STEWARDSHIP 2026

This fall, we invite the Maxwell Street community to join together in our 2026 Stewardship Campaign, "Together with God, We Make Peace Possible." This theme reflects our shared calling to embody Christ's peace: in worship, in service, in discovery, and in justice.

Throughout Scripture, we see God's peace breaking into chaos and fear: Jesus calming the storm (Mark 4:35–41), the Shepherd guiding through dark valleys (Psalm 23), the early church sharing all they had (Acts 2:42–47), and the promise of ultimate renewal (Revelation 21:1–5). These stories ground us in the truth that God's peace is steady and transformative, even when the world feels unsettled.

Maxwell Street is more than a building, it's a safe harbor for worshippers, a source of tangible aid for those in need, a spiritual home for students, and an advocate for the vulnerable. Every pledge makes this ministry of peace possible, sustaining worship, outreach, and programs that touch lives near and far. Each Sunday during the campaign, we'll focus on a different dimension of peace, anchored by Scripture and a personal testimony from someone in our community:

Week 1 – Peace in Worship: How worship becomes a steady anchor in life's storms.

Week 2 – Peace in Times of Need: Stories of aid through ministries like Thursday Night Meal and the Immigrant Legal Clinic. Week 3 – Peace in Discovery: Students and young adults discerning God's call.

Week 4 – Peace in Justice: Advocacy and mission efforts bringing peace into the world.





SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session of Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church met on September 8th at 7:00 p.m., with Moderator Matt calling the meeting to order and declaring that a quorum was present. The agenda for the evening was approved by common consent, and new member Susan Carey was warmly welcomed.

The meeting opened with prayer and a reflection led by Rob Wethington, who offered a thoughtful lesson on labels, followed by a prayer from Matt. Session members then engaged in conversation around an article by Carl Vaders, reflecting on what the church is doing well and where it can grow. Ideas included creating QR codes for bulletins and attendance, considering new ways to track visitors and members, and encouraging elders to lead in extending hospitality—affirming that there is no such thing as being "too welcoming."

Prayer concerns were lifted up for members and friends, including the families of Mason Hawkins and Jim Mahan, Ron and Carolyn following recent falls, and others listed in the weekly newsletter.

Committee reports highlighted both celebrations and challenges across the life of the church. Finance noted that while utility costs are rising, income has also increased. Worship shared plans for several upcoming

events, including the Legal Clinic celebration on September 14, recognition of an Eagle Scout's garden project on September 21, and World Communion Sunday on October 4. Christian Formation continues its important conversations around children, youth, and vulnerable adult policies. Campus Ministry reported Megan's decision to step down, with Helen and the Bullocks stepping in to help, and noted that the recent college brunch was a success and the student room is nearly ready. The Trustees addressed ongoing facility issues, including leaks, attempted theft of copper, and planning for elevator modernization. Social Justice is updating antiracism and church history policies while also preparing endowment grant requests. The Mission Committee celebrated raising over \$5,000 for immigration work. Finally, the Welcome Committee requested volunteers for the September 23 Sacred Music event.

The Deacons announced plans for the October 18 Block Party, which will feature a cornhole tournament, bounce house, and pumpkin painting. The Presbytery will meet at First Presbyterian on December 2. No new or old business was presented. The meeting concluded with prayer at 8:20 p.m.

A Ministry of Care & Compassion

One of the gifts of being part of a church family is that we promise to care for one another. That promise is lived out in many ways—through friendship, prayer, meals, and simple acts of kindness. In our tradition, deacons are called and ordained to embody this promise on behalf of the whole congregation.

The Book of Order describes deacons as those whose ministry is "one of compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ" with all who are in need or distress. Deacons are people of spiritual character who walk alongside others in times of illness, loss, loneliness, and change. They are ready to listen, to pray, and to remind us that none of us bears our burdens alone.

The heart of a congregation's care is found in the relationships we build with one another. Our deacons model this truth. They remind us that the church is not just a building or a program, but a community where compassion is shared and burdens are carried together. If you or someone you love needs prayer, a visit, or a listening ear, know that our deacons are here for you. By reaching out to them, you are helping us live more fully into the kind of church God calls us to be: a place where love and care are not just words, but daily practices. The Chair of our Board of Deacons is Alicia Hart. She would love to connect you with one of our Deacons.

Eco-friendly Celebrations and Traditions in a Season of Giving

We are a consumer-driven society and oftentimes, in our attempts to celebrate with decorations, parties, and gifts, we damage, even desecrate, creation. As we conscientiously work to conserve natural resources by using eco-friendly products, sustainable and local foods, we use less water, impose less on our land, and use fewer minerals. Remember the three Rs, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle that contribute to treading more gently? The first of these is reduce, which is to make less, so we want to make less our impact on creation in all that we do, less in our consuming, especially throughout our upcoming holidays of Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

How can we start? Use natural products for decorations, such as hay bales, pumpkins, and sheaves of corn, to decorate your home. Decorate the table

with a cornucopia with fruits and veggies that you can use later in the kitchen. Ditch the plastic and beware of greenwashing, a deceptive marketing practice where companies misleadingly present their products, services, or overall operations as more environmentally friendly or sustainable than they actually are.

When it comes to gift giving, here are some alternatives to big box stores and online shopping. Give gifts of experience or gifts of time. Consider the Presbyterian Giving Catalog for unique ideas that help others around the world. Share plants, consumables, or give something you've made yourself. Consider giving alternative gifts, contributing to a charity, or supporting Presbyterians for Earth Care. Host an alternative gift market at your church. There are a couple of companies that are good at supporting small businesses and treading gently, Uncommon Goods and Ten Thousand Villages. Consider alternatives to Amazon ordering. Pick and choose carefully from among those gifts that say they are green. Explore what can be done with seed paper, or make your own seed bombs.

Create a beautiful table with dishes, silverware, cloth napkins, and glassware. Buy local ingredients, consider plant-based opportunities for meals. Check out great blogs for delicious offerings, such as Cookie and Kate, Oh She Glows, Love and Lemons, The First Mess, and more.

These pillars of creation care begin with making less, making less stuff, imposing fewer demands on the earth, spending less time buying things, while creating thoughtful, welcoming hospitality for friends and family. Let us know what you do to entertain while treading gently on the earth.
