



Big Idea

Key Themes

- Heaven as God's dwelling with humanity, not humanity escaping earth.
- God's power redeems what sin has corrupted—even cities, cultures, and people.
- There is an absence of chaos, evil, pain, and death in God's eternal city.
- Our present mission: living as ambassadors of reconciliation now.

Tips

- Allow space for both hope and discomfort, especially around themes of judgment and exclusion.
- Keep bringing the conversation back to God's character: redemption, holiness, justice, and love.
- Encourage participants to connect the future vision of God's city with their daily lives and relationships.
- Encourage participants to allow their previous images of Heaven to be radically redefined.
