


MARK HAVERDINK, PASTOR OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

KINGDOM PARTNERSHIP

Well, let's start with the obviously-necessary opening round of Dutch Bingo. To which of the Haverdinks from First Reformed Church are you related? Unless there are more that I'm not aware of, I believe all of them! Aaron & Amanda Haverdink are my brother and sister-in-law, Gene Haverdink is my grandfather, and Mark & Suzanne Haverdink are my first cousins once removed.

Tell us about the Navigators. What is the history of this organization, and how did it come to Lincoln? The Navigators was founded in 1933 by Dawson Trotman while he was in the Navy (which is where the organization got its name). He was struck by the ministry that both Jesus and Paul modeled of ministering to the few to reach the many. What resulted was a multiplying, generational model of discipleship - disciples making disciples making disciples... So the focus of The Navigators has always been "To know Christ, make Him known, and help others do the same." In 1959 they launched a collegiate ministry on the University of Nebraska - Lincoln, which is where we serve! Now they are on thousands of campuses, military bases, cities, and impoverished regions worldwide.

How did you recognize God was inviting you into this ministry? Was there a moment in time that clinched it for you? For me (Jonathan), it started when a Navigator staff person named Jon read through 2 Corinthians 5 with me as a student. The idea that being a new creation in Christ (v17) lined up with the reality that "Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ..." (v20) was a fresh motivation to participate in God's mission. Over a few years of collegiate ministry as students, Erin and I met, dated, and got engaged. We began praying about how God might be leading us to participate in His mission after college, and we couldn't help but recognize the impact that Jon and other people in The Navigators had on our lives during college as well as the timeliness and strategy of college ministry. We prayed for God to open the door to collegiate ministry with The Navigators, and He did!

What does your schedule of ministry look like? Is it pretty consistent, or do you find that you are always working on new and different projects? Each part of the year is different. During the first few weeks of the Fall semester, we are spending most of our time meeting new students, sharing the Gospel, hosting social events, setting up Bible study groups, etc. Then we shift to equipping student leaders for discipleship, depth in God's Word, and missional living. During breaks we offer training programs, short-term mission trips, and Bible studies.

How has 2020 looked different for you? Has COVID made a big difference, small difference, or no difference at all to how you function? We are thankful that God's heart for lost people and life-to-life discipleship has not changed at all. Our methodology has been significantly impacted, but the heartbeat has remained the same. When everything went virtual in March, most students moved home. Our summer mission trips were canceled, but we continued meeting virtually for discipleship, Bible studies, Nav Night (our weekly large group gathering), and our 8-week summer training program. This Fall we have continued with our virtual Nav Night, but we have begun to reincorporate socially distanced in-person Bible studies and discipleship. It has been an emotionally challenging time for students, but we are thankful to see that many of them are continuing to grow spiritually and live missionally.

What are you most looking forward to in ministry? How is God opening new doors? We are excited to send a married couple that we work with to launch The Navigator ministry at the University of Nebraska - Kearney next Fall. This is bittersweet for us because we have worked together for almost 5 years and have become dear friends. We can't wait to see how God uses them to raise up lifelong disciplemakers at UNK!

What are you praying for right now? How can we join you in asking for God's blessing on your work? Please pray that students would abide deeply in Christ and live missionally over Christmas break. Normally Christmas break is 3 weeks long, but this year, due to COVID, the break is 8 weeks long! This means almost triple the threat for stagnancy, backsliding, loneliness, and depression. However, it also means almost triple the opportunity for spiritual growth, rest, meaningful fellowship, and missional living among family.
