Per Capita Sunday

Per Capita connects Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) congregations and mid-councils with the work of the wider church. As the primary funding source for the Office of the General Assembly (OGA), it is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of moving the church forward in the 21st century.

Per Capita giving makes it possible for:

- Presbyterians to discern and live out God's call
- Churches to connect with people seeking a call to ministry
- Staff support for General Assembly committees and commissions
- Management and coordination of General Assembly gatherings
- Presbytery and synod leaders to gather for training and discernment
- Counsel and support for churches in crisis (misconduct, legal matters)
- Presbyteries to address matters of inclusion, participation, and representation at all levels of church leadership and decision-making
- The denomination to build connections with ecumenical partners around the world
- Presbyteries and pastors to receive support on immigration issues
- Presbyterian history to be cataloged, preserved, and utilized by future generations
- "Each council above the session shall prepare and adopt a budget for its operating expenses, including administrative personnel, and may fund it with a per capita apportionment among the particular congregations within its bounds. Presbyteries are responsible for raising their own funds and for raising and timely transmission of per capita funds to their respective synods and the General Assembly." (Book of Order, G-3.0106)

Virtue: Temperance, Moderation, or Restraint



If there is one virtue that a Presbyterian might support, it's this one. Call it any of the above (you could also call it sobriety, chastity, or frugality), but scripture and our tradition teach that those who are grounded in their faith tend to be more able to control the heart's desires. We come by this honestly: our tradition partly comes from a response to excess and greed within the structures of the church. By stripping away ostentatious sanctuaries, overly complex theological systems, and worship as a form of performance, our Calvinist forebears attempted to refocus the faithful on God and God's desire.

By heart's desires, I want to be clear that I'm not talking about those desires that align with God's desires for us. Many of us desire peace, unity, kindness, and so forth. However, many people would also deny that they crave wealth, power, or prestige, but we live in a society that rewards, celebrates, and envies the influencer. Our minds are restless to see what or who the next big thing is. Young people, as advertisers are well aware, are exceptionally susceptible to temptation, but this isn't just a sin of the inexperienced.

Calvin writes about the heart's desire for tranquility and ease. I think many of us desire this in our lives. Scripture teaches that genuine, healthy self-denial can indeed make us calmer and more patient. He writes, "Let every part of our existence be directed towards God as our only legitimate goal." Paul writes, "Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others." Finally, Richard J. Foster reminds us that athletes must regularly practice self-denial to become the best at their sports. What things in your life clutter your mind and heart with selfish desires?

Now the belongings are in a brown paper grocery bag, stapled at the top, with a description of the contents written on the outside. This group has received a grant to purchase 200 canvas bags, which attendees will decorate, to be used to hold the belongings (wallet, watch, keys, etc.).
