How to Read the Bible

This August, we're launching a new sermon series titled "How to Read the Bible," a four-week journey designed to deepen our engagement with Scripture and equip us with the tools to read it well.



Beyond the Pulpit

The Bible is more than a book, it's the living Word, revealing God's heart and pointing us to Jesus. But let's be honest: it's not always easy to understand. Between ancient contexts, confusing passages, and differing interpretations, many of us wonder where to start or how to make sense of it all.

That's exactly what this series is all about.

Each week, we'll explore foundational truths and practical principles for engaging God's Word with confidence, clarity, and spiritual hunger:

- •Week 1: "The Word Made Flesh" (John 1:1–18) Jesus Christ is the Word of God, the fullest revelation of who God is. If we want to know God, we begin by looking to Jesus.
- •Week 2: "Fulfilled in Christ" (Matthew 5:17–20) Jesus didn't abolish the Old Testament, He fulfilled it. We'll learn how to read the Old through the lens of the New.
- •Week 3: "God-Breathed" (2 Timothy 3:16–17) Scripture is inspired by God and powerful to teach, correct, and transform us into Christlikeness.
- •Week 4: "Living and Active" (Hebrews 4:12–13) The Bible isn't just ink on a page, it's alive through the Spirit. It reads us as we read it.

This series is not so much a Bible study method, as it is an invitation to encounter the living God through His living Word. Whether you're a seasoned student of Scripture or opening the Bible for the first time, my hope is that you'll come away more equipped, more encouraged, and more convicted than ever to spend time in God's Word daily.

May we be a people who read Scripture not just for information, but for transformation.

The price of cemetery plots at Locust Grove increased from \$300 to \$500 on August 1, 2025. A total of 57 new plots have been sold ahead of the August 1 price increase, but if you missed that opportunity, the offer will remain open for a short time. Please contact me at your convenience. Cemetery plots in Columbia at Memorial range from \$2500 to \$5500. We have some maintenance planned for this summer on the road. While it is not possible to know the exact numbers, it is estimated that there are 745 buried in the cemetery, with 99 of those unknown as to location.

of his wife, Dianne Filbert, 82, who went to be in the arms of Jesus on June 30. Dianne was born on August 28, 1942, in Rushville, Illinois to Howard Wilson Yates and Hazel Irene Yates, née Lung.

A memorial service was held Saturday,

July 26, at Moniteau Chapel in rural Fayette. Inurnment followed that service at Locust Grove Cemetery, followed by a luncheon served by church members.

Dianne grew up in Rushville, where She attended Hale Ridge Country school, a one-room schoolhouse, for 8 years before going to Rushville High School. In 1960, after graduating, she attended Brown's Business School.

Dianne owned and operated two Cloud Nine stores with her first husband, Ken Caspall, in Columbia starting in 1972, and another in Jefferson City's Capitol Mall which opened in 1979. Dianne was the creative spirit behind these stores for 11 years.

After selling Cloud Nine in 1984, Dianne began her next adventure: the business that she solely owned and operated for 35 years, Identity Custom Emblems - ETC. Identity started with only one local client, but it grew to do business with organizations all across the United States.

Dianne put her heart and soul into everything she did, and she was grateful for every opportunity God afforded her for success. In 2000, she met her second husband, J. Warren Filbert, who would be her faithful partner and beloved companion for the rest of her life. . She is survived by her husband; son, David Caspall; brother, Steven Yates; sisterin-law, Sheila Yates-Vincent; stepson, Ryan Filbert, and his children; stepdaughter and stepson-in-law, Renee and Brett Howard, and their children; and niece, Mary Ann Hard.



Finding some good among the bad...

What a month it has been since my last Back Row. I've attended four funerals, all involving friends, three of them with connections to Locust Grove, the other a Rocheport connection. I realize this is part of the aging process and one day we will all be together again.

While all four have left me with warm memories of our friendship, the one I have seen the least in recent years has prompted the most memories and parallels from years past.

When Mary Kaye and I were exploring our prospects of a life together in the midto late- '70s, she was the news anchor for Channel 17 and was involved in every aspect of life in Columbia. She had become good friends with a lady who owned a couple of shops in town. Moving ahead a few years, MK had become available to this already single guy; we married and moved to the country west of Columbia, found the church at Midway and settled in.

In those years in a new location I made new friends, one of whom had become single and was getting married again. It was about 20 years after MK and I had married and started our new lives together when my friend introduced us to his new bride, a lady who used to own a couple of shops in Columbia 20 some years ago. Her obituary is in this issue of Locust Leaves, and I assured her husband Warren that Mary Kaye would be there to greet Dianne Filbert when she arrived at Heaven's gate.

Dianne died June 30; we observed MK's eighth departure anniversary July 21. I know they had a great reunion.
