"We would like a church that again asserts that God, not nations, rules the world, that the boundaries of God's kingdom transcend those of Caesar, and that the main political task of the church is the formation of people who see clearly the cost of discipleship and are willing to pay the price." — Stanley Hauerwas

14 Remind them of this, and warn them before the Lord that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. 15 Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth. 2 Timothy 2: 14-15

I have been sharing some advice from Aaron Renn about facing the challenges of living in a world that seems to see faith in a negative light.

Christ the King was formed using the strategies of what was called the church growth movement back in the 70's and 80's. Much of that movement encouraged us to keep up with the times and make faith more palatable or familiar to the culture. Contemporary services, less ritual, less formal and more upbeat were some of the themes. There was even a form of evangelism touted in The Lutheran magazine that was called "entertainment evangelism." These forms of evangelism and worship were very effective in many ways, but came at a price, since they tended to downplay certain aspects of worship and faith that people found old fashioned or stodgy. (If you don't know what that means, it means old fashioned or uninspired. It is kind of an old fashioned word.)

One of the things that was often said as I was just starting in the ministry was that we should be like Martin Luther, who wrote many of his hymns based on tunes from the local tavern. The problem with such statements is that they were false. You can search through the many changes Luther made to worship and the many hymns Luther wrote and you won't find any. Luther is a cautious reformer in many ways, criticized by others as too cautious, but Luther also understood that reform carries dangerous consequences. Something important can be lost. One thing we should be careful of according to Renn's advice is that we "not remain too wedded to the strategies of yesteryear." I would say that we ought to be cautious of strategies in general, though there is always a need to have some idea what you are trying to do.

Renn tries to explain why: I noted above that the ministry and engagement strategies of the American church were created in the positive and neutral worlds and were tuned to the cultural context of those eras. In the Evangelical world, I identify three principal strategies: culture war (or the religious right), seeker sensitivity (often seen in non-denominational megachurches), and cultural engagement (the urban church movement)." Each of these strategies got important things right. The culture warriors understood that sometimes you have to be unpopular with society's elites. The seeker sensitives did not want to put man-made barriers between people and Christ. The cultural engagers understood the importance of the life of the mind and vocation.

One of the responses to these evangelism approaches of the church of my early years as a pastor has been a desire for more traditional forms of church. Many young people are turning to Orthodox, Roman Catholic or more conservative evangelical traditions, in search of something they perceive to be "missing." The temptation to go back is a common one, because it once worked. The other temptation is to try and restore a long lost traditional form of Christian faith. I am not sure either of these "strategies" is a good one. We have a vast store of wealth for worship, faith formation and living from which to draw, I tend to think that we use what is there, but more important is the purpose of life together, to celebrate the God who rescued us in Christ while sharing that Good News with those who have yet to hear.

Strategies are fine, but they must be aware of what is happening around us, what is said, as well as what is often heard. Let us remember Paul's advice to his young friend Timothy:

Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, in the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace, and this grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Jesus Christ, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day the deposit I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good deposit entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us. 2 Timothy 1:8-14

Worship Notes for October

October 5 – 17th Sunday after Pentecost

Readings: Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4; Psalm 37:1-9; 2 Timothy 1:1-14; Luke 17:5-10

Theme: Faith vs. Pride is a common theme in the Bible. Pride has traditionally been the first of the sins that leads to all the others in the Christian tradition. It is the kind of pride that says I did it on my own or I will do it myself that is a danger, because it is always unstable and uncertain. Faith is a firm and certain trust that is solid ground on which to build, even when all seems lost and we are surrounded by obstacles and dangers. It is this faith, whether mustard-seed-sized or great faith that the Bible celebrates, because it stands firmly on God's promise.

The 3 year olds will also receive their Bibles at this service.

October 12 – 18th Sunday after Pentecost

Readings: 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c; Psalm 111; 2 Timothy 2:8-15; Luke 17:11-19

Theme: "There is a God here!" Many are reluctant, many find faith in God stupid, but it is always possible that they may discover as did Naaman when he encountered Elijah that there is indeed a God. Everyone comes to faith in a different way, but we are invited like Elijah to give witness to what we have seen and heard, so that others may know the God who frees lepers and rescues sinners so they may give thanks and praise.

