

Week 1

January 1

Genesis 1; John 1:1-3

The Word Creates.

Before anything existed, the Word already was. Genesis opens with God speaking creation into being, and John reveals that Word as Jesus Himself — the One through whom everything was made. From the very beginning, Jesus isn't just part of the story; He is the story, the living Word bringing light and life into the world.

January 2

Genesis 3; Galatians 4:4-5

The Woman's Seed.

In the garden, God promised that the offspring of the woman would one day crush the serpent's head — a hint of redemption right in the middle of humanity's fall. Centuries later, that promise was fulfilled when Jesus was born of a woman, stepping into our broken world to defeat sin and restore what was lost. Even in our failure, God was already writing a rescue plan.

January 3

Genesis 12; Galatians 3:8-9

The Promise.

When God called Abraham, He promised to bless all nations through him — a promise far bigger than one family or one land. Paul later reveals that this blessing finds its fulfillment in Jesus, the true descendant of Abraham who brings God's grace to the whole world. Through faith in Christ, we become part of that same promise.

January 4

Genesis 15; Romans 4:22-25

The Covenant.

God's covenant with Abraham was sealed not by human effort but by faith. In Jesus, that covenant is completed. He is the righteous one whose faithfulness is credited to us. What began under the stars with Abraham finds its fulfillment in the cross and empty tomb.

January 5

Exodus 12; 1 Corinthians 5:7

The Passover.

On the night God freed His people from Egypt, the blood of a lamb marked every home that would be spared. Centuries later, Jesus became our true Passover Lamb, whose blood covers us and delivers us from death. Through Him, we find freedom that never fades.

January 6

Exodus 20; Romans 8:3-4

The Law.

God's law revealed His holiness and our need for Him. Where the law could only expose sin, Jesus came to fulfill it perfectly, offering the righteousness we could never earn. In Him, obedience becomes not a burden, but a response of love.

January 7

Leviticus 16; Hebrews 9:11-14

Atonement.

On the Day of Atonement, Israel's sins were symbolically carried away through sacrifice. Jesus, our great High Priest, entered once for all — not with animal blood, but with His own. His sacrifice didn't just cover sin; it removed it forever.

January 8

Numbers 33; Luke 24:27

History points to Jesus.

Every place and moment in Israel's journey told part of God's story — a story that Jesus would later complete. When He walked with His disciples after the resurrection, He showed them how all of Scripture pointed to Him. The whole story of redemption was always leading here.

January 9



Deuteronomy 6; Mark 12:29–30

The Greatest Commandment.

God's heart has always been for love, for us to love Him fully and to love others deeply. Jesus reaffirmed this as the greatest commandment, showing us that faith isn't about rules, but about relationship. Love is both the starting point and the goal of God's law.

January 10



Deuteronomy 28; Acts 3:22-23

A Prophet to Come.

Moses promised that one day God would raise up a prophet like him, a leader who would speak God's words with authority and truth. That promise found its fulfillment in Jesus, who didn't just speak for God but as God. When we listen to Him, we hear the very heart of the Father.

Week 2

January 11

Joshua 1; Matthew 28:20

God is with us.

As Joshua prepared to lead God's people into the promised land, he heard these words: "The Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Centuries later, Jesus echoed that same promise — "I am with you always." The presence of God that guided Joshua now lives within us through Christ.

January 12

Judges 7; 2 Corinthians 12:9-10

Salvation through Weakness.

Gideon felt small and unqualified, but God chose him to show that victory doesn't depend on strength — it depends on faith. In Jesus, we see that same pattern: power made perfect in weakness. God delights in using humble hearts to display His glory.

January 13

Ruth 4; Galatians 4:4-5

The Kinsman-Redeemer.

Boaz redeemed Ruth out of love and loyalty, becoming her rescuer and provider. Jesus is our true Kinsman-Redeemer, who entered our story to buy us back from sin at great cost to Himself. His redemption turns our emptiness into belonging.

January 14

1 Samuel 3; John 10:27

Listening to God.

Young Samuel learned to recognize God's voice — a reminder that hearing begins with a willing heart. Jesus later said His sheep know His voice too. When we slow down and listen, we discover that the same God who spoke to Samuel still speaks today.

