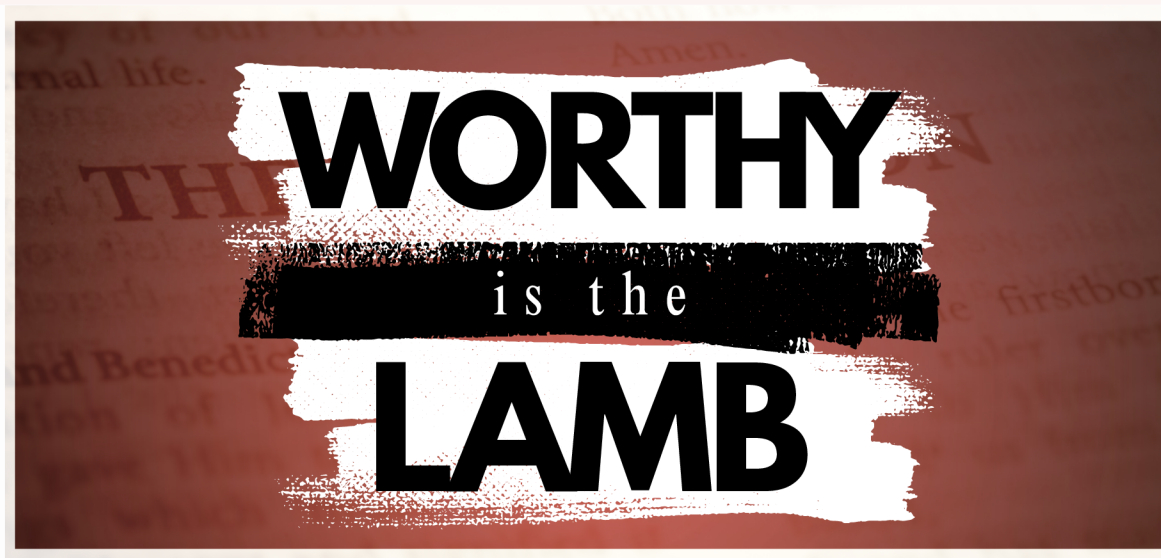




DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

The Scroll:

In your own words, what makes Jesus “worthy” to open the scroll and redeem creation?

The Lamb:

Why do you think God chose to reveal the victorious Lion as a slain Lamb? What does that say about the kind of kingdom Jesus leads?

When you reflect on the worthiness of Jesus—the Lamb who was slain and now stands victorious—what does your heart want to do in response?

How does seeing Jesus as the Lamb change the way you view your suffering, your worship, or your mission?

The Response:

Have you ever “fallen on your face” before Jesus in worship? Share your experience. - or- Do you find the idea of this uncomfortable? If so, share why you think that is.

Have there been seasons where you've felt numb to the worthiness of Jesus? What led to that, and what might it look like to “wake up” again?

In heaven, worship isn't commanded—it's the natural reaction to seeing Jesus as He is. What might help us cultivate that same instinctive response here and now?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS, CONT.

The Disconnect:

Pastor Jenna described how many believers today can become numb to the reality of Jesus' worthiness. What are some warning signs of spiritual numbness in your own life or in the Church?

The sermon mentioned that we can become distracted by compromise, comfort, or busyness. Which of those distractions most easily pulls your eyes off the Lamb?

Live it Out:

Revelation 5:10 says the Lamb "made them to be a kingdom and priests to serve our God." Peter tells us in 1 Peter 2:9 that his priests are to declare praises to him. What might it look like for you to do that in your daily life?

Revelation 5:10 says the Lamb "has made them to be a kingdom and priests." What might it look like for you to live as a priest in your home, workplace, or community this week?

How does understanding that Jesus "won" through sacrifice change how you think about your own struggles, ambitions, or victories?

Prayer Focus:

Encourage your group to close with a few minutes of worship or prayerful silence. Invite them to physically kneel or bow as a sign of surrender.
