The Hospitality Team was led by Debbie Bennett who has now handed this over to our new Chef, Michael Dibuono. Donations and Membership Specialist, Mary Beth Stoner covers any membership matters and donations as they are received. Karen Barnes, our bookkeeper, serves not only as a staff member but also as a volunteer to help support the ministry launch at Hope South Campus. Sara Lush as the Worship Administrative Assistant keeps everyone connected and informed when it comes to weekly worship matters and special services, including supporting our grieving members as they make plans for burials and memorial services. Lenea Carnes, shares her expertise as a social worker and offers support to address any ministry needs as they arise. The Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry continued to blossom with a dedicated team of volunteers and Debbie Schuettler as the Operations Manager. Pam Caudill, Events Coordinator and Software Specialist, has been behind coordinating many of the events held by and at Hope over this past year. Chris Reed offers a warm welcome at the front desk and staff support.

Building Maintenance Manager Rick Schaaf, together with his team, all make sure that Hope's buildings and grounds are well maintained and in the best shape. This includes Hope Lake Weir Campus and soon our third south site when construction is completed. When it comes to worship, our Music Director, Ken Wood, along with AV Engineer, Jime Eversole, and several music and AV staff, work on coordinating Hope's music ministries so that anyone who comes to worship at Hope experiences the presence of the Lord and is engaged in a meaningful spiritual experience. Our Deacons, Pastors, and Pastoral Care Team are always present to serve the congregation in worship,

visitations, education, prayer and support. This year we also had the joy of Vicar Kjell joining the team.

2024 Annual Report of Pastor Jon-Marc MacLean, Lead Pastor

Family of Hope,

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Throughout scripture, we find the people of God marking significant experiences of grace, mercy, or favor with setting up a memorial. For Jacob's reception of the covenant promise, it was a stone at Bethel. For Jacob and the Hebrews crossing the Jordan into the land of promise, it was a cairn marking the place they forded the river. There was the Temple of Solomon, built to the glory of God and as a place where the people would be reminded of and experience the presence of God in significant ways.



As we marked a significant milestone of 25 years as a congregation throughout the past year, I was brought to remembrance of these markers as we looked back at how God has worked in and through our congregation.

Planting seeds of the gospel in four continents through helping build centers of study and worship with mission support. Helping share the gospel through the printing of the bible in multiple languages in areas difficult to reach due to both geography and persecution. Accompanying the House of Hope through sweat equity, funding, and effusive grace as the men from the program sought freedom from the bondage of addiction and hope for a new path (and eternal life) in Jesus Christ. We built an education and life center at Hope Central Campus so we could expand our ability to both Know Christ and Make Christ Known. When our neighbors at St. John Lutheran wondered about their future and how we might connect, we moved into a future blessed by their strength and faith as a united community in mission. Crafts, food, song, sacrament, worship, and fellowship were shared within our walls and throughout our community as home visits were made and a new worshiping community begun in Recreation Centers to the south as we pursued God's call to minister to the growing edges of The Villages.

All of this was celebrated throughout 2024 even as we continued in our mission. Psalm 133 has come to mind throughout the year as I reflected on the words, "how good and pleasant it is when the people [of God] dwell together in unity!" The truth of this has been borne out in our willingness to embrace new ways of doing ministry both in leadership and in the expansion of our pastoral department to include our first Vicar, Kjell Bakken, and what a tremendous start to what I pray will be a lasting legacy of ministry for both Hope and Vicar Kjell.

There's been many moments over the last 25 years. I've been akin to what Jacob or Joshua did. Moments of celebration and remembrance marking the acts of God within our congregation and within our ministry to the broader community. I've been fortunate enough to celebrate many of these moments with you over the last almost 15 years.

In this past year, there are some monument events that are particularly important to me personally that I would like to reflect on.

At our annual picnic, we had a litany of celebration for 25 years in ministry as an organized congregation. It was a lovely moment that served as a preamble to our reformation celebration in a broader sense on our actual anniversary. We are blessed to have Rev. Nicole Eastwood with us for

our Bishop's office celebrating not only what God is accomplished in and through Hope, but what we've done in collaboration with our sister perishes throughout our synod over a quarter century.

It was a monumental day for me, not only for celebrations, but also because just an hour before that celebration, our daughter Lila was diagnosed with type one diabetes and rushed to Shand's in an emergency situation. As we stood outside for the picnic in a downpour, many of us "remembering our baptism "as we were doused by the rain, I shared with just a few people what was happening and was showered with prayer and compassion even as I was soaked by the water. A reminder of both my physical baptism and what it means for us to share together in the life of Christ and one another (1 Cor. 12:26).

