Title: Relationship with the Government Part 2

Scripture: 1 Peter 2:13-17

Getting to know you Questions:

What's the funniest or weirdest "rule" you had to follow as a kid (either at home or school)? Have you ever accidentally broken a rule? What happened?

Into the Bible Questions:

Read Matthew 1 Peter 2:13-17

- 1. What was something from the passage or sermon that surprised you, helped you, confused you, or bothered you?
- 2. What does this passage tell us about God? People? Living to please God?
- 3. Why do you think Peter emphasizes submission "for the Lord's sake" rather than for the government's sake?
- 4. What are some examples in Scripture of God working through corrupt governments to bring about His purposes?
- 5. How does remembering the cross help us think differently about unjust leaders or laws?
- 6. Peter tells believers to "silence the ignorance of foolish people by doing good" (v.15). What does that practically mean?
- 7. How is biblical submission different from blind obedience?
- 8. How do these verses challenge cultural attitudes about authority and freedom today?
- 9. How does fake freedom (using freedom to serve self) differ from true freedom (serving God and others)?
- 10. How might fearing God change the way we respond to political leaders we disagree with?
- 11. What examples have you seen of Christians honoring authorities even when disagreeing with them?

For Extra Study, Read Romans 13:1-7

- 1. Paul begins with, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities" (Rom. 13:1).
- 2. Why do you think submission to government is such a repeated theme in the New Testament (cf. 1 Peter 2:13–17)?
- 3. How does Romans 13 connect the idea of government authority with God's sovereignty?
- 4. What's the difference between submitting to authority out of fear of punishment and submitting "for conscience' sake" (v.5)?
- 5. How can Christians disagree with or critique government while still showing honor and respect?
- 6. What needs to change in your life so that you can live this out? Jot down any insights, questions, or key observations.

Application Questions

- 1. When was the last time you responded to unfair treatment with kindness?
- 2. How can you practice "doing good" this week in a way that points people toward Christ?
- 3. When have you been tempted to use your freedom in Christ as a cover for selfishness?
- 4. What would change in your life if you truly believed you are free in Christ no matter what government is over you?
- 5. What's one area of "fake freedom" (health, relationships, speech, etc.) you need to guard against?
- 6. What practical steps can you take to use your freedom in Christ to honor people you strongly disagree with?
- 7. How can you make sure you fear God above fearing people or political powers?
