"In the Bleak Midwinter," is a beautiful combination of poetry and music. My sister-in-law loved this song. She was an English teacher, and the poetry as well as the music were appealing to her, we remember her whenever we hear it. It is simple, quiet and powerful. Even if you have nothing else, were poor as the poet of the song, you can give your heart, your life, and a gift to the God who has become like you, in order to make you like Him. The bleak, harsh hardness of the world yields to the one who cannot be held by heaven and it is in a humble manger where he begins to conquest of sin and death by his own humble simplicity. We seek God in weak and lowly places was what Martin Luther liked to say.


It is the lowly, the creatures who welcome him even as the angels praise him, his nature as God and his humble human flesh borne by his mother who greets him with a kiss are the stuff of Christmas, both nostalgic and powerful. The tune in our hymnal, written by Gustav Holst, is also simple and more subdued than many of the songs we sing at Christmas and bears the words to our ears and hearts, seeking to move us to giving them up to this Son of God, lying in a manger. (There is another tune by Harold Darke that is also quite wonderful.)

"This carol doesn't shout from the rooftops or the mountains about Christmas cheer; instead, it focuses on the simplest yet truest gift of all, love." Love doesn't always announce itself in gaudy displays, but takes on flesh and lives itself out among us in often humble and hidden ways. This is the story that begins at Christmas, God fulfills the promises whose fulfillment often seemed hidden from the eyes of God's people, but they do literally become visible in God's Son Jesus Christ, so that we may believe in the God who we have not seen. Having seen with our own eyes, we can point others to the God we know, rather than the hidden and unknown God for which many in the world are hoping for, searching for, crying out to in hope of answers.

We point them to this child whose life and ways teach us that his Father can be trusted to rescue us and give us new life. We can look at his life with faith and hope, that he might form us in love. It expresses that while believers are currently God's children, their future glorious state has not been fully revealed, but we know with confidence that when it does come, we will be like the one who was born in a stable so long ago. Christmas is a light that shines in the darkness and cannot be overcome.



The birth of Jesus reminds us of the dignity and value of each life made in the image of God, for he is the firstborn, the image of God and in him God is restoring us to our intended status as children of God. C.S. Lewis says it well:

December 24 - Christmas Eve



One of their sub-contractors is working on reducing our echo in the sanctuary while Muska is putting together a bid for improvements on the system.

Thanksgiving service will be Wednesday evening at Our **Savior's.** Pastor Kathy asked that it be at Our Savior's since it is easier to plan a service at your own church. We will need to find some lay people to assist with the service. We shall start first with council members. The choir will sing.

Coat drive and Auction for Helping Hands are getting organized for November. We've received some coats for the drive and auction items.

Youth Ministry Report:

Trunk or Treat will be Friday night at Prairie Senior Cottages and Saturday afternoon with ECFE.; Jr High Youth Gathering will have 8-9 youth attending the 3rd Saturday in November.

Personnel Committee - Personnel Committee - Protecting against sexual abuse policy and training and will align with the synod and insurance policy. Discussed insurance policy and we now have United Health which will cover the youth coordinator. Last year's cost was \$1072.81 and this year's will be \$1078.74 per month. Bill moved to approve the agenda and seconded by Miriam; motion carried.
