Genesis 12-25

Genesis 13:1–5

¹ Abram went up from Egypt to the Negev—he, his wife, and all he had, and Lot with him. ² Abram was very rich in livestock, silver, and gold. ³ He went by stages from the Negev to Bethel, to the place between Bethel and Ai where his tent had formerly been, ⁴ to the site where he had built the altar. And Abram called on the name of the LORD there. ⁵ Now Lot, who was traveling with Abram, also had flocks, herds, and tents.

Genesis 13:6–8

⁶ But the land was unable to support them as long as they stayed together, for they had so many possessions that they could not stay together, ⁷ and there was quarreling between the herdsmen of Abram's livestock and the herdsmen of Lot's livestock. (At that time the Canaanites and the Perizzites were living in the land.) ⁸ So Abram said to Lot, "Please, let's not have quarreling between you and me, or between your herdsmen and my herdsmen, since we are relatives."

Genesis 13:9–11

⁹ Isn't the whole land before you? Separate from me: if you go to the left, I will go to the right; if you go to the right, I will go to the left.” ¹⁰ Lot looked out and saw that the entire plain of the Jordan as far as Zoar was well watered everywhere like the LORD's garden and the land of Egypt. (This was before the LORD destroyed Sodom and Gomorrah.) ¹¹ So Lot chose the entire plain of the Jordan for himself. Then Lot journeyed eastward, and they separated from each other.

Genesis 13:12–15

¹² Abram lived in the land of Canaan, but Lot lived in the cities on the plain and set up his tent near Sodom.

¹³ (Now the men of Sodom were evil, sinning immensely against the LORD.) ¹⁴ After Lot had separated from him, the LORD said to Abram, “Look from the place where you are. Look north and south, east and west, ¹⁵ for I will give you and your offspring forever all the land that you see., then your offspring could be counted

Genesis 13:16-18

¹⁶ I will make your offspring like the dust of the earth, so that if anyone could count the dust of the earth¹⁷ Get up and walk around the land, through its length and width, for I will give it to you.” ¹⁸ So Abram moved his tent and went to live near the oaks of Mamre at Hebron, where he built an altar to the LORD.

MAIN IDEA

In Genesis 13 we see three responses of faith
so that we live with conviction when
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1. **Returning to worship:** Faith responds to failure by returning to Lord in dependent worship

Genesis 13:1–4

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“if we are faithless, he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself.” (2 Timothy 2:13)

“If we confess our sins, he is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.” (1 John 1:9)

“Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus,” (Romans 8:1)

In Genesis 13 we see three responses of faith so that we live with conviction when circumstances test us..

1. Returning to worship: Faith responds to failure by returning to Lord in dependent worship
2. Relinquishing rights: Faith responds to conflict by laying down personal rights for the sake of peace

Genesis 13:5–7

⁵ Now Lot, who was traveling with Abram, also had flocks, herds, and tents. ⁶ But the land was unable to support them as long as they stayed together, for they had so many possessions that they could not stay together, ⁷ and there was quarreling between the herdsmen of Abram's livestock and the herdsmen of Lot's livestock. ⁸ So Abram said to Lot, “Please, let’s not have quarreling between you and me, or between your herdsmen and my herdsmen, since we are relatives.

¹⁷ By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac. He received the promises and yet he was offering his one and only son, ¹⁸ the one to whom it had been said, Your offspring will be traced through Isaac. ¹⁹ He considered God to be able even to raise someone from the dead; therefore, he received him back, figuratively speaking.

Philippians 2:3–4

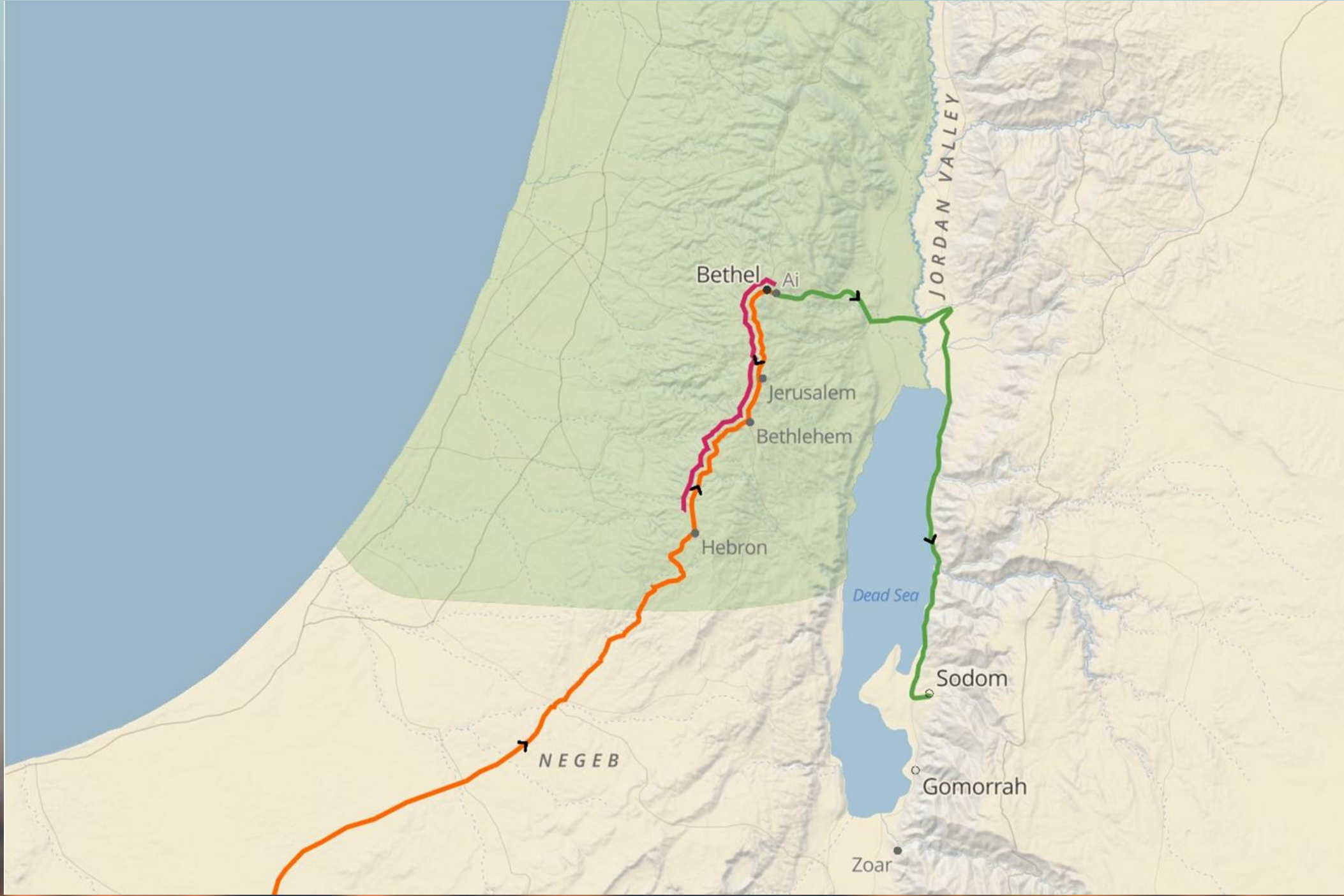

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2. Relinquishing rights: Faith responds to conflict by laying down personal rights for the sake of peace
3. **Resting in the promises:** Faith responds to uncertainty by trusting God's promises