Our 3rd grade youth receive their Bibles on this special day.

October 19 - 19th Sunday after Pentecost

Readings: Genesis 32:22-31; Psalm 121; 2 Timothy 3:14-4:5; Luke 18:1-8

Theme: Prayer is the act of faith that is often most neglected. Our words often seem inadequate, our faith even less so, but Jesus encourages us to continue and to pray always and in all things. Resting in the promise of God that our prayers are and will be heard, we ought never assume that prayers is wasted, even when we do not see the answers in our time frame. The story of Jacob should be a reminder that the answer to prayer is often framed in a lifetime that comes to a point in a dramatic moment of blessing and vindication.

October 26 – 20th Sunday after Pentecost

Readings: Jeremiah 14:7-10, 19-22; Psalm 84:1-7; 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18; Luke 18:9-14

Theme: We began the month with a reminder of the dangers of pride. We come to the end of the month and see that its opposite is humility. Humility is not a modern, American word in the sense that it is rarely seen in a positive light. We are a proud people, with pride in who we claim to be, but as Christians we are called to humble ourselves or even allow ourselves to be humbled. Paul reminds us of the valuable reward that is held for us in the hand of God that allows us to be humble in the present moment: "For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day the deposit I have entrusted to him."

Today is a joyous celebration as we hear the affirmations of faith declared by our 10^{th} grade confirmands, please remember them in your prayers this day.

Fostering Youth Transitions - Willmar Area is a service that prepares youth for independence. Fostering Youth Transitions - Willmar Area provides guidance and support to youth, up to age 23, who have been in out-of-home placement (i.e., foster care, group homes, juvenile justice placements or change of custody) and are preparing to find their own living situation. We also facilitate connections with their peers who have been in a similar situation.

This experiential independent living skills group includes a strong focus on adventure-based learning, leadership and team building skills. It includes retreats and field trips as well as individual transitional and independent living plans for youth who are in or have aged out of out-of-home placement care.

What does it mean to belong to a church?

We hope everyone feels a sense of belonging in this church from day one. We worship a God who welcomes persons from every race and group and background into his kingdom (Acts 10:34-35, Revelation 7:9-10). In that same spirit, Christ the King Lutheran Church welcomes each and every one of you. You aren't required to become a member to be part of the grace and faith and fellowship that happens here. You belong here because Christ welcomes you here with his Word and sacraments.

It has been said that non-members can do pretty much everything in a church that members do—except vote on congregational decisions. [And most folks don't join a church for the sake of going to voters' meetings!] There are, actually, a number of ways that we commit themselves to one another by joining as members together in a church.

Committing to staying connected

Joining together as members of a church is a promise to one another. We commit ourselves to walking together in our lives of faith. We come into the church to worship God our Savior and listen to him, but we also come to encourage and serve one another. We are accountable for one another as brothers and sisters, spurring each other on in love and in helping others (Hebrews 10:24).

Coming together, listening and speaking

We call this a *congregation*—a word that means being gathered together. We gather together to worship our Lord, both within our church sanctuary and with those who cannot be present in person but join us online. We gather to listen to God's words of grace and hope and wisdom and guidance. That happens not only in worship settings but also in Sunday School, Bible studies, and other educational activities. We gather for fellowship, enjoying one another's company and sharing our joys and sorrows with one another. We connect through visitation to those who are lonely or sick or struggling in any way. We make calls and send cards and messages to fellow members on our care list. We pray for one another—and will bring a prayer shawl as a tangible sign or our encouragement to those experiencing hardships and difficulties.

We don't go through this life alone. We come together as a family of believers, a congregation gathered around the words of life in Christ that give us hope. And we speak to the community around us with the message of hope that fills our hearts.