In the days that followed, we received, on a regular basis, words of support, compassion, prayer, and the offer to share in her journey from many members of this congregation, some of which deal with the same diagnosis. It's humbling and an overwhelming blessing when the pastor was called to lead and care for a flock is in turn upheld by the congregation. It is a moment, and this is a season that I will never forget. Not for the reasons of a difficult diagnosis, but because of the generous outpouring of God's grace that I and my family have experienced through all of you. It is one thing to be part of the ministry of this family but to receive God's grace at your giving brought forth a deep and abiding spirit of thanksgiving, admiration, and affirmation.

The most recent moment was our Church Gala. It was marvelous to experience, brothers and sisters in Christ who do not regularly worship alongside one another but share in the same mission and call to community reconnect or connect for the first time at this event. Someone say that "the spirits were high" in a party atmosphere, but I found that the Holy Spirit was moving and I'm so very grateful to those who gave their time, talent, and prayerful work to all our anniversary celebrations, and in particular for this event and all that went into it. Though not everyone could attend, it was a reminder that we are united in mission, in life, and in the celebration of God's grace each and every day.

For all of you who make Christ Known at Hope, and in particular for how you've made his grace known to me and to my family in this celebratory year, I give thanks to God, recognizing that if there's anything better than worshipping together, it's serving together.

As we conclude a year of looking back in thanksgiving, let us boldly look ahead to where God is calling us into ministry with the least, the lost, and the longing. May we share help, hope, and home with the poor and the poor in spirit in ways that turns ashes to beauty, mourning to joy, and despair into praise (Isaiah 61:3) as we embrace anew what it is to be the people of God and the family of Hope.

2024 President's Report from Kristina Giffin

During 2024, members of Hope Lutheran Church continued to demonstrate Hope's stated mission of *Knowing Christ and Making Christ Known* throughout The Villages and surrounding communities.

Actively living out Hope's "Three Campuses, One Church" philosophy, members volunteered at all sites without regard to where they most often worshipped. This commitment to live and minister as one church is bearing fruit for the surrounding communities. Examples include the award-winning Food Pantry at Hope Lake Weir Campus, The Rock, Grief Support, Stephen Ministry, My Time Caregiver Respite, and Angel Tree. Learn more in this Annual Report.



The two called pastors - along with five part-time pastors - conducted seven services each weekend in addition to regularly scheduled Wednesday evening Vespers or Compline services. Among other duties, they engaged in pastoral care visits, teaching classes at H.O.P.E. University, and managing the daily affairs of the church.

Early in June 2024, Pastors Jon-Marc MacLean and Rani Abdulmasih embarked on a Collaborative Leadership Model which enabled Hope's two talented pastors to better address the growing opportunities for ministry and mission at Hope. While each pastor retains defined roles and responsibilities, they will be collaborating on matters to jointly lead the church into the future as Co-Lead Pastors.

Also in June, Hope welcomed Vicar Kjell Bakken. Kjell is a seminary student at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary and is serving a one-year internship with Hope under the guidance of Pastor Jon-Marc and the pastoral team. Kjell also has the support of an outstanding member-mentorship team. Upon completion of internship at Hope, Kjell will have one final semester of seminary before seeking a call in the Florida-Bahamas Synod. Kjell's wife, Macy, is also in ministry serving her call as an ordained Deacon at Luther Springs Camp and Conference Center.

The Council met more than 15 times during 2024. This included the regularly scheduled monthly meetings as well as special council meetings required to move forward around work on Hope's third site, updates to the Constitution of Hope Lutheran Church, and the 2025 Budget.

Additionally, the nine lay members of your Church Council are active in many of Hope's Ministries participating as volunteers at the Food Pantry, serving as readers, worship assistants, communion servers, leading Men of Hope, spearheading social gatherings, and other volunteer opportunities.

Hope Lutheran Church members, pastors and council look forward to 2025 and bringing the dream of Hope South Campus to fruition so that the Gospel can be spread even further.

2024 Annual Meeting Minutes February 4, 2024

A light lunch was served prior to the meeting. Ken Wood led the congregation in the Doxology and the hymn "Praise to the Lord Almighty."

President Kristina Giffin welcomed the congregation.

Meeting was called to order by President Kristina Giffin at 12:03 p.m.

Determination of a Quorum:

Pam Fenn, Council Secretary, confirmed that we had a quorum. The constitution states that a quorum for all Congregational meetings shall be five (5%) percent of the voting members based on the church roll at the end of the prior fiscal year, but not less than fifty (50) voting members. For 2024, a minimum of 101 voting members constitutes a quorum. There were 229 voting members attending the meeting.

Agenda:

Congregants had a hard copy of the agenda before the meeting. Kristina asked if there were any objections to adopting the agenda? There were no objections, the agenda was adopted.

Review of the 2023 Annual Meeting Minutes:

Minutes of Congregational meetings are approved by the congregation. Draft minutes are printed in the Annual Reports and presented in the digital News in the Pews newsletter; the approved/official copies reside on file in the Church office.

Kristina asked the congregants if there were any corrections to the minutes of the February 5, 2023 Annual Congregational Meeting. There were no corrections, the minutes stand approved.

Kristina asked the congregants if there were any corrections to the minutes to the December 17, 2023 Special Congregational Meeting minutes. There being no corrections, the minutes stand approved.

Nomination Committee:

Kristina thanked the members of the nominating committee for their work. The committee spent many hours and meetings to ensure the nomination process was followed in accordance with our constitution. The committee members were Patrick Sawler (chair), Bev Castanien, Jim Morrill.

The open positions for Council are as follows: Council Secretary, 2 members at large (3-year term) and one council at-large member (1 year term to fill a vacancy).

The candidates were given the opportunity to give their remarks to the congregation.

Pastor David Butler offered a prayer for the candidates.

Election of Congregation and Council Officer and Members-at-Large:

The following members were nominated by the Nominating Committee and affirmed by Council to serve as officer and member-at-large of Hope Lutheran Church for the following terms (According to our bylaws, no further nominations could be made) :

Pam Fenn, Council Secretary (3-year term) Raybon Gilbert, Member-at-Large (3-year term) Jim Castanien, Member-at-Large (3-year term) Pam Bixler, Member-at-Large (1 year term)

Kristina announced that there is only one nominee for each position. Therefore, in accordance with C12.02.02.g of Hope's Constitution, **the nominees for council are unopposed and elected by acclimation**.

Election of four (4) voting members to 2024 Synod Assembly

The following members have been nominated to serve as voting members to the 2024 Synod Assembly: Raybon Gilbert, Susan Blomenberg, Joe Guilfoil, Linda Murphy. **The nominees for 2024 Synod Assembly were approved.**

Installation of 2024 Church Council Members and Synod Assembly delegates:

Pastor Jon-Marc MacLean congratulated the newly elected council members and the approved 2024 Synod Assembly delegates. He prayed for guidance for the new council as they conduct the business of Hope Lutheran Church. He charged them with the oath of office and offered God's blessing.

Recognitions and Reports:

Pastor Rani Abdulmasih thanked the outgoing Council members Dave Withers and Rolf Moulton.

Kent Hamdorf, past president, thanked Pastor Bruce Dillman who has given up his call but is no way leaving Hope! We will see him teaching and preaching. He has just reduced his hours.

Pastor Rani Abdulmasih spoke to the congregation about the Evangelism team. He explained what their goals are and how the congregation can be involved.

Pastor Jon-Marc MacLean spoke to the congregation about exciting plans for 2024. This includes the groundbreaking on Hope South and celebrating our 25th anniversary.

Bob Franceski, Business Administrator, gave thanks to our wonderful staff and explained what each team member was responsible for. He reviewed membership statistics and asked us to read the 2023 Annual Report online or request a copy from the office.

Kristina Giffin gave the President's Report on 2023 Council accomplishments and laid the groundwork for the 2024 goals.

2024 Financial Highlights

The Current and Benevolence offerings increased by \$40,000 from 2023 but we were \$260,000 short of the amount we budgeted for 2024. An increase in Loose plate and other General Fund income brought the amount of total General Fund income shortfall from budget down to \$195,000. The total General Fund expenses were held at 89% of the budgeted amount or \$295,000 under budget, resulting in a surplus to the General Fund of \$101,000 for the year. This amount almost offsets the \$125,000 deficit we incurred in 2023 due to unanticipated expenses.

The donations to the Donor Restricted Funds (Food Pantry, The Rock, Scholarships, etc) were up \$11,000 from 2023, enabling these funds to contribute over \$230,000 to the needs of the community.

The Building Fund received approximately \$1,070,000 in donations this year with \$830,000 being for the building project on the South Site. Interest in the amount of \$100,000 was earned on the cash balance in the Building Fund. There were over \$237,000 in capital expenditures from the Building Fund including architectural fees, permits, surveys, consulting fees, etc. The balance of the Building Fund donations were for Debt Service with \$98,000 paid in interest on the Mortgage Loan and \$160,000 paid on the principal balance. The current Loan balance is now down to \$1,410,000.

With the activity on the South Site, we are looking forward to an exciting year in 2025.

2024 closes with many blessings. Our Education Team lost some valuable members this year: Linda Foley, Dave Withers, Carole Rasmussen, and Al Christensen. We thank them for their service to our growth. We have added two new members: Louise MacFarlan and Jana Rahrig.

We continued to enhance equipment in the Education Room at Hope Central Campus. A measurement of our activity includes 25 VBS participants (up from 18), increased classroom, devotion and Bible reading activity to over 13,000 participants (up from 9,250), social media presence and activity with over 32,000 views for Pastor Keiths weekly 'Looking Ahead', my weekly Mustard Seeds, and the Advent Poems that appeared daily during the season.

