SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session met on Monday, June 2nd, for their regularly scheduled meeting. The meeting opened with prayer and boundary training, now required by the PC(USA). Boundary training for congregational leaders, including Clergy and Ruling Elders, focuses on establishing and maintaining healthy boundaries within the context of ministry. This training helps individuals navigate power dynamics, avoid misconduct, and promote healthy relationships with individuals and the congregation.

During the meeting, the Mission Committee proposed a special offering to benefit KRM, Maxwell Legal Clinic and CRCKY. After a brief conversation, this motion was passed. The Financial Report was reviewed.

A few new items were brought to the attention of the Session. The Trustees reported that the garage needs to emptied, and asked that the Session ask groups and individuals to remove their items. Session approved the request and agreed upon a July 31st deadline.

A brief discussion was held about the status of the New Wineskins campaign. The Session decided that they would take no action at this time to make-up for the shortfall in the hopes that additional funds would come forth.

Related to this conversation, a discussion was held regarding the importance of the elevator update/repair, and how crucial this is for accessibility purposes. Matt will relay this to trustees and they will prioritize this on their agenda over the improvements to the building. Work on the new Campus Ministry room is set to begin.

The meeting was adjourned at approximately 8:00 pm with prayer for our congregation, the world, and one another.

CAN YOU HELP?

The past six months has been a very difficult time for refugees and migrants in the United States. Central Kentucky has had disturbing reductions in service for these immigrant communities, especially in the area of legal services. Many of the recently arrived Afghans, who were expecting family members to travel to join them, saw those travel plans terminated, leaving those families separated for the foreseeable future. Those in the Haitian community, who were granted parole to enter the country legally because of the conditions in Haiti, have seen their paroles terminated, making them subject to deportation. International students all across the country are having their student visas terminated. Fear permeates these communities, even among those individuals who continue to have legal status.

On Sunday, August 24, 2025, we will collect a special offering to be divided equally between two organizations serving the immigrant community. Both have had strong ties with us for many years. Please give generously to this congregational offering and go to the websites of these two organizations and become regular supporters.

Organization 1:

Kentucky Refugee Ministries (KRM)

Website: kyrm.org

As an affiliate of Church World Service, Kentucky Refugee Ministries (KRM) has been central Kentucky's refugee resettlement agency since 1990. In 1998 they opened an office in Lexington. And since then, MSPC has had strong supporting ties with KRM. At one time their office was in the Dana Jones Neighborhood Center across the street from the church. Our own Babs Klein and Lucy Raine led their operations. We have provided financial support, donated household goods and clothing, sponsored refugee families, setup apartments for arriving refugees and volunteered in their office.

For 2025 the U.S. government has cancelled all refugee resettlement, except for the white Afrikaners from South Africa. KRM will not be serving that group. So, no refugees are arriving here. But KRM continues to serve those who have recently arrived and those who continue to need KRM's support services. And they do this despite reduction of government funding. They have lost 12 staff members since January. Because of staffing shortages, KRM's Legal Department is not currently taking any new cases.

Organization 2:

Community Response Coalition of Kentucky Inc. (CRCKY)

Website: crc4me.org

CRCKY, a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt local organization, has been serving immigrant families since 2018. During Covid, CRCKY provided rental and food assistance and continues to provide food, clothing, household items, shoes, coats, diapers and client referrals to other community agencies for legal, medical and personal help. And MSPC was involved from the beginning and its members continue to volunteer for CRCKY in various capacities.

Because there are not sufficient legal services for low-income immigrants, in 2025, CRCKY is establishing an in-house low-fee legal clinic focusing on asylum cases. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is providing seed money to hire an in-house immigration attorney, who will supervise three DOJ-accredited representatives in this work. Another new focus: assist in forming coalitions of individuals and organizations to prepare for the local impact of aggressive immigration enforcement. All of their work is funded through non-governmental grants and donations.

Footnote: We had originally planned to include Maxwell Street Legal Clinic in this offering, but, as you may know by now, they are closing the end of July.



Legal Clinic Update

The Kentucky Equal Justice Center, which oversees the Maxwell Street Legal Clinic, has announced it must cease operations in Lexington due to the loss of government funding. As the founding organization of the Clinic, this is a deeply sad moment for us at Maxwell Street Presbyterian. Since its creation in 1999 by members of our congregation, the Clinic has served thousands of immigrants seeking a new life in the U.S., offering hope, guidance, and justice.

From my window at church, I've often watched families arrive at the Clinic's door with documents in hand, full of hope. It's been a privilege to witness this work and to know some of the staff who made it possible. We grieve this loss but also give thanks for all the Clinic has accomplished. The faith that inspired its founding lives on in our congregation, and we will continue to support immigrants and partner with others who share this mission.

Please keep the staff of the Clinic, the Kentucky Equal Justice Center, and those seeking refuge in your prayers. As we discern next steps, we will keep you informed. Feel free to reach out with any questions.
