Session 02 Genesis 3:1-8,13-15,21-24

CREATION CORRUPTED

CENTRAL TRUTH | God promised a Redeemer as a result of humanity's rebellion.

AS YOU GO

These are simple questions to ask your student as you go home from church or go about your weekly activities.

- What is one rule you struggle to follow? Why?
- If you were the ruler of your own nation, what are three rules you would create?

FAMILY DEVOTION

Follow up with your student later in the week and go through the following summary and discussion questions together.

SUMMARY | Genesis 3:1-8,13-15,21-24

Genesis 3 describes the corruption of God's good creation and begins with the abrupt appearance of "the serpent" (v.1). The serpent is used as an tool of Satan. Adam and Eve had the freedom to eat the fruit of any tree in the garden of Eden but were forbidden to eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. However, the serpent convinced them to eat from the forbidden tree, bringing both physical and spiritual death into the world. As a result, God promised that one of Adam and Eve's male descendants would one day deal a fatal blow to the serpent (Satan), though he would also be struck in the process.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Follow up with your student later in the week and go through the following summary and discussion questions together.

01. What was the consequence of Adam and Eve's rebellion? How did God respond?

02. How can we learn to trust God's character when we're tempted otherwise?

PRAY: Heavenly Father, thank You for loving humanity in such a way that You sent Jesus. Teach us to enjoy the new life we have in Christ.