January 15

1 Samuel 16; Luke 1:32-33

The Shepherd-King.

God chose David, a humble shepherd, to lead His people and foreshadow a greater King to come. Jesus, the Son of David, rules with both power and compassion, a King who knows His sheep by name. In His care, we find both strength and rest.

January 16

2 Samuel 7; Revelation 5:5

The Lord's covenant with David.

God promised David that his throne would last forever, a promise fulfilled in Jesus, the Lion of Judah and eternal King. His reign brings justice, mercy, and hope that no kingdom on earth can rival. The covenant stands secure because the King still reigns.

January 17

2 Samuel 12; 1 John 1:9

Confession and Repentance

When David confessed his sin, he found forgiveness instead of condemnation. That same grace is ours in Christ, who is faithful to forgive and cleanse us. Repentance isn't the end of our story; it's where restoration begins.

Week 3

January 18

1 Kings 8; John 2:19-21

God's Glory in the Temple.

When Solomon dedicated the temple, God's glory filled the house in a visible sign of His presence. Jesus later showed that He is the true temple, the place where heaven and earth meet. God's presence is not bound to stone, but it dwells in the One who saves.

January 19

2 Kings 17; John 4:21-24

God's patience runs out.

Israel's repeated rebellion in 2 Kings reminds us that God is patient, but justice is coming. Jesus reveals both God's mercy and His righteousness, calling us to worship in spirit and truth. God's patience invites us to return before it's too late.

January 20

1 Chronicles 22; Ephesians 2:19-22

David's charge to Solomon.

David tasked Solomon with building the temple, urging him to lead God's people faithfully. In Christ, we see the ultimate fulfillment: the cornerstone, the living foundation, and the One who unites God's people into His eternal house. Our work flows from His faithfulness.

January 21

2 Chronicles 20; Ephesians 6:10-13

The Lord Fights for Us.

Jehoshaphat faced overwhelming enemies, but God fought on behalf of His people. Jesus fights for us still, giving victory not through might, but through His Spirit. When we trust Him, we step into battles already won.

January 22

Ezra 3; Hebrews 13:10-12

The Altar Restored.

When the exiles returned, the altar was rebuilt and sacrifices resumed — a reminder of God's ongoing plan of redemption. Jesus is our true sacrifice, the final altar, making a way for us to approach God with confidence. Restoration comes through Him.

January 24

Esther 4; John 12:27

For Such a Time as This.

Esther stepped into a moment of risk to save her people, showing courage in the face of fear. Jesus entered our world at the perfect time, offering salvation when we could not save ourselves. God's timing is perfect, and He calls us to participate in His plan.

January 23

Nehemiah 8; Luke 24:27

Revival.

As the people gathered to hear God's Word in Nehemiah's time, hearts were stirred and lives renewed. Luke shows that Jesus opens Scripture to reveal Himself, awakening faith and hope. Revival begins when we let God's story speak to us today.

Week 4

January 25

Job 19; John 11:25-26

My Redeemer Lives.

Job's faith shines through even in the midst of suffering, declaring that his Redeemer lives. Jesus is that Redeemer, who conquers death and gives us hope beyond the grave. In Him, our despair is met with life and restoration.

January 26

Psalm 2; Acts 13:32-33

God's Son.

Psalm 2 points to a coming king, anointed by God to rule with authority. Acts reminds us that Jesus is that Son, whose resurrection confirms God's promise. Through Him, we see God's power and love intersecting history.

January 27

Psalm 23; John 10:11

The Good Shepherd.

When God called Abraham, He promised to bless all nations through him — a promise far bigger than one family or one land. Paul later reveals that this blessing finds its fulfillment in Jesus, the true descendant of Abraham who brings God's grace to the whole world. Through faith in Christ, we become part of that same promise.

January 28

Psalm 62; Matthew 11:28-29

Rest for your Soul.

Psalm 62 invites us to find quiet confidence in God alone. Jesus calls us to come to Him, carrying our burdens, and to find rest for our weary souls. True peace begins when we trust in His care.

January 29

**Proverbs 3;
1 Corinthians 1:22-24**

Wisdom of God.