All our activities have been because of the active members of our congregation as our daily devotion readers, teachers, and instructors of our courses, and in support as volunteers at programs like VBS. Our team is preparing for some new things in 2025 with the addition of a one-day VBS during Lent in conjunction with The Villages Recreation Department and 2 local churches, rolling out of a churchwide small group effort, and a May celebration of Labyrinth Day.

Hospitality

The Hope Lutheran Church Hospitality Team plans, coordinates and prepares all food related events at Hope Lutheran church to include Hope Central Campus as well as Hope Lake Weir Campus and certain hospitality supplies for the Hope South Campus meeting at Everglades. Hope Lake Weir Campus has a regular Sunday refreshment time after service with the first Sunday of the month being Ice Cream Sundae Sunday. Everglades has regular refreshments after each service on Sunday. Hospitality does weekly baking for Everglades (cookies) and Lake Weir (muffins).

In addition to weekly social suppers, MOH and WOH monthly breakfasts, churchwide meeting lunches, we added a lovely picnic under the new pavilion at Hope Lake Weir Campus along with a very successful "Low Country Boil." In 2025, we will offer fish fry events at Hope Lake Weir Campus under the pavilion.

Other events include simple coffee and Danish for certain bible study groups up to and including feeding over 500 folks at the yearly picnic in October. The weekly social suppers average 110 to 175 fed with approximately 20 to 25 volunteers assisting with preparation, cooking, serving, and cleanup. Thanksgiving and Christmas social suppers are 175 to 225 attending the meals. This team also is responsible for preparation of sandwiches for all funerals, pastor installation receptions, group ministry retreats, choir lunch events for many of their weekend special performances, and quarterly STS breakfast meetings, plus Newcomer nights in which our new members can come to our social supper prior to their New Member orientation each quarter. Hospitality also provides cookies and either cider or hot cocoa after each Cantata performance in December.

We joined the CIA team in hosting meals for fundraising for several of our ministry teams' projects such as On Our Own Snack Packs and the Women of Hope support of E Nini Hassee camp.

We have added 10 new volunteers over the year for regular meals and other events.

On December 18th, we offered the first Hope Lutheran Church cookbook! This was a wonderful work of love by so many hospitality members and church members. Kudos to Hope's Marina Ernst for putting it all together in such a beautiful way!

We served approximately 15,000 folks directly at Hope Central Campus and over 9,000 supported at Everglades and Hope Lake Weir Campus during 2024.

As I have always said in the nearly 7 years with the Hope Hospitality Team, the strength of the hospitality team lies in the many dedicated and hard-working volunteers who weekly come in to cook, prep, clean, clear tables, decorate, serve, wash dishes and do whatever is necessary to make the food events successful. We are truly blessed in the talents of those who have owned their own restaurants in the past and have had other extensive cooking experiences. No words can ever thank them properly for what they do in a very hectic and hot environment in the kitchen.

Debbie Bennett retired on December 20th after 6 ³/₄ years in the kitchen. Hope is blessed to have Michael DiBuono take over the responsibilities and offer his expertise of many years of training and food service experiences.

We are always ready to welcome new members to the team as we continue to grow this ministry.

Department of Music Ministries

The Department of Music Ministries continues to be one of the most vibrant and visible ministries within Hope Lutheran Church. With ensembles rooted in all three campuses, well over 100 individuals are regularly making their joyful noise, raising their voices in song as a part of weekly services.

The Voices of Hope, Brotherhood of Harmony, Sisters in Song, Spirit Ringers, SOS Band, as well as individual instrumentalists, song leaders, and anthem soloists all serve to enliven worship gatherings. Twice annually, the Combined Choirs of Hope comes together for special events. CCH is comprised of singers from all campus ensembles, congregants who join up during these particular bi-annual events, as well as a handful of friends from the community who enjoy presenting at Hope for these large occasions. CCH has proven itself an excellent on-boarding tool for bringing new people into Hope, as well as providing a deeper level of volunteer involvement for previously peripheral members.

2024 proved to be uniquely special for the two big events of CCH. The Tenebrae service got a boost from the addition of painter and ordained ELCA pastor, Paul Oman. Paul was commissioned to join us for two consecutive nights of worship and solemnity during the "service of darkness." With such a special opportunity, we presented the service on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Paul created two pieces, both different, that are now displayed in the central and Lake Weir campus buildings. It was truly a "two of a kind" multisensory worship experience.

CCH reconvened in early December to present the Cantata "Messiah—Heaven's Glory." In celebration of Hope's 25th Anniversary, the seasonal choral pieces were woven together for the first time by an original, four-scene narrative play. The addition of live drama to the already festive singalongs, featured solos, and high-energy holiday favorites was a true delight for all who attended.

