³⁰So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³²Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. 33In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

³⁴The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" ³⁸He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. ³⁹When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea. Acts 8:30-40

What is the job of the church? Is it to get a little religion into people? Is it to work with God to transform the world and bring God's justice into the world? Is it to get people in the pews? Is it to save people? Or is it to be clever, innovative and make the church palatable to those who don't believe? The purpose of the church is to bear witness to Jesus Christ and to watch for God's answer to the world.

For too long the church, maybe because of its cultural strength, has found all kinds of avenues to attempt to influence the world and try to make the world Christian. The problem with such activity is that it doesn't make the world Christian and more often than not makes the church less the church and more of the world. We want – as church giving experts put it – to leave a lasting legacy. This is the danger of the church trying to chase after a culture that seems more and more to be getting on just fine without the church. Maybe it is good for the church and a proper judgment on us that more people are finally answering the question "What good is the church?', with their feet and presence.

The church is not an institution, it is God's presence in the world and that presence is rejected and cut off from the future except by the act of God in Jesus Christ, to which we hold by faith and live in love. *God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them.* ¹⁷Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹ 1 John 4:16-17

The world doesn't know this, the world doesn't believe it, because the world doesn't know Jesus Christ, cut off from the living, but raised from the dead. The world chases after its own versions of salvation, creating a legacy a form of "false immortality." Mark Judge writes: There's only one problem: Without God, these modern mystics are not only going to come up short, but may wind up in a bad place. Root preaches that the healthiest kind of mysticism is that preached by Martin Luther, who argued that we need God to truly deliver us from ourselves and permanently heal our sins. Our human problem is that we want to "leave our mark" or "[secure] a false immortality to want to leave behind an enduring legacy in honor of one's memory." It is a human temptation which is part of what the Ethiopian eunuch seems to be wrestling. It is ultimately self-defeating. This man is literally "cut off" from securing the legacy of descendants, he looks at his service in the court of a queen as the erasure of his identity and passing on a legacy. So he asks Philip who it might be that Isaiah is speaking in the chapter 53:

*By a perversion of justice he was taken away.

Who could have imagined his future?

For he was cut off from the land of the living,

stricken for the transgression of my people.

They made his grave with the wicked

and his tomb with the rich,

although he had done no violence,

and there was no deceit in his mouth.

To Yet it was the will of the LORD to crush him with pain.

When you make his life an offering for sin,

he shall see his offspring, and shall prolong his days;

through him the will of the LORD shall prosper.

The church's foundation and hope is the one who was cut off and is left the tomb behind, for the Lord prospers his servant and has raised him from the death. This is the promise by which we live and to which we witness. In the world we are optimists, but optimists don't really know why they think as they do. We have a real hope and "Hope trusts in the promises of God. Hope seeks the action of God that brings forth a new reality. Optimism stands in the current reality, wishing to make the best of each individual experience. But hope stands knee deep in the history of this reality by yearning for the action of God to bring forth a new reality in which everything in this reality is reconciled and redeemed." — Andrew Root

""The real crisis is encountering a living God who is God. This waiting even sends the church into the world to wait with the world for God's action to save the world. *This* crisis gives life." (Andrew Root) That is what Philip taught the eunuch and what created the desire to be baptized. God's Spirit brought to life a hope that overcame his inability to create a living legacy. Instead he received a life that cannot die and a hope that cannot be conquered.



Worship Notes for April

April 7 – **Second Sunday of Easter**

Readings: Acts 4:32-35; Psalm 133; 1 John 1:1--2:2; John 20:19-31

Theme: John wrote: "We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life..." The witness of the apostles was strong enough to sustain them and bind them together even in the face of persecution and death. Their witness reminds us of the firmthat which our faith and life stands as well.

April 14 – Third Sunday of Easter

Readings: Acts 3:12-19; Psalm 4;1 John 3:1-7; Luke 24:36b-48

Theme: "Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is." We are spiritual beings, made to be like God. Jesus has now made it possible to be what God intended from the beginning. In the present time we strive to live already in that hope that God will accomplish this in us.

April 21 -Fourth Sunday of Easter

Readings: Acts 4:5-12; Psalm 23; 1 John 3:16-24; John 10:11-18

Theme: We come to know love through what Jesus Christ has done. Love's primary definition is that Jesus laid down his life for us and therefore we ought to lay down our lives for one another. This is what it means to be a member of the church and the new humanity that Jesus promises to create. Such love is the sign of his dwelling among us.

April 28 – Fifth Sunday of Easter

Readings: Acts 8:26-40; Psalm 22:25-31; 1 John 4:7-21; John 15:1-8

Theme: We are slowly leaving behind a time when we could assume that the church would survive and be renewed by having children. It is no longer true and we ought to once again take up the calling of being witnesses. Like Philip, we are called to witness to the new people gathered in Christ, not by birth, but by the new birth of God's Word and Holy Spirit.




Recognition of 2024 Graduates at Christ the King


