

## **LESSON SNAPSHOT**

#### **BOTTOM LINE:**

With God's example, kids can be givers.

#### **OBJECTIVE:**

Kids will learn that they can give to God and to other people.

#### **KEY PASSAGE:**

John 6:1-13. Jesus feeds five thousand people.

#### **MEMORY VERSE:**

"Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." - 1 Timothy 4:12 (NIV)

#### SUMMARY:

Kids can do big things for God and with God's help. When the crowd of 5,000 people grew hungry, Jesus was determined to feed them. A young boy in the crowd gave his lunch of 2 fish and 5 loaves of bread to help Jesus. It might not have seemed like much, but Jesus was able to transform the boy's offering into a meal that fed the multitude.

#### SIMPLE PRAYER:

Dear God,

With your help, every kid can do great things. We offer all that we have to you and ask you to use it for your kingdom and your glory.

In Jesus' name, Amen



## **MEMORY VERSE**

"Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." - 1 Timothy 4:12 (NIV)

"Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young. Set an example for the believers in what you say and in how you live. Also set an example in how you love and in what you believe. Show the believers how to be pure." - 1 Timothy 4:12 (NIrV)

#### LARGE GROUP:

Choose four kids who think they know the verse. Line them up on stage. Have the kids recite the memory verse, with each kid saying one word, starting left to right. When you get to the kid on the right, go back to the kid on the far left. Keep going until they get through the whole verse.

#### **SMALL GROUP:**

Have the kids create a picture puzzle that spells out the memory verse. Write the memory verse on a piece of paper. Give the kids 3-5 minutes to decorate the page with something that reminds them of the memory verse. Then cut the page into puzzle pieces, mix the pieces up and let the kids put the puzzle back together.

**CHARACTER BREAKDOWN:** 3M, 1F

#### **CHARACTERS:**

HORTON: Thanks, guys. I feel just like a kid again.

### **OBJECT LESSON OR KIDS SERMON**

#### **ITEM NEEDED:**

Fishing net (a fishing pole will work if you can't find a net)

Has anyone here ever gone fishing? Did you catch any fish? How many? How big?

Give kids a chance to answer.

Those are some impressive stats. How were you able to catch so many? Whenever I go fishing I never catch any. The fish all swim away when I jump into the water. And then when I stick my hands under the water and try to grab a fish, it always swims away before I can lift it up. What am I doing wrong?

Let the kids set you straight on how to fish. Show the kids the net.

The method I described for catching fish isn't a very good one, is it? Catching fish with your own hands takes a lot of time and energy – and you don't end up with very many fish to show for it. It makes a lot more sense to use a fishing pole, or even better a fishing net. It's a whole lot less effort and you catch a lot more fish.

Each of you kids have unique strengths and talents. But if you only use them to make yourself look good or try to accomplish things on your own, it's like trying to catch fish with your bare hands.

You need Jesus. When you give your strengths and talents and stuff to Jesus, and ask him to work through you, it's like using a net. You'll catch boatloads of fish and you don't have to work so hard to make things happen.

Give everything you have to Jesus. That's something each of us can do, no matter if we're old or young, big or small.



## LARGE GROUP GAME

#### **LEFTOVERS**

#### **ITEMS NEEDED:**

6 - Buckets Bean bags

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Place the buckets in a line on the ground, one foot apart.

Choose 1 kid to play. Have the player stand so that he is 1 foot from the first bucket, 2 feet from the second bucket, and so on. From a standing position, he needs to throw leftovers (bean bags) into each of the 6 buckets. Missed tosses are returned to the player. If the player can successfully toss a bean bag into each bucket, in 60 seconds or less, he wins.

Have multiple kids play as your time permits.

#### **VARIATION:**

For younger kids, use fewer buckets or buckets that are larger in size (creating a bigger target). You may also extend or eliminate the time limit.

#### WHAT'S THE POINT?

When Jesus used a boy's lunch to feed the five thousand, there were enough leftovers to fill 12 baskets. God can take the little we give him and make much from it.



## LARGE GROUP LESSON

#### **BOTTOM LINE:**

With God's example, kids can be givers.

#### **OBJECTIVE:**

Kids will learn that they can give to God and to other people.

#### **KEY PASSAGE:**

John 6:1-13. Jesus feeds five thousand people.

