FAMILY DEVOTION

Follow up with your student later in the week and go through the following summary and discussion questions together.

SUMMARY John 4:9-26

Jesus was tired from His journey and asked a Samaritan woman for something to drink. The woman was surprised by Jesus's question because Jews did not associate with Samaritans. Though Jesus came to her for water, He leveraged something one physically needs (water) to reveal a greater spiritual need (eternal life). After more dialogue, the woman shared her belief in the Messiah who would arrive and reveal all things. With the table set for Jesus, He shared His true identity with her. He is the long-awaited Messiah, the source of living water and eternal life, and the One who ushers in the age of worshiping in Spirit and in truth.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Follow up with your student later in the week and go through the following summary and discussion questions together.
