Creation's Redemption

In Sermon 60, "<u>The General Deliverance</u>" John Wesley makes his case for God's eventual redemption of all creation: animals included. It's an unusual vision, rooted in the idea that animals' connection to God, through humankind, was disrupted when Eden's humans fell out of harmony with God.

"As all the blessings of God in paradise flowed through man to the inferior creatures; as man was the great channel of communication, between the Creator and the whole brute creation; so when man made himself incapable of transmitting those blessings, that communication was necessarily cut off."

Wesley's thesis that all creation will be redeemed is based on Romans 8:19-22:

"For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now;" Romans 8:19-22 NRSV

Wesley leans into both Paul's words and Isaiah's Messianic and eschatological (end times) vision of a world at peace (Isaiah 11:6-9). He asks his congregation: 'Do we take God at His word?' Through Jesus, all of humankind now has the ability to know, love, and serve God. That connection distinguishes us from our pets, livestock, and all living things: both small and great. Humankind's fall may have had consequences for the natural world but God promises, in His time, humankind and all of creation will be redeemed. Until then? 'Redeem the time...go in full pursuit of the mind that was in Christ.' - J. Wesley


United Women in Faith

BARCC: Bringing Animal Renovations to Campbell County

October Mission & Noisy Offering

"BARCC advocates for a new shelter for Campbell County. We encourage you visit the current shelter behind Yellow Branch Elementary School. It is so small, that most people don't even know that it is there.

The Animal Control Officers and Friends of Campbell County Animal Control have beautified the space as much as they can while still taking care of all the animals' needs. It's time for us to help. Unfortunately, you can't paint a new



addition onto a too-small building. Additional space is desperately needed. Our goal is to make a new animal shelter that is a destination for families to visit on Saturday afternoon.

The shelter is currently overwhelming with noise and lacks the space of calm to truly meet and greet the animals. There are only 17 dog runs and a small cat room to hold a county that serves around 55,000 people.

Volunteers are currently taking items home to wash because our current shelter is too small for a washer and dryer. There's not even a real place to bathe animals other than a small kitchen style sink. Let's build a more inviting, family friendly location. A place for field trips, meeting spaces, meet and greet areas, and an overall better space for animals, their volunteers, and the citizens that visit. By bringing awareness through social media, attending Board of Supervisors Meetings, and raising funds, we will build a new animal shelter for Campbell County. Join us."





Hebrews 11:1 – 12:2

Part III (continued from September Newsletter) CHRISTIANS AND THE SUPERNATURAL What Is Halloween All About?

October 31, Halloween, or as it was traditionally called "All-Hallows Eve," is celebrated on the night before All-Saints Day (November 1). This is the day we remember all people of faith who have gone before us. All-Saints Day is when we celebrate the Communion of Saints, the continuing presence with us of those who

have died and entered into God's presence. Halloween is the day before this glorious feast. It is about how our ancestors, in the communion of Saints, relate to us now.

Our strange customs for celebrating Halloween – costumes of witches, ghouls and ghosts, "Trick or Treating," Jack-O-Lanterns, haunted houses and imaginary graveyards – are a mixture of Ancient Celtic religion and Medieval Christianity. Our ancestors in medieval Britain and Ireland created Halloween. Today Halloween has become a secular holiday for children. But in its origins, it was a serious time, concerned with how we relate to our ancestors. Ancestors are those people of faith who have gone before us, from life in this world to life in the spiritual realms.

Halloween was celebrated by the ancient Celts. It marked the time when the darkness each day becomes longer than the time of light. It was also when the barrier between this world and the Other World grows thin. So the spirits of the departed, both good and evil, could slip into our world to work us mischief (Trick) or bring us good (Treat). Christians started making lanterns by carving turnips (pumpkins were a later version) on Halloween to remind them to pray for the salvation of the departed.

For Medieval Christians, Ancestor are not gone and forgotten. They remain a part of our lives. The ancestors share in our spiritual and emotional life. Today Christians in Africa, Asia and Latin America are much concerned with ancestors. They invoke their presence, and ask for their help. This goes far beyond our concern to show our family connection with some illustrious person in the past. Ancestors are invited in when the family gathers. Their graves are visited to remember their birth or death. Children are scrutinized to find their similarity to an ancestor. When their spirits are at rest, we know that they have passed into the very presence of god. We recognize ancestors whom we affirm by belief in the communion of saints.

Ancestors And Discouraged Christians

The Epistle to the Hebrew 11:1-12:2 gives a witness to a long list of the ancestors of those early Christians who were struggling to keep their faith. This list of the faithful People of God does not start with the disciples of Jesus but reaches back to characters in the Old Testament: Abel, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses and a host of others (11:4-38). These were people of great faith and accomplishments. But they were all witnesses to a salvation that was not yet complete (11:39-40). There was more to come, in the Supreme Ancestor who lived by faith, Jesus Christ (12:1-2).

Hebrews was written about 100 CE. The Roman Empire had closed in on rebellious Palestine, destroyed Jerusalem and the Temple (70 CE); the Jewish Christian community had been dispersed. The Gentile Christians were coming under increasing persecution throughout the Empire.

Jesus' earliest disciples had died. The eagerly awaited coming of the Kingdom of God had not occurred. Distortions of Jesus' message (heresies) were spreading and controversy grew. Zeal for the faith had started to wane. Morality decreased. People started thinking, "They had to go along to get along." As commitment waned, joy in the Lord faded. Many felt the danger of a collapse of faith and the fall into despair.

Does this sound familiar? Where do you turn for help now?

Hebrews 11:1-3 tells us that "faith" is the one resource we have for dealing with despair and anxiety. Faith is more than belief in theological ideas. Faith in God and the redemption offered in Jesus Christ may be summed up intellectually in creeds and liturgies. But faith is a relationship with God that changes our vision of this world and our lives in it.

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the evidence of things unseen. (11:1)

Faith frees us from anxiety and depression because faith takes our attention off the miseries of this world and ourselves. Faith provides evidence that our existence is part of a reality greater than the world around us. Our troubled world is within the greater reality of the God who made it and will redeem it.

Without faith, our world gives little evidence that it can be transformed into something better. But by faith we can see how God's unseen power is transforming us.

By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God,

So that what is seen was made from things that are not visible. (11:3)

God brings New Being out of Nonbeing. Where do we look for where this transformation has taken place? – our ancestors those people of faith that God saved and empowered to do great things for God and to expect great things from God. *Indeed by this faith our ancestors received approval.* (11:2)

"We are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses." The Author of Hebrews gives us his list of witnesses (11:4 – 38). We all have our own "cloud of witnesses" - people God has transformed who have in turn blessed us. But the well–spring of the new life of faith is the Supreme Ancestor, Jesus Christ, and let us run the race before us, looking to Jesus the Pioneer and Perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God. (12:2)