#### INTRO

"But you're just a kid." That's a phrase that gets tossed around a lot. It's means that you're too young or too inexperienced or too small to do certain things.

For the last few weeks, though, we've seen that kids can do much more than some adults give them credit for. The Bible is filled with tales of kids doing amazing things. We saw through the story of David and Goliath that a kid can win great victories. We learned through the story of young Miriam that a kid can help and protect others. And 8 year old King Josiah proved that a kid can even be a great leader.

These kids were able to do great things because they had one thing in common: they turned to God and let God use them. They gave what they had to God. He took their little and transformed it into a lot.

The last story in our series is all about giving God everything that we have and watching him make it into something great. Let's see what Jesus did with what one small boy gave him:

#### **READ John 6:1-13.**

#### MAIN POINT

A great crowd had gathered to hear Jesus preach and hoped to see him perform some miracles. The Bible says there were five thousand men there.

### LARGE GROUP LESSON

There were also women and children there – so the total number of people might have been around ten thousand! That's a lot of people to hear Jesus preach.

These people had left their towns and come to the mountainside to hear Jesus. As time went by, these folks grew hungry. But the people were in the middle of nowhere and they had not brought food with them. Jesus loves people. He wanted to provide for them. He decided to feed them. Remember, there are about ten thousand people there. That's a lot of people to feed.

Jesus had already proven that he had great power. He could open the eyes of the blind. After meeting Jesus, lame people were able to pick up their mats and walk. Jesus had even raised people from the dead. Jesus surely had the power to perform a miracle for this hungry crowd. But the question was, how would he do it?

There was a boy in the crowd. We don't know much about him. We don't know if he was there alone, or if his family was there too. We don't know which town he had come from. Was this his first time hearing Jesus preach? Had he seen Jesus perform miracles before? We don't know.

But here's what we do know. This boy had food. He had brought provisions for the trip to the mountainside. As far as we know, he was the only person in that crowd of thousands who had planned ahead.

The other thing we know about the boy is that he was willing to give what he had to Jesus. It wasn't much – five small loaves of bread and two small fish – but he gave it willingly. And as we see, Jesus took that small offering and transformed it into something great: enough food to feed the entire crowd. There were even leftovers, enough to fill twelve baskets.

#### **DRIVE IT HOME:**

Each of us – young or old, big or small – have something to offer. It's different for everyone. Some of us are good singers. Some of us have a talent for hospitality, which is being friendly and making people feel welcome. Some of us are good speakers.

Regardless of your gift, you can give it to God. If you're a singer, sing praises to God. If you're hospitable, use it to comfort hurting people and share the love of Jesus with those who need it. If you're a good speaker, tell people the good news about Jesus.

You might think that what you have to offer isn't much, but that's okay. That boy didn't have an incredible amount of food, but he gave it gladly to Jesus. It was Jesus who made it into something great. If you offer up your time, talents, and stuff to Jesus, he will do great things with it. Much more than you could do alone.

# LARGE GROUP LESSON

When people see the amazing ways that God is using you for his kingdom, they won't believe their eyes. They turn to each other and say, "How is that possible? You're just a kid."

#### **CLOSE WITH A SIMPLE PRAYER**

Dear God.

With your help, every kid can do great things. We offer all that we have to you and ask you to use it for your kingdom and your glory.

#### **ICEBREAKER**

#### **MEMORY VERSE ACTIVITY**

1 Timothy 4:12

Cut out the shapes of "loaves and fishes" from construction paper. Have a relay race, where runners carry their loaf of bread or fish from one end of the space to an empty basket on the other end, then return to tag the next runner.

## **SMALL GROUP DISCUSSION (3-5TH)**

#### **ICEBREAKER**

If Jesus had used your lunch that day, what would the crowds have been eating?

#### MEMORY VERSE ACTIVITY

1 Timothy 4:12

Have the kids create a picture puzzle that spells out the memory verse. Write the memory verse on a piece of paper. Give the kids 3-5 minutes to decorate the page with something that reminds them of the memory verse. Then cut the page into puzzle pieces, mix the pieces up and let the kids put the puzzle back together.

#### SMALL GROUP GAME/ACTIVITY

Provide magazines, paper, scissors, and glue sticks. Have kids create collages depicting stuff that they can give to God.

Quiz your child on this week's memory verse:




What you need to know:


