

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT

Please read John 21:1-18

Have you ever experienced at great celebration and afterwards, after the dust settled, you were left wondering what's next. In the gospel of John, we have one such story. If you read John chapter 20, you can almost hear a clear summation and closing of the gospel but then there chapter 21 which is our text for this month. The disciples just witnessed the ultimate power of God to overcome the grave. They had seen with their own eyes his resurrection twice now and then... they go fishing??? Often times when you are stuck not knowing your next steps, psychologist have shown that you will go back to what you know best, your own default mode if you will. For Peter, that was fishing.

Overwhelmed with the prospect of the past weeks, Peter invites his brother to go back to where he started.

The problem with going back to beginning is; Peter doesn't seem to be a great fisherman in the first place. In the gospel Luke, we hear of Jesus' first interaction with Peter after a bad night of fishing. In the other two canonical gospels, Matthew and Mark, we meet Peter and Andrew at the sea side mending nets. None of the stories show he had any success as a fisherman. Not having a vision or direction of what's next, Peter went back to his old skill level and not the Fish of Men that he had been training for.

It's interesting that Peter and the disciples struggles until a man on the shoreline speaks up. Jesus gives simple, one step at a time, instructions. They cast nets and their nets are overwhelmed with the catch. Its then that Peter sees and understands that the Doer of Impossible Things is leading him. It's when the disciples listen that clarity seeps back in.

Excited and elated to have a direction, Peter was unashamed of the boat he found himself in, his smell after a failed night of fishing or even his nakedness. He just knows his next steps aren't in the boat. Jumping out of the boat is often scary, but for Peter, going backwards was scarier. And Jesus had more in store for Peter once he got to shore.




M.O.M. - The Mission of Moms Bible Study







After getting to shore, the disciples hauled in all the fish and counted them. In verse 11, scripture tells us they caught 153 large fish. This number is oddly specific.

After a deep dive into that number you find that this number correlated to number of regions/nations in the known world when the gospel was written. Jesus was going to draw the world to himself with these Fishers of Men. Peter didn't fully understand the extent of the mission nor his impact in spreading the kingdom of God to world. He was going to be a part of God's redemption to every corner of the world. But how could he? The man that betrayed him around the fire light the night before Jesus was crucified.

However, Peter, was now back in his element though; back at the feet of the master, around the table with his brothers. Jesus knew what was going on in his head and heart. Jesus asked him, "Simon son of John, do you love (agape) me?" Firstly, he doesn't call him Peter, The Rock. Jesus calls him by the name he had before he followed him This probably hit Peter hard. Secondly, noted the word for love Jesus uses here. In Greek, the word He uses is Godly love. The highest form of love that is selfless, sacrificial and unconditional. This love is persisting regardless of circumstance. Peter's response is not what you would expect. Peter responds with "Yes Lord, you know I love (phileō) you." This Greek word for love is used for brotherly love. This is familiar type of love you give and receive in families or relationship that are as close as blood. Jesus response is puzzling at first.

Jesus' hears Peter's declaration of love, which loves that which is familiar and known, and responds with "then feed my lambs." This is closely tied with fish they just caught. The lambs, infants in this newly formed relationship sealed with Jesus' blood on the cross, are not just for the familiar ones, but whole world. Love them too. Jesus asked again. Simon son of John, do you love (agape) me? Again, Peter answer, "Yes Lord, You know I love (phileō) you." Jesus then says, "then tend my Sheep." Tending means serving them, caring and meeting their needs. This mean giving of oneself selflessly, sacrificially and regardless of the circumstances. Yes, even the Romans/ Gentiles/ Samaritans and Jews that that killed Jesus. The resurrection has taken place but next steps are just as hard.

Jesus looks into Peter's eyes, perhaps like he did the night he betrayed him, "Simon, son of John, do you love (phileō) me." Verse 17 says that Peter was hurt by this comment. Had Jesus given up on him? Is that why he used that type of love? No! Loving people who are unfamiliar has a way of changing you. Lovingly tending to people that are not close to you have a habit of transforming you. Peter answers in his hurt, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love (phileō) you." "Then feed my sheep." Jesus is saying here that they will become as family if you heed my instructions. Truly Love them.

Peter then is given an image of what his next steps will look like in verse 18. This love will take you places you don't want to go. This mission will take you to dangerous places; to far off regions. Just as I have loved you (agape), You will love (agape) until you Love (phileō) those I love (agape) and gave myself for. Now that's a step by step instruction for the church's mission today.


Jesus calls us to be fishers of men. He has given us love and grace that is simply unimaginable and even impossible by the world's standards. He also calls us to change our default setting to God's Love and grace for ourselves and others, all the while challenging us to be transformed by it. Peter, along with the other disciples, ended up leading the church to the ends of the earth with the message of God's death and resurrection. They used these simple instructions in this story at the end of the Gospel of John to do so. I'm just saying, Jesus was on to something.








ASPIRE WOMEN'S EVENT