Proverbs shows that God's ways are higher than ours, a wisdom beyond human understanding. Paul points to Christ as the ultimate demonstration of God's wisdom, a message both simple and scandalous. God's wisdom saves where human cleverness fails.

January 31

**Song of Songs 2;
Ephesians 5:25-27**

The Bridegroom's Love.

Song of Songs celebrates the passionate love between a bride and bridegroom, a picture of intimacy and devotion. Jesus is our ultimate Bridegroom, loving the church and calling us into deep, life-giving union with Him. His love pursues and transforms us.

January 30

Ecclesiastes 3; John 14:6

Eternity in our Hearts.

Ecclesiastes reflects on the fleeting nature of life, yet God places eternity in our hearts. Jesus is the way to that eternal perspective, bringing meaning and hope that last beyond our days. Life with Him invites us to live with eternity in view.

Week 5

February 1

Isaiah 40; Mark 1:1-3

Comfort for God's People.

Isaiah reminds God's people that He brings comfort, renewal, and hope even in exile. Mark points to John the Baptist and the coming of Jesus, who fulfills that promise as the good news for all. God's presence turns despair into hope.

February 2

Isaiah 53; 1 Peter 2:24-25

The Suffering Servant.

Isaiah 53 foretells a servant who suffers for the sins of others. Jesus fulfills this, bearing our grief and shame so that we might find healing and life. Through His wounds, we are made whole.

February 3

Jeremiah 31; Luke 22:20

The New Covenant.

Jeremiah promises a new covenant written on hearts, not tablets. At the Last Supper, Jesus institutes that covenant, offering forgiveness and eternal life through His blood. God's plan of redemption now flows from His grace, not human effort.

February 4

**Lamentations 3;
2 Corinthians 1:3-5**

Hope in the midst of suffering.

Lamentations pours out grief yet clings to God's steadfast love. Paul reminds us that the same God comforts us in our troubles, allowing us to comfort others. Even in pain, God is present and faithful.

February 5

Ezekiel 37; Ephesians 2:1-6

Dry Bones Raised to Life.

Ezekiel's vision of dry bones shows God's power to bring life where there was none. Jesus brings that same life to us, raising the spiritually dead into newness of life. Where hope seems lost, God breathes again.

February 7

Daniel 3; Revelation 1:12-18

Another One in the Fire.

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were saved from the blazing furnace with a mysterious fourth presence. Jesus walks with us through our own fires, never leaving us alone. Our trials become the place where His faithfulness shines brightest.

February 6

Ezekiel 47; Revelation 22:1-2

The River of Life.

Ezekiel sees water flowing from the temple, bringing healing and life wherever it goes. Revelation shows that Jesus is the source of that river, offering eternal refreshment. Life in Him never runs dry.

Week 6

February 8

Hosea 11; Romans 5:8

The Lord's Love for Israel.

Hosea reveals a God who loves His wayward people with relentless, patient affection. Romans shows that this same love is poured out through Christ, who died for us while we were still far from Him. God's love never gives up.

February 9

Joel 2; Acts 2:1-4

The Spirit Poured Out.

Joel promises that God will pour out His Spirit on all people, awakening hope and power. On Pentecost, that promise is fulfilled in Jesus, who sends the Holy Spirit to guide, empower, and transform His followers. God's presence now flows into every heart.

February 10

Amos 5; Romans 12:9-10

Hate evil; Love good.

Amos calls God's people to live justly, loving what is good and rejecting what is wrong. Paul echoes this, showing that in Jesus we are called to live with integrity, love sincerely, and honor God in every action. True faith shows itself in how we live.

February 11

Jonah 2; Matthew 12:40

Three Days in the Deep.

Jonah's time in the belly of the fish foreshadows Jesus' three days in the tomb. Both stories remind us that God can bring life from the depths of despair. In Christ, even death becomes a doorway to new life.

February 12

Habakkuk 3; Philippians 4:4

Rejoice in the Lord!

Habakkuk celebrates God's power and faithfulness even in uncertain times. Paul encourages the same joy, reminding us that rejoicing in the Lord strengthens our hearts. God's presence turns our fears into hope.

February 14

Malachi 4; Luke 1:76-79; Ephesians 5:14

The Sun of Righteousness.

