

LEAD SCHOOL COURSE 2 | SYLLABUS

PURPOSE

The purpose of The Basics of Bible Teaching is to give students a framework to go from their exegetical process to effectively communicating the truth of God's Word to others. Once we have discerned the authorial intent of the text to the first audience, we can now begin placing the text in God's big story (i.e. theological reflection). Then we are able to discern what timeless gospel principles should be applied to our own lives. At this juncture, we then turn towards how to effectively disciple others with the Word that we have rightly studied and applied (i.e. how to teach the Word). This takes diligent care to follow the main argument and logical flow of the text, while at the same time bringing God's Truth to your particular context.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Each student should learn how to go from discerning the main argument of the text (i.e. the exegetical process) to winsomely communicating that main argument to a particular audience today. Along the way, they must learn how to rightly connect their text with the rest of the Word (i.e. theological reflection) and appropriately apply the Word to their own hearts (i.e. a Word formed conscience). Then they will learn the basics of how to stay tied to the text, even as you communicate the text to a present day audience. This communication of the Word is not merely to inform but to persuade, as God's Truth is always intended to produce a faith-filled result.

- Reading You will be asked to read and thoughtfully engage with an article to
 discuss in class. We encourage you to take notes or underline what you agree or
 disagree with in the article so we can discuss it together.
- Writing Most weeks you will write a paragraph (100-150 words) interacting
 with your reading or Word-work. We will provide the specific question to answer
 in your writing and will give you feedback.
- **Word-work** Each week you will answer specific questions about a passage of Scripture. Most weeks you will discuss your work in your small group.
- Form for Homework Every week you will fill out a form sent through GroupMe to turn in your homework.