One final notable event came toward the end of summer. At that time, a group of several volunteer musicians comprised of Hope members, area school children, the VHS Marching Band, Mary Jo MacLean and Dawn Dinome banded together to present a fundraiser concert for Ariana Sankar. Ariana had been a VHS freshman when she was mysteriously struck with a condition that left her paralyzed from the neck down. Through the efforts of the community, we were able to raise enough that she could afford to receive an additional day of physical therapy each week, assisting with her long-term recovery. The nature of and response to this particular need within the surrounding community served to be deeply impactful for all those involved, as well as a first-time opportunity of its kind for several ministry departments within Hope.

As we look forward to another eventful ministry year, we aim to hire additional staff to fulfill campus director positions at both Hope Lake Weir Campus and Hope South Campus. Archive Team

During 2024 the Archive Team continued its work of chronicling the life of Hope Lutheran Church in word and picture. Yearly archives are printed and collected in 3inch binders and stored at Hope Central Campus. Each year's archive (from 1995 to the current year) is also stored in pdf format on the P drive of the Hope server.

Since in 2018 St. John Lutheran merged with Hope, we have been working on digitizing the six 12" x 12" scrapbooks the memory-keepers of St. John prepared for their 95th anniversary, as well as church directories and



other memorabilia. This process is now complete. We have also created a **St John Timeline.pdf** file, covering the years from the founding of St. John in 1922 to their merger with Hope in 2018.

Adobe Acrobate makes it easy to search for a key word or phrase across all the archives in a matter of minutes. Simple instructions for conducting such a global search can be found at the beginning of the 2024 archives: briefly, using the advanced search function, type in a word or phrase; choose **All pdf documents in**; select either the **Archive** or **Archive St John** folder from the drop-down list; and hit the **Search** button.

In celebration of Hope's 25th anniversary, the Archivists created a Hall of Memories in the church narthex on October 4, 2024. On display were:

- two picture boards containing photos of St. John and Hope, their merger into one congregation, and the beginning of the establishment of a third campus in the southern end of The Villages, as well as photos of the nearly 70 missions of Hope;
- Five 6'-8' leatherette scrolls, one displaying the timeline of St. John (1922-1918), and the others detailing the history of Hope from 1975-2024;
- One annual archive each for St. John and Hope;
- Handouts of copies of:
 - o newspaper clippings on loan from a parishoner;
 - o playbills advertising some of the videoclips in the archives;
 - Warped Theological Comics;
 - o instructions for searching the digital archives across multiple files.

Angel Tree Project

Team Mission:

Work with designated local organizations to provide Christmas gifts for needy Children and Seniors in our community. The program is completely dependent upon the generosity of the Hope congregation to provide the gifts and gift cards distributed.

Recent Accomplishments:

Through the overwhelming support of the Hope congregation, the Angel Tree Project provided significant gift packages for over 500 Children and Seniors. That represents a consistent number of those Hope served with Christmas blessings through the Angel Tree project for the last two years.

Organizations with counts served included: Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry Children - 162 Stanton Weirsdale Elementary School -100 Fruitland Park Elementary School - 49 Lady Lake Specialty Care – 133 Buffalo Crossings Assisted Care – 57

Additionally the congregation provided over \$5,000 in gift cards (not assigned to specific individuals) that were utilized to augment gifts if needed and to provide for gifts not returned by the date to be distributed to the Organizations. Some of these gift cards and cash donations were also used to purchase bikes and helmets for children at the Food Pantry. The balance was turned over to the Pastors to be used where needs arise in the future.

The Team worked with designated leads from the Organizations, coordinated volunteer meetings, scheduled coverage for Angels distribution and returns at all three campuses, worked with Hope Staff for communications to Hope members and to schedule facility needs, and tracked all Angels to assure complete coverage of all commitments Hope had made to the groups served.

A special acknowledgment also is due to the team of nearly 50 volunteers from all campuses who assisted throughout the project. The Team Leaders are already working on recommendations for 2025 and are looking forward to serving as Angel Tree Project Leaders again.

Blessing of the Animals

The team's mission is to provide a pleasant and meaningful experience for members of the community that wish to have their pets (no snakes) blessed. The event is in recognition of the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, the Roman Catholic Church's patron saint of animals.

The 2024 Blessing of the Animals was held on Saturday, October 5, 2024. Pastor Marc presided over the event. More than 111 pet owners and 89 registered pets were in attendance. The Registration Team mentioned that quite a few attendees



had not registered. In addition, four vendors and their teams provided merchandise for purchase along with several bringing pets that represented their organizations.

Over 30 volunteers worked at the event greeting attendees, registering the pets, handing out pet scarves and blessing collar tags, taking pet photos, providing cookies donated by Hope members along with water and soft drinks donated by the Hospitality Department. About 12 volunteers helped set up the chairs and tables and pop-up tents for the event following the annual church picnic. Music was provided by the Music Department, and the sound system was set up by the AV Department. All advertising, event flyer design, and donation wheel prizes were provided by the Hope Communications Department. Shortly after the event, pet photos were sent to the pet owners.

Our prize wheel collected \$279 in donations for pet supplies for Hope's Food Pantry.

Many positive comments were received from attendees, vendors, and staff members about the volunteers, the blessing ceremony and the fun fair-like atmosphere. The Blessing of The Animals event is definitely a very positive ministry.

Disaster Preparedness and Response Committee

Disaster Preparedness Committee

The Committee meets regularly and records the following accomplishments for 2024.

- 1. Updated the Hope Lutheran Church Disaster Preparedness and Response Plan to include recommendations from Marion and Sumter County officials.
- 2. Quarterly checks of all facilities have been initiated to confirm emergency exits are clear, protective systems follow inspection requirements, emergency equipment is available, etc. AEDs and First Responder Bags are checked monthly.
- 3. Provided security officer from Marion County for the Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry. The total cost for security officer coverage at Hope Central Campus services, Hope Lake Weir Campus services, and Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry is approximately \$50,000.
- 4. Established a prioritized budget and managed to approved budget.

A key objective of this committee is to make sure Hope Lutheran Church is fully compliant with safety and security guides and regulations. The following agencies guide our decisions:

- National Fire Protection Agency
- Federal Emergency Management
- Occupational Health and Safety Administration
- American Heart Association
- Marion County Emergency Management
- Sumter County Emergency Management

The Disaster Preparedness Response Committee will meet quarterly in 2025 and continue reviews and after-action reports of incidents, make updates to the Disaster Preparedness and Response Plan, and prioritize needs of the church in the event of emergencies (generators, additional security cameras, etc.).

Endowment

The Constitution of Hope Lutheran Church mandates an Endowment Committee. Its purpose is to administer the *earnings* of the funds entrusted in perpetuity to the Hope/St. John Endowment Funds. The work of this committee is accomplished by making grants awarded for religious, charitable, benevolent, and educational purposes of Hope Lutheran Church including capital improvements. As of November 30, 2024, the Endowment Fund balances were \$548,398.62. This includes \$121,803.98 for the Theological Education Fund established in 2022 for grants to individuals seeking theological training. This year a \$50,000 contribution was made to this fund. The fund is now fully funded, and the earnings are available for granting.


The Committee received very few grant requests this year. In 2024, only one grant was awarded to Zion Eversole for \$500 to participate in a mission trip.

The educational endeavors of the Committee cannot be measured until bequests are received. Members of the Committee pray that congregation members will continue to consider the on-going mission of Hope through their legacy gifts.

Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry

Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry is a thriving ministry serving Marion County residents. On January 4, 2024, we were the first Marion County pantry to become computerized. The Pantry served 6,917 households, 23,377 individuals, giving out 18,364 bags of food, meat and produce.

The ages of the neighbors are: 0-5 8%; 6-17 23%; 18-49 37%; 50-59 11%; 60-64 6%; 65+ 15%.

Without the generous support of the congregation, clubs, organizations and neighbor gatherings, the Pantry could not



help so many people. The Pantry is extremely grateful for all the volunteers who work selflessly, logging 8,009 hours in 2024.

Debbie Schuettler, the Pantry's Operation Manager is dedicated on watching food costs and has worked with Second Harvest in obtaining discounted prices on groceries, meats and donated produce. This alone has saved the Pantry a significant amount of money. She has implemented a "choice" area where neighbors can choose items instead of just adding it to their bags. This has saved over \$9,500. We also provide hot dogs, pet food, diapers, incontinence underwear, and hygiene products. Panera Bread in Sumter Landing and the Southern Trace Publix donate breads and pastries. Shared Harvest, a local farm, now operated by VHA, donates freshly picked items.

The Pantry also provided special meals for the holidays. During the Shoe & Backpack Drive, we gave away 133 pairs of shoes and backpacks along with donated school supplies. For Christmas, 194 food pantry children received gifts from the Angel Tree Program and individual donations made directly to the pantry.

The Pantry is grateful for your continued support.

First Visit & Inactive Calling

This year, I placed 175 calls to inactive members. I left messages for 154, and was unable to reach 41. To visitors, I placed 61 calls and left messages for 18.

I have enjoyed being responsible for this the last several years. Many who had not been in church for a while really appreciated the call of concern. I do hope that this continues to be done, typically I have called individuals if they had not attended for 6 weeks.

Hope for the Future Scholarship

This exciting new ministry reaches out to the community by connecting with our surrounding schools offering a scholarship to high school graduates. Over the past four years, we have given out a total of 45 scholarships to students who were selected by the review committee. The joy of seeing young students celebrate their accomplishments with the family of Hope creates a true sense of community. The unique aspect of this ministry is that it still offers the opportunity for young graduates to receive a mentor from Hope if they so desire. A mentor is someone who commits to the journey with the young graduates, offering spiritual support as well as practical advice in their field when available. We have such an



amazing gift at Hope with so many who are willing to share their experiences and gifts with others.

