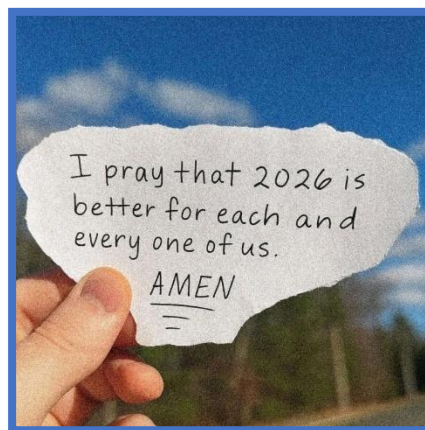

# Pastor Leslie's Message

Dear Church,

There are two main ideas I see when it comes to turning the calendar page for a new year. The first is a nostalgic look back at year behind us. A popular social media trend right now is a short video that quickly flips through several photos while the soundbite is an announcer saying "And that's a wrap on the 2025 season." The second is a hearty "good riddance!" I see this one a lot as well. To be fair, I've used it. The years where everything falls apart or the pain came crashing in like waves, unable to be tamed. Some years you get to celebrate all the things that were accomplished. Some years you get to celebrate that you simply got through.

The more complicated truth is that years are always a mixture of both. I had lots of hard moments in 2025, but I had wonderful ones as well! Even inside singular days there was both struggle and triumph. When I was young, the start of a new year felt like a clean start. This was the year everything would be different. But humans don't work that way and we never have. One of my favorite (and least favorite) sayings is attributed to Confucius. "Wherever you go, there you are." In some ways it's comforting, if you like who you are. In other ways, it is aggravating beyond measure. What do you mean I can't just wake up and be a completely different person?! One step at a time is so slow!

For Methodists, salvation is a journey of your entire life. We call this journey "sanctification." The goal of sanctification is to become so full of God's love that you stop sinning, known as "Christian Perfection." This doesn't mean you stop making mistakes, even Jesus made mistakes. It means that you stop sinning. For example, answering a question wrong on a test is not sinful, it is simply a mistake. However, angrily deciding it is your friend's fault for keeping you out later than expected, so you didn't have enough time to study, "what a jerk," is sinful. On this salvation journey of learning to fully love both God and others, we often take two steps forward and one step back. Some of us step off the path completely for decades at a time. Regardless of where we are, we are surrounded by God's love of grace. It is in front of us – leading the way, behind us – protecting us if we fall back, and surrounding us on all sides – even if we veer off track completely. Up in the mountains and down the in the valleys. Furthermore, we also walk with each other.

My prayer for us is that 2026 would be a year that holds more joy than tears, more triumph than failure, and more growth than stagnation. But even if it doesn't – I am convinced that through it all, God will be with us and we will be with each other. I don't know what the next year holds, but I know I don't have to do it alone and neither do you.

Our preliminary 2026 Pledge Report from November shows 23 pledges received for a total of \$76,152.12.

- ♥ Six (6) Pledge losses from 2025 equaling \$22,260 (*sadly, including one death*).

## Recap of Recent Church Council Decisions

The purchase of a keyboard for use by our new Music Director, Janet Orjala, which will enhance our musical experience, including a pipe organ option and the ability to easily transpose music into musical keys that are more suitable for our choir was approved.

Janet's proposal to invite a special choir, the "Joyful Noise Singers," to perform alongside our own Joyful Noise Ensemble at our Christmas Eve service was joyfully approved.

Trustee Chair Joe Wittler is looking into possibilities to repair the deteriorating "Love One Another" sign on the west side of our building.

The Sunnyside School Co-op request to rent the old Sunday School Room/Bazaar Bakery Room, as well as the kitchen, dining area and restrooms for the remainder of the school year, beginning November 10 while they await the finalization of The Outpost building was approved. Their monthly payment will be \$600, to be split between the Trustee Fund, which actively addresses concerns regarding our building condition, and the General Fund. All current church uses of the basement area should not be affected, and there will be no tax consequences because the school is a registered non-profit. A formal rental agreement has been signed.

The Christmas Eve collection will be designated for a new "Amazing Kids" Project. This project will give a \$10 Jack in the Box gift card to each child between the ages of 1 and 17 living in the subsidized Gateway Garden and Towne Square complexes in Washougal during March, with a greeting card from WUMC simply saying that every child is special and amazing.

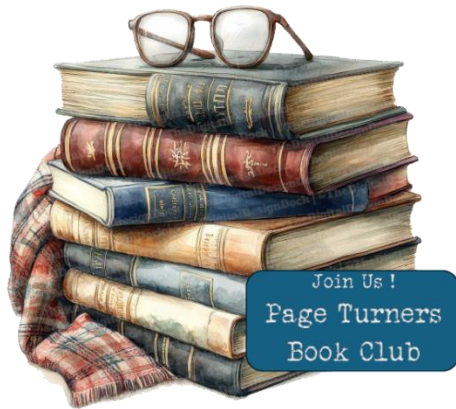

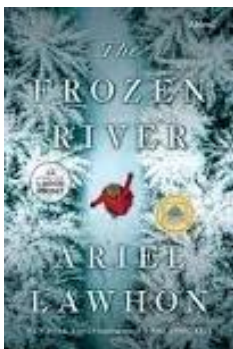
And if that's not enough to convince you, here are seven (7) more reasons to contemplate:
