligence to keep our heart free of the sinful weeds that choke out the good growth of the Holy Spirit. The writer of Hebrews uses this analogy in warning us about the root of bitterness. In that context the warning was to watch out for the trouble and the defiling nature caused by this rooted sin.

LARRY MEADORS INSTALLED AS CONFERENCE SUPERINTENDENT



On Monday, June 30, 2025, a group of leaders, ministers, family and friends gathered in the Training Center of the Appalachian Conference to witness the installation of a new superintendent for the Appalachian Conference. With Bishop Doug Beacham presiding, Rev. Larry Meadors was installed as the 16th Superintendent of the Appalachian Conference. It was clear that this was a sacred moment for Bishop Meadors, his wife Gloria and the Appalachian Conference, as you could sense the Holy Spirit enveloping them, establishing their leadership and setting direction for the Conference. Bishop Beacham was joined by former Bishop Preston Mathena, the conference executive council, Rev. Walter Lee Wood (Bishop Meador's childhood pastor), along with some local ministers and spouses. While we celebrate, remember and honor the past and those who have led us to this point, with excitement and anticipation we look forward to the days ahead as God continues to lead through Bishop Meadors. God's blessings, leadership and anointing upon him and his family in the days ahead. (Ron Fredericks)

Meadors grew up in Roanoke, Virginia, attending one of the Appalachian Conference's five original churches, New Life Christian Ministries, as a third-generation member of the IPHC. Meadors' mother and grandmother were instrumental in ensuring he stayed in church and learned about the love of a Savior who was steadfast and true. Meadors recalls a story from his shy pre-teen years when his grandmother, a simple, country woman, said to him as he left the church, "Larry, you gonna make a preacher!" Young, introverted Larry replied with, "Grandma, I don't wanna be a preacher. I just wanna be a Christian." Little did he know what the Lord had in store for him.

At 16, Meadors felt the call into ministry, and he and a friend started a before-school "chapel." It was in this place that he came face-to-face with the love of his life, Gloria: "She sat down in a desk behind me one morning, and when I turned around to say hello, I met the biggest, most beautiful smile I'd ever seen in my life. I fell in love at first sight." At the time, Gloria didn't quite feel the same, but they remained friends.

Meadors went on to attend Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, Oklahoma, from 1980 to 1984, studying for a Pastoral Ministry degree; he occasionally ran into Gloria when he returned to the Roanoke area on breaks from school. On one visit, Gloria decided to give dating a go, and in the fall of 1983, at the beginning of Meadors' senior year of college, they were married. Following graduation, Meadors assumed that the Lord would provide a job quickly, and they wouldn't return to the Roanoke area. A job didn't materialize, so the Meadors returned home, and he picked up a hammer, choosing to work in construction. Not long after, Meadors felt compelled to visit Walter Lee Wood at his home church to ask permission to assist with the youth program. Wood told Meadors, "I can't pay you anything," and he responded, "I didn't ask for anything." Wood did "find" \$100/week for Meadors, and he remained there for five years in youth pastor and associate pastor roles. In 1989, Meadors took over as pastor for Abundant Life Fellowship in Pilot, Virginia, where his family remained for 13 years. Here, in a parsonage surrounded by beautiful countryside and numerous cows, the Meadors family, now including children Maria, Jacob, and Timothy, would thrive.

Meadors has served in the Appalachian conference for 41 years to date. He was ordained in 1986, and that same year, the CE (Christian Education) Director at the time, David Wood, asked Meadors to fill an unexpired term on the CE Board. Meadors has continued uninterrupted in some sort of board ministry since then. In 2002, he took over as the CE Director of the Conference, under then Superintendent Ken Kingrea. This position required his family to move onto the Maranatha Campgrounds in Dublin, Virginia, where they ran the summer camps. Since 2010, Meadors has served as the Missions and Evangelism Director under Preston Mathena. In this role, he focused on church planting, revitalizations, promoting missions through offering and support, and the "nuts and bolts" for the Superintendent and the conference. In 2023, Meadors was elected to a second role as the Assistant Superintendent.

Now, as the newly-installed Superintendent, he and Gloria are "excited for this new season of ministry." The Meadors have spent decades of ministry with their sleeves rolled up, and this new season will just be an extension of what they have been doing. Meadors believes that a "Bishop is called to be a pastor to the pastors," and he plans to do everything he can to fulfill that role.