Below are some of the criteria set to qualify for Hope's scholarship:

- GPA of 2.5 or greater verified by your high school
- Plan to attend an accredited college, university or a trade school
- Must be a full-time student if in college or taking the prescribed course of study if in a technical school.
- Must reside in the Florida counties of Lake, Marion or Sumter and must be graduating from one of the following high schools:
 - The Villages Charter High School
 - Lake Weir High School
 - Belleview High School
 - Leesburg High School
 - Wildwood High School

Five schools in total are now part of this list. This is enabling us to reach out to various parts of the community.

Men of Hope

Our first meeting was held on September 12, 2024 and was attended by 37 people. This was a men and women's meeting, as the breakfast topic highlighted a presentation by our two Co-Lead Pastors. The presentation by the pastors explained the New Collaborative Leadership Model adopted by the Church Council. Pastor Jon-Marc MacLean and Pastor Rani Abdulmasih co-manage the staff and congregation of Hope Lutheran Church with Council oversight.

The Men of Hope have established their primary tenets to be service which establishes a bible study from time to time, fellowship, and group discussion. This is accomplished via a guest speaker program, involving member life experiences, growing participant faith, and seeking wisdom and encouragement from one another.

One of the group's new activities was to use Men of Hope funds to support a small school in Haiti over and above Synod support to assist a small school remain viable and safe for children that was subject to the ravages of gang activity and disruption. Men of Hope donated \$2000 with a Hope Lutheran Church match of \$2000 to the Haiti Scholars School in Mariana. This was a one- time donation to meet our global ministry project. Men of Hope will next consider a local ministry to support. Research is ongoing for that project.

The group continues to have joint meetings with the Women of HOPE and will participate in the annual Christmas Music Program as well on or about December 12, 2024.

Men of Hope have 40 men on the e-mail roster. Participation runs about 28 on any given meeting. Our last meeting this cycle will be May 8,2025. We meet the 2nd Thursday of the month at 8:00 AM for one hour. Breakfast is currently \$7.00. The meeting is adjourned promptly at 9AM. Church membership is NOT required. Love INC (Love In the Name of Christ) is a partnership between many local churches. This organization is a clearing house for those in need and will assist to find the correct service agencies. Love INC provides a faith-based environment for all those that are helped. Hope Lutheran has volunteers working in many areas of their ministry to the local community.

Journey INC (Journey In the Name of Christ) In partnership with Love INC, we provide space and volunteers for a Tuesday night weekly event that provides a meal, mentoring, adult, and children's classes designed to break the cycle of generational poverty and bring the unchurched to Christ.

The Rock at Lake Weir Middle School. The rock is a Hope Lutheran Church / School partnership that provides a food, clothing, hygiene products and school supply pantry in the school to share the Love of Christ with needy children in the school and their families.

World Mission Prayer League (WMPL) which provides financial and spiritual support for missionaries.

Christians in Action (CIA) We Liaison with the CIA group to support and promote social and outreach activities.

My Time for Free Time

Caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's or another cognitive impairment is a demanding, 24/7 responsibility. **My Time for Free Time,** a ministry of Hope Lutheran Church, offers a much-needed respite for caregivers through a lively, engaging, and free weekly program.

A Growing Need

Globally, over 55 million people live with dementia, with nearly 10 million new cases annually. Projections estimate this number will rise to 139 million by 2050. In the U.S., 6.9 million individuals are living with Alzheimer's, a number expected to exceed 16 million by mid-century. Alarmingly, deaths from Alzheimer's have tripled since 2000. In The Villages, approximately 10% of residents are affected by Alzheimer's or related disorders, underscoring the critical need for caregiver support.

Our Mission and Program

My Time for Free Time supports caregivers by providing a space where their loved ones, affectionately called "My Timers," can participate in enriching



activities. Meeting every Thursday from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m., the program includes exercise, arts and crafts, games, singing, snacks, and entertainment. With one-on-one care and a nurse on-site, participants receive personalized attention in a safe, welcoming environment.

Monthly educational sessions for caregivers provide additional support and resources.

2024 Highlights

Community Engagement: The program is promoted by the local Alzheimer's Association, area neurologists, and the Sumter County Sheriffs Office's Dementia Tracking Initiative.

Enrichment Activities: Custom music programs, sing-alongs, and dancing promote joy and physical well-being.

Growing Impact: Serving 54 caregivers and their loved ones, the program thrives with the help of 64 dedicated volunteers.

Active Mind Emporium: A free store offers games, art supplies, and more, donated by the community.

Celebrations: A festive Christmas party for 140 attendees caps the year with music, prizes, and entertainment.

My Time for Free Time continues to make a difference, offering caregivers a lifeline while enriching the lives of those with cognitive challenges. If you are interested in participating or volunteering, we welcome you to join our community.

