What's your favorite quiet place to go when you need to think or find some peace?

Key Verses

- Acts 1:14
- Mark 1:35-38
- 2 Corinthians 10:3-4
- Ephesians 6:12

Questions

- The sermon compares the disciples' situation to our current cultural climate. In what ways do you feel we're in a 'pressure cooker' today, and how might prayer help us respond?

- Pastor Mark described the disciples praying 'in one accord' like musical instruments coming together. Have you ever experienced this kind of unified prayer? What was it like?
- What does it mean to be an 'upper room church' or to have an 'upper room life'? How might this concept change your priorities?
- Which aspects of the lower room (schedules, work, money, property) tend to crowd out your upper room time with God?
- The sermon suggests that 'words create worlds.' How have you seen the power of spoken prayer shape environments or situations in your life?
- Using the PRAY framework (Pause, Rejoice, Ask, Yield), which element do you find most challenging and why?
- Mark challenged us to move from 'praying for' to 'praying with' others. What makes praying with someone in the moment difficult for you?
- How might our community look different if we truly believed that prayer is our most powerful weapon against the brokenness in our world?

Life Application

This week, commit to creating your own 'upper room' experience by setting aside 10 minutes each day for focused prayer using the PRAY framework (Pause, Rejoice, Ask, Yield). Additionally, challenge yourself to pray with at least one person instead of just offering to pray for them later. Keep a simple journal noting any differences you observe in your perspective, relationships, or circumstances as you prioritize prayer. Come prepared next week to share how this intentional prayer practice affected your week.
