A WORD FROM PASTOR FAZIO . . .

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

This month, October 2025 we celebrate the 508th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation that our beloved namesake, Dr. Martin Luther began with the nailing of the 95 theses to the church door of Wittenberg on October 31, 1517. Luther's theses debated and criticized the Church and the papacy but concentrated upon the selling of indulgences and doctrinal policies about purgatory, particular judgment, and the authority of the pope. This event sparked the beginning of a long and fascinating journey that has led us to become the church we are today (very simplistically speaking). In honor of this Reformation anniversary, I wanted to focus this month's article on a few of the key themes of our Lutheran understanding of the Faith. They are of course common to much of Christianity but are especially prominent in Lutheranism. In brief, they are:

Law and Gospel - In Protestant Christianity, the relationship between Law and Gospel states the distinction between the doctrines of Law, which demands obedience to God's ethical will, and Gospel, which promises the forgiveness of sins in light of the person and work of Jesus Christ, is critical. It is used as a principle of biblical interpretation and a guiding principle in sermon composition and pastoral care. Law and Gospel in essence the supersession of the Old Covenant (including traditional Jewish law) by the New Covenant and Christian theology based in the person of Jesus the Christ.

Priesthood of all believers – is a Protestant Christian doctrine stating that ordinary Christian's share a common priesthood in that they have direct access to God through their prayers without requiring a human mediator. The exact meaning of this belief and its implications vary widely among denominations. Luther's doctrine of the universal priesthood of all believers gave laypersons and the clergy equal rights and responsibilities, with only certain items (i.e. presiding over the sacraments) designated to ordained clergy.

Theology of the Cross - is a term coined by Martin Luther to refer to theology that suggests the cross as the only source of knowledge concerning who God is and how God saves. It is contrasted with the Theology of Glory which places greater emphasis on human abilities and human reason.

Simul Justus et Peccator - (Simultaneously Saint and Sinner) - means that a Christian is at the same time both righteous and a sinner. Human beings are justified by grace alone, but at the same time they will always remain sinners, even after baptism. From the perspective of God, human beings are at the same time totally sinners and totally righteous in Christ. The doctrine of "simul justus" is not an excuse for lawlessness, or a license for continued sinful conduct; rather, properly understood, it comforts the person who truly wishes to be free from sin and is aware of the inner struggle within him.

Justified by Grace Through Faith – Luther stated, "This one and firm rock, which we call the doctrine of justification, is the chief article of the whole Christian doctrine, which comprehends the understanding of all godliness." Luther explained justification this way in his Smalcald Articles: "The first and chief article is this: Jesus Christ, our God and Lord, died for our sins and was raised again for our justification (Romans 3:24-25). He alone is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world (John 1:29), and God has laid on Him the iniquity of us all (Isaiah 53:6). All have sinned and are justified freely, without their own works and merits, by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, in His blood (Romans 3:23-25). This is necessary to believe. This cannot be otherwise acquired or grasped by any work, law, or merit. Therefore, it is clear and certain that this faith alone justifies us." There are many other amazing doctrinal ideals that are found in Lutheran Christianity, these 5 are simply some of the more common examples of this God-given wisdom. The Reformation is an amazing story, and I look forward to exploring it with you as we journey through October.

October 5th coffee hour will benefit Hunger Task Force to help feed families, Children and seniors seeking assistance

<u>Take-out meal ministry</u>: the first Wednesday of the month from 1–3 pm, to assemble bag lunches. Sign-up sheet to volunteer is on the bulletin board.

<u>Clothing ministry</u> (revised Sept 30th) The following donations will be accepted: men's belts, men's jeans (waist size 34 inches and lower), zip-up sweatshirts, gloves, socks, quilts, blankets, hygiene items (deodorant, foot powder, lotion, body wipes, toothpaste, and toothbrushes).

<u>Food pantry</u>: white rice, canned pasta/chicken/tuna, Triscuits, packs of fruit cups (apple sauce, peaches, pears), chicken soup, Knorr side dishes (rice / noodle), canned potatoes/pasta/mushrooms, olives (ripe/stuffed), condiments (ketchup/mustard/mayo). Food and clothing donations will be delivered on **Tuesday, October 14th**.

<u>CommUNITY meal</u>: the next hot meal is **Wednesday, October 15th** . Volunteer sign-up sheet is on the bulletin board for meal prep, meal serve, fellowship and clean-up.

Mt. Meru Premium Tanzanian coffee is available for purchase. Holiday Premium Coffee Sampler (\$20), has six sample packs (Regular, Peaberry, Hazelnut, French Vanilla, Butter Pecan, Chocolate Raspberry). The Four-Pack Holiday Sample (\$15) contains drip grinds of Regular, Decaf, Peaberry, and holiday traditions. Bags of unflavored and flavored Reg. and Decaf coffee are available for \$12. All sales help improve the lives of the coffee

farmers, their families, and communities in the Mt. Meru Diocese of Tanzania.

Produce Table of excess bounty from the "farmers" in our church is winding down. Free-will offerings support Social Ministry.

Spotlight on Hunger Task Force

Hunger Task Force is Milwaukee's Free and Local food bank and Wisconsin's anti-hunger leader. HTF provides a safety net of emergency food to a network of local food pantries, shelters and meal programs and is the only food bank in Milwaukee that does not charge for food, delivery or network membership. Across all HTF programs, more than 50,000 people are being served every month. Visits to HTF's food pantry network have risen by 35% compared to this time last year. HTF ensures a healthy and nutritious supply of food within a network of nearly 200 access points for children, families and seniors in Milwaukee and the surrounding area. The HTF Farm located in Franklin harvests over 500,000 pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables during the growing season.

WPLC Property Report – October 2025

We held our property committee meeting on September 9th to discuss our completed, current and future 2025 work to maintain our church and parsonage. Every year we identify small to large projects to keep our property in order. We also contract annually for routine maintenance of furnaces, AC units, the elevator, pest control and lawn weed control.

This spring/summer, we've completed several contracted projects including the new shingled roof, landscaping along the front of the church building and the parking lot crack repair and sealing/striping. We also have a new concrete stoop at our back door, and the attic storage area has been decluttered and organized.

Currently we are still working on the flood damage in the church basement. We wet vacuumed out about 1 inch of water, but it damaged the lower edge of the drywall and some of the sound insulation in the back hall, all the classrooms, 3 storage rooms and the nursery. The removals are being worked on, and then we'll begin the patching process. We've been doing the work ourselves to save money and appreciate help anyone can offer (labor or donations), but it will take time to make things whole again.

The damage to our house's basement next door has been taken care of, including a new furnace, and a washer and dryer that were water damaged.

Fall Clean Up Day will be October 4th at 10 am. Please join us. We have a few things we can get done together. Bring your work gloves. Tree trimming, misc. repairs, window washing, etc.

Our next property meeting will be on **October 14th at 7:00 pm** where tasks are identified and prioritized.