Serving, giving, and growing

Becoming a member of a congregation is like joining a family. In a family, all have roles and ways they contribute to the life of the household. Each person's abilities and resources are unique, and each participates as they are able. The work of a church involves giving of our time and talents and funds to the collective efforts of our spiritual family. We contribute financial offerings. We volunteer for tasks and ministry opportunities. Some serve on committees. Some serve as musicians or sing in choir. Some take on leadership roles. Some teach and mentor children and youth. As a family, we benefit from serving one another—and often are inspired by the strong testimony of faith we see in those among us who are facing the deepest challenges. They serve us in that way also. As a Christian family, we are always seeking to grow in the depth of our relationship with the Lord and with one another.

Joining in membership

If anyone is ready to join as a member of Christ the King congregation, we are glad to welcome new members at any time. Ask us, and we will provide orientation on membership as best suits you, and discuss how you'd like to be received as a member.

A Word About Volunteering.....

One of the greatest joys of being part of a church family is the opportunity to serve alongside one another. Volunteering is more than filling a need—it's living out our faith in action, using the gifts God has given us to bless others.

Here at Christ the King Lutheran Church we offer several avenues to volunteer, and we want to make sure that everyone is aware of these opportunities. We typically will send a notification email to a specific group or committee to advise of upcoming meetings or events.

Every act of service, big or small, *matters*. Whether it's welcoming guests at the door, teaching a class, helping with outreach events, or supporting behind the scenes, you are helping our church live out its mission and reflect the heart of Jesus.

If you haven't found your place to serve yet, we invite you to prayerfully consider where God might be calling you. Your time, talents, and willingness can make a difference that reaches far beyond Sunday morning.

We are honoring the graduates rather than sending college care packages now. The project group decorates the church and takes down the decorations for Christmas. Also, the tables in the fellowship hall are decorated according to the season. This is a big job, and we are grateful they are willing to serve in this manner. They help with the upkeep of the twenty-five Bible Story Quiet Bags for the worship service. The children use these every weekend when we have worship services. The group is always willing to help with the many small projects that need attending during the year. Anyone is welcome to help with these projects, and we are always open to new ideas for projects to do. This group will be emailed as needed.

<u>Hearthstone Ministries</u>: This group prepares meals and delivers them to members recuperating from surgery, have been ill or hospitalized, or families with a new baby. Thank you to all the members who have so willingly delivered these meals the past twenty-one years. The church may not be notified if someone is hospitalized or in need, so please notify us if you know of a need for someone. If you would like to be part of this ministry please let us know that as well.

<u>Property Committee</u>: We welcome and encourage additional members who have an interest in the care and maintenance of the church property. We meet every other month on the 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm.

<u>Office Help:</u> From time to time there is a need to have someone help out in the church office to prepare bulletins, or special mailings or other projects that may come up, and to answer the phone when there is vacation (WHAT?!?). Please call Mary and let her know if you have a desire to help out in the office.

Support Groups and Other Activities

Caregiver's Support Group: This group is open to anyone who is a caregiver to a family member and would like to join with other caregivers to talk and enjoy some time away. Sometimes we have speakers to address specific topics of interest. We meet every 1st and 3rd Thursday year-round at 1:00pm in the Church Fellowship Hall. This group will be emailed bi-weekly with updates and meeting summaries.

Grief Support Group: This group will usually meet on the third Monday of the month to share and support one another through the cycles of losing a loved one. Let the office know if you would like more information.

Parkinson's Support: This group meets the 2nd Monday of the month in the Fellowship Hall to support those who are suffering from Parkinson's Disease or who may be caring for someone with Parkinson's. Let the office know if you would like more information.

Adoption Group: This group meets the 4th Monday of the month. Let the office know if you would like more information.

Fellowship Ring: From a suggestion made at the last annual meeting, the Fellowship Ring Groups were organized last spring. There are four groups of singles and couples meeting for fellowship of their choice with one another, continuing into 2025. If there is interest in starting more groups we will do so.

As always, one of the best ways to stay informed about church activities and the need for volunteers is through this Newsletter. The newsletter is compiled monthly and mailed both snail mail and digitally through email. It is also posted on our website and on our mobile app. Let us know if you are not getting the newsletter and you wish to, and if you wish to have your newsletter emailed or sent by postal service. There is a group of volunteers who meet monthly to assemble and prepare the newsletter for mailing. Currently we have enough volunteers in the group to manage it quite well but if there is an interest in joining this group please call the office.
