
A Message from Pastor Leslie



This year's Annual Holiday Bazar will be held on the evening of November 7^{th} from 4-7 pm and on Saturday, November 8^{th} from 9-3 pm.

Following is a brief history of how our annual Holiday Bazaar began. Some records found in the old church archives indicate the Bazaar began in the old church, located on 'B' Street in downtown Washougal, years ago. The church was active from 1896-1969. The original purpose of the Bazaar was to help with the church budget. When the church we are now located in opened its doors in 1970, the Bazaar continued. By that time, the main budgetary focus was to help with the payment of our Conference Apportionments. The original Bazaars in this church raised around \$800 per Bazaar.

In the 1990's Cleta Gilman took over the reins with a much more open-ended dream. At that time, the Bazaar hosted a room of garage sale type items. Cleta removed that portion of the Bazaar and added a Soup, Sandwich and Homemade Pie section. <u>Sales increased!</u>

Around the year 2000, she felt our Bazaar needed to become an Outreach activity into the community. She proposed to the Church Council that we tithe 10% of profits towards a community need. <u>Sales increased!</u>

We gave to several organizations: the Police Department for Defibrillators, new Benches for Hathaway Elementary School's Cafeteria and more. When hunger became a clear and present need in our community, we adopted The Interfaith Treasure House, the local Food Bank in Camas-Washougal, as our beneficiary. As long as hunger prevails in our community, we will continue supporting The Treasure House. Advertising that we tithe (give) 10% of the profits from the Bazaar to The Treasure House has also increased Community Outreach. Sales increased!

Other changes that have taken place through the years were the adding back of "New to You" items, but keeping the focus on clean, like new items. <u>Sales increased!</u>

The addition of Chairpersons to oversee each area of the Bazaar has made it possible to keep increasing product and sales. <u>Sales increased!</u>

The willingness to try new things and then critique the choices immediately following the Bazar has allowed it to remain one of the most sought out holiday bazaars in the county. KUDOS!!!

It goes without saying that the Washougal United Methodist Church Bazaar would not be the success that it is without the participation of EVERYONE! First of all, we ALL can and do PRAY FOR OUR Bazaar Leaders and workers. Following that it is apparent the passion the congregation has for this Bazaar! The willingness to donate food, donate New to You items, donate homemade crafts and sewing projects, work at the Bazaar even when exhausted, help with setup and cleanup, park cars, help those who need help carrying their purchased finds to their cars and on and on.

Passion for this All Church Project is to be celebrated.

Furthermore, it's based on our Mission Statement:

Becoming the people God calls us to be by doing the work God calls us to be by doing the work God calls us to do.

Participating and doing brings us all together to welcome the community into our church home and helps us to be able to continue contributing to feeding the hungry. What a project!

The Washougal United Methodist Church Annual Holiday Bazaar, while located in our building, has grown from a profit of \$800 to our grand 2024 total of \$19,705.00! It takes a team and many helping hands combined with love and prayer.





All Saints' Day



Sunday, November 2nd

We will be honoring our dearly departed during Sunday services with the reading of the names of loved ones who passed this year and lighting a candle in remembrance of their lives.

John Wesley, founder of the Methodist movement, enjoyed and celebrated All Saints Day. In a journal entry from November 1, 1767, Wesley calls it "a festival I truly love." On the same

day in 1788, he writes, "I always find this a comfortable day." The following year he calls it "a day that I peculiarly love."

All Saints' Day, also called All Hallows, Hallowmas, and Feast of All Saints is always November 1st each year and celebrate and honors all the Saints; especially the Saints who are not honored on other days of the year.

The day is preceded by All Saints' Eve (Halloween) the night before and then followed by All Saints Day (aka All Saints Day) on Saturday November 2nd.


The 3 days together represent the All Hallowtide triduum (religious observance lasting three days) as a time to reflect and remember the saints, martyrs, and the faithful who have died.

To honor and give thanks for the saints in our lives – family or friends – who are now in the arms of our loving creator, we name them as part of our worship on All Saints Sunday, November 2, 2025.


