Questions

- 1. How often do you find yourself losing hope about a person or situation? What kind of thinking is likely to send you toward hopelessness? Read Psalm 42:5. What would it look to put your hope in God in that situation?
- 2. Read Isaiah 40:1-2. Much of Isaiah, prior to chapter 40, highlights the vast gulf between the transcendent holiness of God and the foolish sinfulness of man. How does Isaiah 40:1-2 match your own experience of God entering your life with His greatness and grace? How have you experienced His comfort?
- 3. What would be the problem for man if God <u>only</u> revealed Himself to us as perfect in greatness and power and as the ruler over all creation and history?
- **4.** As you read Isaiah 40, what's one statement about God's greatness that captures your heart and enlarges your worship of Him?
- **5.** Do you ever struggle with putting more hope in your own intellect, power, or skills, than you are putting in God?
- **6.** Read Isaiah 40:11, 29-31. How do these verses apply to some aspect of your life today? What's one way you can grow in thinking on these verses?