Malachi speaks of a coming light to bring healing and justice. Luke and Ephesians point to Jesus, the true light of the world, who awakens hearts and shines into the darkness. His rising brings hope, warmth, and life to all who believe.

February 13

Micah 5; Matthew 2:5-6

A Ruler from Bethlehem.

Micah foretold a ruler coming from Bethlehem to shepherd God's people. Matthew shows that Jesus is that promised King, born in humility but reigning with eternal authority. God's promises always come true in His timing.

Week 7

February 15



Luke 2

The Birth of Jesus.

Luke 2 tells the story of Jesus' humble birth, when God came near in human form. This arrival fulfills centuries of promise, showing that the Savior has entered our world to bring hope, peace, and salvation. God's love became visible and tangible in a baby.

February 16



Luke 4

The Mission of Jesus.

In Luke 4, Jesus reads Isaiah and declares His purpose: to bring good news to the poor, freedom to the oppressed, and sight to the blind. His mission reveals God's heart for justice, mercy, and healing. Following Him means joining in that work today.

February 17



Matthew 5

The message of Jesus.

Matthew 5 shares Jesus' vision for life in God's kingdom — a call to mercy, humility, and love. He shows that true righteousness isn't about rules but about transformed hearts. The kingdom of God begins wherever His words take root.

February 18



Mark 5

The Authority of Jesus.

Mark 5 tells of Jesus calming storms, healing, and commanding even demons. His authority over nature, sickness, and sin shows that nothing is beyond His power. We can trust Him with every part of our lives.

February 19

John 13

The Love of Jesus.

John 13 captures Jesus' love as He washes His disciples' feet, serving even those who would soon betray Him. His love is humble, sacrificial, and unconditional. Following Jesus means letting His love shape how we live and love others.

February 21

John 20

The Resurrection of Jesus

John 20 reveals that the tomb is empty and Jesus is alive — the victory over death is complete. His resurrection gives us hope, purpose, and the promise of eternal life. Life with Him is never-ending and full of new beginnings.

February 20

Luke 23

The Death of Jesus.

Luke 23 shows Jesus giving His life on the cross, bearing the weight of sin for all people. His death wasn't defeat but the ultimate act of love and obedience. Through it, we are reconciled to God and offered new life.

Week 8

February 22

Acts 1

The Ascension of Jesus.

Acts 1 shows Jesus returning to the Father, promising His Spirit and commissioning His followers. His ascension reminds us that He reigns in power and continues to work through His people. Jesus' presence is not limited by space — He goes with us through the Spirit.



February 24

Acts 4

Bold witness.

In Acts 4, Peter and John speak fearlessly about Jesus even under threat. Their boldness comes from the Spirit and confidence in God's plan. When we trust Him, we too can proclaim the truth without fear.



February 23

Acts 2

The Spirit poured out.

On Pentecost, the Spirit came as promised, filling believers with power, boldness, and life. Acts 2 shows that Jesus equips His followers to carry the gospel to the world. God's Spirit transforms ordinary people into witnesses of His extraordinary kingdom.



February 25

Acts 8

The Gospel crosses boundaries.

Acts 8 shows the gospel spreading beyond Israel to Samaria and beyond cultural divides. Jesus' message knows no borders, reaching every heart willing to hear. The good news of Christ is for all people, everywhere.

February 26

Acts 9

Saul transformed.

Acts 9 tells how Saul, a persecutor of Christians, became Paul, a passionate follower of Jesus. His radical transformation shows that no one is beyond God's grace. Christ can change hearts completely, including our own.

February 27

Acts 10

Salvation for the nations.

Acts 10 reveals God opening the door of salvation to Gentiles, showing that Jesus came for all nations. God's plan has always been global, and His kingdom grows as every people group is included. The gospel invites everyone into God's family.

February 28

Acts 16

The Gospel brings Freedom.

Acts 16 recounts the jailer's story, where faith in Jesus brings deliverance and joy. The gospel liberates us from sin, fear, and chains, offering true freedom in Christ. God's power transforms lives from the inside out.

Week 9

March 1

Romans 8

Freedom.

March 2

1 Corinthians 15

Victory.

March 3

2 Corinthians 5

Reconciliation.

Colossians 3

Alive in Christ.

March 8



James 2

Faith & Works.

1 Peter 1
