

LEAD SCHOOL COURSE 3 | SYLLABUS

PURPOSE

The purpose of The Basics of Systematic Theology is to give students a grasp of how faithful exegesis of the Word produces a right and good systematic theology. Systematic theology that is rooted in careful exegesis serves as a grid and guardrails in our study of the Word. As we *rightly divide the Word of Truth*, we begin to see how God's Word fits perfectly together.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Each student should learn how faithful exegesis contributes to a careful systematic theology. Since systematic theology is rooted in the exegesis of the Word (not the other way around), our systematic theology should always be maturing because we are continuing to better understand God's Word. By the end of this course, each student should have a better grasp of what it means to have a theological method. Each student should also have a taste of each major theological topic. Fundamentally, each student should be thoroughly convinced through both the instructions and course work that systematic theology is the product of careful exegesis in the text.
