HOW DO WE KNOW IF THE RESURRECTION IS TRUE?

The resurrection is true, and Jesus is alive! But how can we know? Our faith hinges on the reality of the resurrection. Remove Jesus' resurrection, and our faith is worthless. Without an empty tomb, Christianity becomes religious moralism. If Jesus did not rise from the dead, then all eternity is in question.

Easter Sunday is an early church tradition, dating back to the 100s and firmly established by 300 A.D. Where did Easter originate? The day is an early church tradition. Likely, the earliest Jewish Christians transferred their Passover observance to that of Easter, focusing on Jesus' resurrection. At the same time, the church included Good Friday, focusing on the crucifixion. Church tradition is important, showing the earliest Christians believed in Jesus' resurrection.

There were hundreds of eyewitnesses! In the book of Acts, the early church based its mission on Jesus' resurrection. The gospel writers believed Jesus rose from the grave. The Apostle Paul recognizes the necessity of the resurrection in his first letter to the church at Corinth. "And if Christ has not been raised, then all our preaching is useless, and your faith is useless" 1 Corinthians 15:14 (NLT).

In 1 Corinthians 15:3, Paul uses language that implies the early church had passed down the truth of the resurrection by oral tradition. I like how the New American Standard Bible says, "I delivered to you what I also received."

Paul wrote this letter in the mid-50s, so he is delivering an older oral tradition. Where did he get it? Likely in the later 30s from church leaders in Jerusalem (this exchange is recorded in Galatians 1). The resurrection creed dates between two and five years after Jesus' death! So what? Why is this part of Paul's writing important? The Bible confirms the resurrection account everywhere in the New Testament. There were eyewitnesses and no known disputes with those who saw Jesus resurrected. The church believed in the resurrection from the very beginning. The doctrine was not added later.

Frankly, it takes more faith not to believe in the resurrection than it does to say the tomb is empty. The resurrection is true, and Jesus is alive! See you on Easter Sunday.





General Rules and Car Specifications

The following are guidelines and specifications for the Colt Barker Memorial Derby.

- 1. A contestant may enter only one car per racing class except for Open, which is unlimited.
- 2. In order to be eligible for competition (either racing or workmanship), a car must fit on and roll down the track without interfering with any other car.
- 3. Cars must meet the following specifications. Note: Check the kit block before you start. Some variation may exceed the maximums right out of the box.
 - a. Maximum Length (including all attachments) 7 1/2"
 - b. Maximum Width 2 3/4"
 - C. Maximum Height 3"
 - d. Maximum Weight 5 1/2 oz. (156 grams)
 - e. Maximum Under-Car Clearance 3/8"
- 4. Pinewood Derby cars will be made from kits sold by Lifesprings Resources, item no. 4715410 Ranger Derby Car Kit 2023 Edition. The contestant must use the parts provided in the kit for their intended use.







- 5. The contestant may add weights to the car in order to bring the car to the maximum allowed weight. Weights must be an integral part of the car. They may be placed inside the block, mounted as an ornament, or be otherwise permanently attached. Weights may not be taped or set on a car. If weights or any other part of a car comes off during a heat, the heat will be rerun. If the same car or parts leave the track again, the car is disqualified from racing. No heat/race will be delayed while repairs are made.
- 6. Dry graphite lubricants only.
- 7. Wheels may not be altered in shape or thickness. No metal-to-metal contact is allowed. No washers allowed.
- 8. If a car needs to be lubricated or worked on before it is registered, there will be a designated place set up for that purpose. No work or lubrication can be done after the car has been registered.
- 9. Cars raced previously at events/races other than the local church, for practice before this race, can only race in open class.

Modified Division Rules

- 1. The modified car can be powered by gravity, electric, air or mechanical means. Car must be free of wire connection once gate is open. Radio controls may be used.
- 2. Car must have a similar axle design and width of kit sold by Lifesprings.
- 3. No lubricants that remain wet on race day and can drip onto track are allowed.
- 4. Wheel washers are not allowed.
- 5. Car must fit within the size specification to fit on track.
 - a. Maximum Length (including all attachments) 7 3/4"
 - b. Maximum Width 3 1/2 "
 - C. Maximum Height 4 "
 - d. Maximum Weight 11 oz. (312 grams)
 - e. Maximum Under-Car Clearance 3/8"
- 6. Race will consist of three cars or less at a time, as to allow an empty lane to provide room for oversized cars. The number of times each car will race will be determined on race day based on number of participants in class. You may want to make sure your car can race more than one time.
- 7. Car cannot be worked on other than changing or charging battery, changing CO2, turning on or off motors. If damage occurs, a review by race officials and limited repair may be allowed. No lubrication or unapproved work will be allowed once car is checked in.

