Title: Our Risen and Ascendant King (Part 1): Precepts

Text: Acts 1:1-11
Date: January 22, 2023

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Big Idea

All authority has been given to Jesus as King of kings and Lord of lords. And, as our risen and ascendant King, he issues commands. He commands us to go and be his witnesses among the nations. But, before that, he commands us to wait.

1. That He Commands

I think in our modern culture we've put a spin on Jesus that isn't true to who he really is, to what we see of him even in this verse (v. 2). We tend to think that Jesus is too meek and mild to command anybody. He's off somewhere with the little children petting sheep. He's washing feet. He's handing out snacks. He's giving free hugs. But he certainly wouldn't dare boss people around or issue commands. He's too "nice." We tend to think that sort of thing is reserved for the God of the Old Testament.

We act as if the Bible presents the sort of bad-cop/good-cop dynamic you see on TV. God the Father, in the Old Testament, he's the bad cop. He's mean. He's always writing down commandments, lighting fires, turning people to sulfur and salt, bringing down judgement and all this. But Jesus, God the Son, in the New Testament, he's the good cop. He comes in all gentle and lowly. He doesn't raise his voice or command anyone.

But when we look closely, that's not what we see in the Scriptures at all. In fact, it seems to me, if anything, Jesus actually demands more of us—he takes the commandments of his Father and drives them even deeper. In a sense, he's even more severe.

2. What He Commands

Jesus' last command isn't: "Go and do!" It's: "Stay and wait!" (cf. v. 4). Oh how this order is unbelievably significant! Getting it right is critical

to the Christian life. We've got to be brought to the end of ourselves before he can begin to make us something new.

I recognize there are some differences between what's happening in our text and where we are now. For one thing, we're not apostles. For another thing, we live in the days after Pentecost and the initial outpouring of the Spirit. But, nevertheless, I do think that the principle at bottom is still the same: we can't run off ahead of Jesus; we can't fulfill the law without his Spirit; and we certainly can't fulfill the Great Commission without his Spirit. We can't save ourselves. And we can't save anyone else. We need him through and through. And so we still, in that sense then, need to stay and wait for him.

Therefore, trying to apply this, I wanted to give us three steps we can take to encourage this waiting upon him that leads to going out with him and in his power.

Step #1: Pray (cf. Acts 1:14; 4:31)

We don't run off ahead of Jesus, we cry out to him. We don't try to fix ourselves or our situation, we cry out to him. We don't try to convert the nations or our neighbors on our own, we cry out to him. We pray.

Step #2: Hear (cf. Gal. 3:1-5)

Hearing the gospel with faith is not just how you begin the Christian life, it's also how you carry on in it. Hearing the gospel with faith is not just how you initially receive the Holy Spirit, it's how you continue to be supplied with the Holy Spirit in power.

Step #3: Abide (cf. John 15:5)

Abiding in Jesus means that, in our prayers and in our reading of Scripture and things, we are actively rooting ourselves in him.



Reflection Questions

- Before hearing this sermon, what would you have said is the point of the resurrection and ascension of Jesus? What verses come to mind in support of your answer? Why does it matter for you and your life?
- How do you feel when someone commands you to do something? What's your gut reaction to being bossed around a bit? Does it feel any different coming from Jesus?
- Which of the three steps above do you most need to take this week and why?