On a return trip from India, where the team ministered directly to pastors, the Lord gave Meadors a vision for the Appalachian Conference:

- It's Time for a Season of Revival. We need to look for it and cooperate.
- It's Time to Raise Up Sons and Daughters. To bring modeling, mentoring, and launching out to the forefront.
- It's Time to Strengthen Our Bonds Together. Emphasize fellowship and create a culture of ministering together.

Meadors' next season will be built upon the foundation of the past leadership of the conference. He shares: "It doesn't seem real in a sense, to be asked to do this." He goes on: "Ministry flows out of being a servant. We are so ready to serve pastors and churches and get back into a pastoral role." Meadors' grandmother would be pleased to see that he did, in fact, "make a preacher" and serve his conference with commitment and love.



FAITH VS. FANGS

Daniel was unjustly thrown into the lion's den by jealous men with evil motives. The only thing that Daniel took with him in that den of lions was his faith! How would Daniel's faith hold up against the angry fangs of lions?

Imagine how Daniel felt when the stone was rolled into position to shut the door for the night!

"And a stone was brought, and laid upon the mouth of the den; and the king sealed it with his own signet, and with the signet of his lords; that the purpose might not be changed concerning Daniel" (Daniel 6:17 KJV).

THE DEVIL HAD A PURPOSE

The devil had a purpose for Daniel. Even though the lions were meant to be instruments of death, evil spirits were operating behind the scenes. These spirits are noted throughout the Scriptures. Other godly men and women have suffered spiritual attacks by these spirits; namely the spirits of religion, the spirits of Jezebel, and the spirits of witchcraft!

Evil spirits desire bodies. We are spirits with bodies. Our spirits are from God. However, demons are evil spirits without bodies. In order to express themselves, they search for a suitable body. If the evil spirit cannot enter a human body, they will enter animals. This example is seen when Jesus cast the demons out of a man. Legion was the name of the demon and associated spirits. When Jesus commanded the demons to leave, they entered into a herd of 2000 pigs. (Mark 5:13,14)

Jesus informed his disciples that demons roam through the land looking for a place to dwell.

"When the unclean spirit is gone out of a man, he walks through dry places, seeking rest, and finds none. Then he says, I will return into my house from where I came out; and when he is come (returns) he finds it empty, swept and garnished. Then he goes, and takes with himself seven other spirits more wicked than himself, and they enter in and dwell there: and the last state of that man is worse than the first. Even so shall it be also unto this wicked generation" (Matthew 12:43-45).

SPIRITUAL WARFARE LED TO PHYSICAL WARFARE

The warfare is real. Sometimes, people take the approach to ignore the conflicts caused by evil spirits. But such an approach is contrary to Jesus. He told us to WATCH and PRAY. (Luke 21:36) We must know the enemy as well as the Victorious Jesus.

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places" (Ephesians 6:12).

THE JEZEBEL SPIRIT

Certain evil leaders appointed by the king were extremely jealous of Daniel, because he was in a position of authority over them. And King Darius seemed to prefer Daniel. The Jezebel spirit now had willing houses (bodies) to express itself!

There are some key characteristics of this spirit. One main trait is that this spirit will NOT REPENT. There will be no guilt or remorse in these hearts. And they certainly will not repent or admit any wrong.

Often the Jezebel spirit operates with the spirit of witchcraft to deceive and to manipulate its victims. Revenge is Jezebel's desire. And the fruit they express is revenge and retaliation!

Such was the nature of the evil leaders, for they devised a plot to bring accusation against Daniel. They invented a law in the area of prayer. Nobody was to pray to any god beside the king for 30 days. Such a law appealed to the king. (Daniel 6) Without hesitation, Daniel continued to pray to the true God. And they accused him of this action!

DANIEL'S FAITH

Daniel was about 80 years old when he was thrust into the lion's den. Research suggests that there were 7 to 9 lions in the den.

In the face of fear, Daniel maintained a posture of prayer. Heaven responded by sending an angel in the den with Daniel. The angel shut the mouths of the lions.

IN THE FACE OF AFFLICTIONS

The fangs of lions stared Daniel in the face. But he remained steadfast in his faith. The same God that sent an angel to shut the mouths of lions, is able and willing to terminate the attacks that you face!

The night of the lions is over. A new day with new victory is here!
