The BIG Idea

Lying reveals the pride in my heart.

Introduction

Lying is one of the earliest sinful behaviors we pick up. "Not me" is the common answer of every youngster being interrogated about some preschool crime while holding the evidence in his little hand. And it's a behavior we struggle to rid ourselves of even as adults. Though as adults we become quite adept at justifying our lies and classifying our untruths. What is the difference between a fib and a lie?

The Ninth Commandment forbids lying to or about someone. It first had a judicial application. After all, you can't get to the truth in court if someone is lying. But the commandment's application goes beyond a courtroom into every day life. After all, we will all answer to the Judge who never lies and requires truthfulness among His subjects.

And He is the One in whom we can place our absolute trust.

Questions for Reflection

How has this Sunday's consideration of the Ninth Commandment affected how you think about lying and deceit?

Read Ephesians 4:25. What is required before speaking the truth? Why does our relationship with one another in the body of Christ require truthfulness?

Read Matthew 5:33-37. Why does Jesus say, "Let what you say be simply 'Yes' or 'No'"? What happens to our reputation and our gospel witness if we speak truth but do not do truth?
