The service includes prayers of thanksgiving and intercession for those concluding their ministries..." We're excited to share that Session has approved the modernization of Maxwell Street's 35-year-old elevator as the first project of our New Wineskins Campaign. Thanks to your generosity, the funds are already available, and our trustees are working with contractors to finalize updated quotes. We anticipate work beginning this fall. While the project is underway, there will be times when the elevator is out of service, temporarily impacting the accessibility of our building. We'll keep you informed about downtime through the Friday Email and on Facebook, so you'll know what to expect.

This project ensures Maxwell Street remains accessible to people of all abilities for generations to come. Thank you for helping make this possible!

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session of Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church met on Monday August 4, beginning at 7:00pm with prayer and confirmation of a quorum.

The elders warmly welcomed Karen Williams and Caroline Rose as new members and are anticipating a couple of other new members to be received at a later date. Katie Whaley helped us center our thoughts with a reflection entitled “Living Faith Out Loud.”

Session completed its third boundary training, covering lessons on preventing abuse and exploitation in pastoral ministry, along with case studies. All elders successfully passed the exam. Pastoral prayers were lifted for several individuals and families facing loss or illness, with the congregation encouraged to see the newsletter for the full list.

Several committees presented different motions for consideration. Christian Formation received approval to join a new Downtown Youth Group and began seeking a new church librarian. Mission reported on a special offering to support immigrant ministries and noted plans to honor the closing of the Maxwell Street Legal Clinic in September. Worship announced participation in Lexington’s 250th celebration with a sacred music event.

Other highlights included progress on the college ministry room, upcoming elevator estimates, and renewed focus on volunteer engagement. The meeting adjourned with prayer at 8:24 pm.

Starting Again

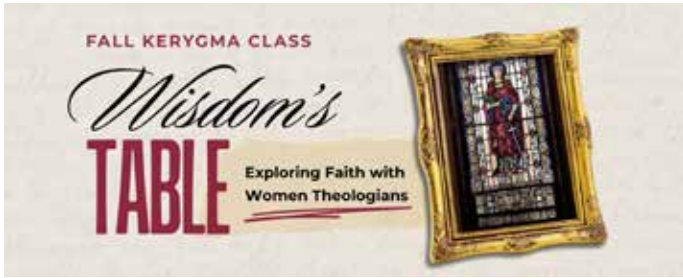
How one Rwandan teen leaned on Zoe Empowers after tragedy. At age 19, Emmanuel lost everything. Both of his parents. His only sister. A chance at a college scholarship. He believed his life was over and fell into a hopeless depression. It was around this time that Zoe Empowers Rwanda entered his life.

Emmanuel still remembers the day he was introduced to the empowerment program—October 17, 2019—because now he considers it the best day of his life. He was less optimistic then but gave Zoe a chance anyway. The three years following that initial meeting transformed Emmanuel. He began as a young man grieving the tragic loss of his family and emerged as a successful veterinarian and respected employer.

Young Adults Group

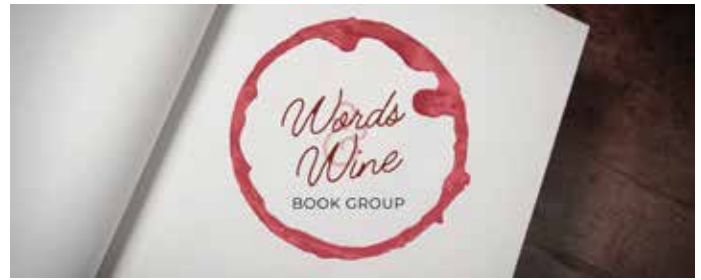
September 11, 7pm

I didn't know how many years Martha DeYoung has overseen the libraries at MSPC, so I called her to ask. She didn't know either, it had been so long. It might have been as long ago as the late 1980's when Dana was here. It was certainly at least 33 years. My son Will (age 33) and I frequently visited the library to take out children's

books, and I have fond memories of that library. That is my little story, but I'm sure countless members have their own memories of browsing the library or doing research or simply enjoying the atmosphere of sitting among all those books.

Over these past years, under Martha's direction, the church has amassed an excellent collection that is easily accessible and extremely useful. The adult library has a very strong Bible reference section along with many other theology books. There are also sections addressing current issues, biographies, and even some fiction.

I am helping with the children's library now, but this collection is built on the start that Martha gave it. Some of my favorite picture books are the ones from Martha's time selecting books. I'm also assisting Michelle Jones with Sunday School, and every Sunday we use the Bible reference and picture books that she selected.

The other thing I know from working in the children's library now is how much labor goes into keeping the library organized, attractive, and accessible. I've always admired Martha, but now I am in awe of the job she did for so many years. Have you noticed the book truck off the 1st floor lobby? Those books get changed frequently and reflect topics of current interest. Martha is responsible for this service.

The time has come when Martha feels she needs to step back from the libraries. While we understand, we don't know what we'll do without her services. She will be sorely missed!

Update on the MSPC Native Garden



The native garden has been the recent recipient of an Eagle Scout project undertaken by scout Leah Collins of Troop # 419 in Lexington. Leah and her crews have done a marvelous job making the space beautiful and eye-catching. They crafted a sitting bench and kiosk from scratch using donated materials from local companies. The "Little Library" was repaired, repainted (leaving the original child's inscription inside) and moved to a new location. All structures were carefully secured with concrete posts for stability. The prior metal signage poles from the Blevins' sorority days were removed along with tomato cages remnants, bricks, rocks and tons of Paw-Paw roots and weeds. After landscape edging of the perimeter, 4 truckloads of donated mulch were used to groom the site and protect our plants. It looks stunning!

Four separate crews were employed to do the work under Leah's guidance and leadership working in the hot sun and often until dark. Members from Maxwell St. included Sarah, Joe, Zane and Kierstan Kerksmar and Dan and Ann Farrer.

Fall plans include adding more shrubs and plants that are rabbit resistant! Once the kiosk is completed semi-annual literature will be added to educate passersby as to the benefits of native gardening. We hope the space becomes a peaceful refuge and educational opportunity for those at our church and in the community. Please feel free to wander by and soak in nature!