<u>On Our Own</u>

On Our Own's mission is to provide fun, friendship and fellowship to anyone who is single, widowed, divorced or a caregiver whose spouse is not able to be socially active. We meet on the second Wednesday of the month in the fellowship hall at Hope Central campus from 10:30 to noon. We have a short business meeting, plan future activities, have a speaker or entertainer, or play a fun game. We try to get together as well for outside events, concerts and bus trips, and currently have a Caribbean cruise planned for 2025.

Our major service project is to provide 100 to 120 "snack packs" each month to a local elementary school, currently Stanton-Weirsdale Elementary School. We pack 11-12 individual items into a gallon size storage bag (e.g, peanut butter, jelly, drink, pudding, applesauce, etc.) which the school distributes to needy children so that they have food to hold them over for the weekend. We do this packing at 9:00 a.m., prior to our business meeting, in the narthex at Hope Central. There is a bin in the information hallway if you would like to donate to this project. We can use most items, as long as they are individual portions and nothing in glass containers.

We also prepare 30 gift bags each year which are distributed by our pastors to shut-ins from our congregation at Christmas.

Some are dealing with family drug problems. Some live in the forest. Many do not know Christ. Hope Lutheran Church Volunteers operate The Rock at Lake Weir Middle School from 11 am until 1:30 pm on Mondays, Wednesdays. and Fridays. School staff open The Rock for the children whenever there is a need.

The Rock provides so much more than food, clothing, shoes, hygiene products, and school supplies. Hope volunteers are positive role models that encourage and share the love of Christ with children in need. Every day one of the volunteers shares a Love Story with the other volunteers. Below is a report that will give you an idea of a day at The Rock.

We helped 42 learners today. One girl wanted to give her mother a present for her birthday. She said, "Mom could not get me anything for my birthday, but that is ok because we have no money. I really want to give her something."

Another girl said she lives in a tiny camper with her mom, her mom's boyfriend, and 5 children. One boy that comes to get three pair of socks each week. (He lives in a tent and there is no place to wash clothing.)

There is another boy who lives in a 3-bedroom home with 7 adults and 13 children. They are keeping relatives from being homeless. Many of these students are third and fourth generation poverty. They have no positive role models. They do not know that things can be better.

Our Love Story today is about a young lady. It was her first time visiting the Rock. She showed up wearing a pair of torn jeans and a thin silk camisole. She wanted a jacket to cover herself so she would not get in trouble for wearing inappropriate clothing to school. We picked out a hoodie and a jacket. She tried them on and wanted to take the jacket. When we told her that she should take both, her whole face lit up. When we asked her if she would like some sweatpants, she said her jeans were fine. We assured her that she could have the sweatpants as well. She was so thankful and left the Rock with a beautiful smile!

I do not know how some of the children can carry heavy grocery bags home. We had a first-time visitor sent to us before we opened. Desiree was sent by the social worker for clothing. We helped her find sweatpants, a shirt, and a hoodie. She came back during her lunch period and picked up additional items. Now that she has experienced the love from our volunteers, I am sure she will be back often.

Thank you all! We are leaving a legacy of Hope that will be remembered long after we are gone. You are truly people of Hope! You give hope, support, and encouragement to over 100 children every week!

Hope Stephen Ministers

"Christ Caring for People through People"

Stephen Ministers are trained members of our congregation that help hurting individuals deal with difficult feelings and work through complicated situations. The hurt can be anything -- a terminal diagnosis, grief, upcoming surgery, financial difficulties, family challenges, loneliness, or questions of faith. A Stephen Minister offers a listening ear, a caring heart, and creates a safe, confidential, and non-judgmental space to provide one-to-one emotional and spiritual support.

Initial training for new Stephen Ministers was again hosted by Hope Lutheran for the local network of eight churches. The required 50 hours was conducted by the network Stephen Leaders every Saturday for 10 weeks. Thirteen Stephen Ministers were trained and two from Hope were formally commissioned. The new ministers brought our total active to 17. Throughout the year, 31 individuals benefitted formally from our distinctively Christian care and many others informally received the attention and love of Christ from a Stephen Minister during a time of need.

The series of four booklets, <u>Journeying through Grief</u>, is a wonderful resource sent on a specific cycle to assist the grieving process. In the past year, 107 booklets were mailed to members and friends who lost a loved one.

Additionally, the Stephen Ministers supplied more than 60 <u>Cancer</u>, <u>Now What?</u> books to the congregation. The cancer book is an outstanding resource that contains practical, down-to-earth information to help deal with the diagnosis of cancer or another life-

altering medical situation. Cancer books are available at all three campuses for a suggested \$10 donation placed in the church offering.

Providing Christian Care is a unique and rewarding ministry. Christ cares for people through us. What a wonderful way "To Make Christ Known." Please contact me if you feel called to learn more about our Stephen Ministry.
