The Book of Jonah

This month, we're launching a new sermon series called "Running Away: The Book of Jonah." It will be a fourweek adventure into the story of a runaway prophet and a relentless God.



Jonah's short book has lots of lessons. From the belly of the ship to the belly of the fish. Jonah shows us what happens when we try to outrun God, as well as what happens when God's mercy runs after us. At the heart of Jonah's story is the good news that no one is beyond the reach of God. Not rebellious cities. Not runaway prophets. Not you or me.

Each week, we will see God's great love and relentless pursuit of sinful people in fresh ways:

Week 1: "Floating in a Sea of Regret" (Jonah 1:1-16)

Jonah rejects God's call and runs away, only to discover his rebellion has consequences for everyone around him. You cannot outrun God's plan for your life.

Week 2: "Prayer from the Deep" (Jonah 1:17–2:10)

While Jonah is at rock bottom, he finds God's mercy. God hears our cries, even in our hard times and lowest moments, and He can use us to fulfill His purposes.

Week 3: "Simple Words, Great Repentance" (Jonah 3:1–10)

Jonah obeys God reluctantly, and an entire city repents of their terrible ways. God does not need our flourish—only our obedience!

Week 4: "Lessons in Grace" (Jonah 4:1–11)

Jonah struggles with God's compassion, but God explains that His mercy is much wider than Jonah's.

This is not just the story of a prophet, it is our story too. Like Jonah, we run, and like Jonah, we discover a God who runs after us continually with unshakeable grace. Our hope with this series is that you will see God's heart much clearer, experience His mercy more completely, and trust His plan more fully.

Let's remind ourselves: we can run, but we cannot outrun the love of God!



Randall Edward Elmore

October 28, 1946 - August 18, 2025

Randall E. (Randy) Elmore, age 78, husband of Gyla Elmore, died on August 18, 2025 surrounded by loved ones. Randy was born in Kirksville, MO on October 28, 1946. His parents

were the late Francis Elmore and Guyneth (Selby) Elmore of Hurdland, MO.

Randy was very well known in the Northeast Missouri area from his teen years and well into adulthood as the singer and guitarist in "The Twilight-



ers", "Country Flavor" and "B.J. Allen Band". His love of music included Elvis, The Beatles, and Eric Clapton. Randy's special talent has been inherited by his family: for which he was very proud.

Randy graduated Knox Co. High School in 1964. He was active in sports and even played in the over 35 men's softball league, His work history included three jobs: McGraw Edison for about a year, AT & T (formerly Southwestern Bell Telephone) for 36 1/2

years, and Weber Bus Co. for one year.

Randy married Dixie Daniels in 1965. Two children were born to this union. He later married Gyla Rogers on February 28, 1977 and they had one daughter. He is proceeded in death by both his parents, one son, Kayle Edward in 1967, his mother and father-in-law, Merlene and Leon Rogers, one brother-in-law, Bob Rogers and many aunts, uncles and cousins.

Those surviving are: his wife, Gyla of 48 years, daughter Kimberly (Elmore) Wynn and husband Jeff of Kirksville: daughter Kassi (Elmore) Jones and husband Brett of Columbia, MO; grandchildren: Brody and Tanner Mathes of Kirksville. Ashtyn Mathes of Lawrence, KS, and Hallie Jones of Columbia.

During its summer hiatus, choir members have provided special music for worship,




receiving thunderous applause on July 27 for the mixed group, August 17 for the men. Several individuals also have performed through the summer.