***No use of incendiary device (fireworks, bottle rockets, flares, etc).

***No use of liquid propellants or chemical reactions.

***No use of firearm ammunition.

"Focus on LIFE"

When you think of Easter, what comes to your mind? Spring? Tulips? Pastel colors? Little ones hunting plastic eggs with prizes inside? Maybe you do think about some of these things, but more than likely, Jesus is your first thought.

As Christians, the season of Easter reminds us of life and hope. It's the time when we are reminded of the magnitude of God's love and the promise we have in Him of new life!

Obviously, we think about the crucifixion and all that Jesus went through for our salvation. Sometimes, the thought of being betrayed by Judas is on our mind. Just wondering how someone who walked so close with Jesus – ate with Him, sat under His teaching, stood beside Him while He healed the sick, raised the dead and restored the broken – could betray Him. We watch amazing movies that bring to life the depth of His suffering. For sure, we need never forget what He went through and the road He walked because His love for us was greater than the cross He bore.

For me, Easter, specifically Passion Week, has become a time of reflecting on what Jesus went through from Palm Sunday to just one week later when He rose from that cold, dark grave.

I can't imagine what emotions He endured as He walked that road. He felt loved, anger, hurt, disappointment, sorrow, betrayal and so much more. How did He do it? He was God, I know, but He was also man. He could have aborted His mission. He could have put a stop to the plan that He agreed to. But He didn't!

It's so easy to focus on the cruel death of Jesus. For sure, we need never forget His sacrifice, but He died so we could live. It isn't about His death but about His resurrection that we rejoice!

DIG ANOTHER WELL

"He moved away from there and dug another well, and they did not quarrel over that one; so they named it Rehoboth (broad places), saying, 'For now the Lord has made room for us, and we shall be prosperous in the land' (Genesis 26:22) (The Amplified Study Bible)."

Famine oppressed the land. And God intervened to protect his children. The Lord instructed Isaac not to go to Egypt, but to the territory of Gerar. (Genesis 26:1-6) In this land Abimelech ruled as king of the Philistines. In this land Isaac would prosper! Even with a famine in the land, God blessed Isaac with a 100-fold crop.

"Then Isaac sowed in the land, and received in the same year, a hundredfold: and the Lord blessed him" (Genesis 26:12). His prosperity did not go undetected. The Philistines saw the blessings of God, and envy was sparked in their hearts.

Such a demonic response continues to be released today. But despite the threat, we can take comfort that even as God protected Isaac and his family, He will protect us.

REDIGGING HIS FATHER'S WELLS

Isaac was sending a message with his efforts to redig the wells that his father had dug in the past. As a custom of the culture of the East, to dig wells was to prove a title of the surrounding lands. These wells of his father had been filled and obstructed by the Philistines. He was reclaiming territory once possessed by his father. Also, he was seeking a source of water to sustain life for those that accompanied him.

AN ACT OF WAR

In the valley of Gerar, Isaac's servants dug a well. And they found a well of springing water. (Genesis 26:19) But their celebration was short-lived. The herdsmen of Gerar resisted Isaac's servants. Falsely, they claimed that the water belonged to them. (Genesis 26:20)

Isaac named this well Esek. The meaning of this name is lawsuit. To fill the wells that had been dug was considered a hostile act, and even an act of war!

THE RESPONSE OF A GODLY MAN

Isaac had strong faith in God. He trusted God. He was aware that God had blessed him. He was not willing to engage in distracted warfare. Peace was precious to him.

For these reasons, Isaac and his servants moved to another well. Again, the herdsmen strove against his servants. Isaac named this well Sitnah. Sitnah means Satan or Accuser.

Peace was still the priority of Isaac. He moved his men to another well.

ROOM FOR ISAAC

Isaac's men dug another well. This time there was no opposition. Rehoboth was the name he gave to this well. Rehoboth meant that God had made ROOM for Isaac and his family. His family would dwell in the land and be fruitful. (Genesis 26:22)

ENVY, JEALOUSY AND ACCUSATION

These three weapons of the devil are still used to obstruct, to interfere and even hinder God's people. Have you ever wondered why the door was slammed in your face? CLOSING DOORS is a delight to the devil. He does not want to see doors of opportunity and blessings open for God's people.

ROOM FOR YOU

Like Isaac, be a person of peace. Persevere in prayer and see what God will do!
