

What to Know Before Receiving the Lord's Supper

Our Communion Statement

We believe, teach, and confess that our Lord Jesus Christ is truly present in the Sacrament of the Altar. His body and blood are given in, with, and under the bread and wine for the forgiveness of sins, just as He says: "This is My body... this is My blood" (Matthew 26:26–28).

In faithfulness to God's Word and in care for all who commune, we practice closed communion. All who are baptized, instructed, and confirmed members of this congregation or of a congregation in fellowship with the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod are welcome to receive the Sacrament. In receiving the Lord's Supper, we not only receive Christ's gifts but also confess a shared faith.

Communion is not a general Christian right. It is an invitation to the holy banquet, and our Lord calls us to be prepared, clothed in faith and understanding. Scripture warns, "Whoever eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment on himself" (1 Corinthians 11:29).

Those not communing today may come forward for a blessing by crossing their arms. Before communing, Luther's Small Catechism encourages each Christian to ask:

Do I believe I am a sinner?

Do I believe in Christ and His words in the Sacrament?

Do I intend, with God's help, to turn from sin?

If you have questions, Pastor Keinbaum or one of the Elders would be glad to speak with you.

Preparing for the Divine Service

Before the Service – Speak to God. During the Service – Let God speak to you. After the Service – Speak to one another.


What the Word Is About This Week

Christ's Suffering and Death Bring Division

The Lord Jesus causes fear and trembling and division because His Word is "like fire ... and like a hammer that breaks the rock in pieces" (Jer. 23:29). His Law puts us all to death, whereas only His Gospel can bring us to life. He has fulfilled that Word for us by His cross and in His resurrection from the dead. He undergoes such a distressing baptism, accomplished by His death, in order to open the way for us through our Holy Baptism into His cross and resurrection.

So, then, if we are able "to interpret the appearance of earth and sky" (Luke 12:56), let us mark this sign of His cross — recognizing that this world is subject to death, but knowing that Christ Jesus also has conquered death and obtained life everlasting for us. Let us fix our eyes on "Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith," and "run with endurance the race that is set before us" (Heb. 12:1–2).

Jeremiah 23:16–29

Thus says the LORD of hosts: "Do not listen to the words of the prophets who prophesy to you, filling you with vain hopes. They speak visions of their own minds, not from the mouth of the LORD. They say continually to those who despise the word of the LORD, 'It shall be well with you'; and to everyone who stubbornly follows his own heart, they say, 'No disaster shall come upon you."

For who among them has stood in the council of the LORD

Let the prophet who has a dream tell the dream, but let him who has my word speak my word faithfully. What has straw in common with wheat? declares the LORD. Is not my word like fire, declares the LORD, and like a hammer that breaks the rock in pieces?"

Fear the LORD, you his saints, for those who fear him lack nothing! Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the LORD delivers him out of them all.

Epistle Hebrews 11:17—12:3

By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac, and he who had received the promises was in the act of offering up his only son, of whom it was said, "Through Isaac shall your offspring be named." He considered that God was able even to raise him from the dead, from which, figuratively speaking, he did receive him back. By faith Isaac invoked future blessings on Jacob and Esau. By faith Jacob, when dying, blessed each of the sons of Joseph, bowing in worship over the head of his staff. By faith Joseph, at the end of his life, made mention of the exodus of the Israelites and gave directions concerning his bones.

By faith Moses, when he was born, was hidden for three months by his parents, because they saw that the child was beautiful, and they were not afraid of the king's edict. By faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to be mistreated with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. He considered the reproach of Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt, for he was looking to the reward. By faith he left Egypt, not being afraid of the anger of the king, for he endured as seeing him who is invisible. By faith he kept the Passover and sprinkled the blood, so that the Destroyer of the firstborn might not touch them.

By faith the people crossed the Red Sea as if on dry land, but the Egyptians, when they attempted to do the same, were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell down after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had given a friendly welcome to the spies.

And what more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets— who through faith conquered kingdoms, enforced justice, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the power of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, were made strong out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received back their dead by resurrection. Some were tortured, refusing to accept release, so that they might rise again to a better life. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in two, they were killed with the sword. They went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, afflicted, mistreated— of whom the world was not worthy—wandering about in deserts and mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth.

And all these, though commended through their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted.


Nicene Creed

DEVOTION If Thou But Trust in God to Guide Thee

"What can these anxious cares avail thee, These never-ceasing moans and sighs? What can it help if thou bewail thee, O'er each dark moment as it flies? Our cross and trials do but press the heavier for our bitterness. Be patient and await His leisure In cheerful hope, with heart content To take what'er thy Father's pleasure And His discerning love hath sent, Nor doubt our inmost wants are known To Him who choose us for His own."

People sometimes speak of having a "cross to bear." They may refer to an illness or loss, to difficult circumstances in life or perhaps to a time of spiritual struggle and testing. Our hymn carries a warning about our tendency to add to our cross-shaped burdens: "Our cross and trials do but press the heavier for our bitterness." Anxious fear or bitterness towards God only add to the weight of that cross. Yet even apart from any bitterness, we will very likely have questions and doubts. We offer up prayers that begin with a question: "Why?"

The hymn counsels us to be patient as we bear the cross that has been sent to us and to "await His leisure," that is, to wait with patience for God's own timing and ordering of events. As we endure the weight of the cross, we continue to bring our petitions before the throne of God. We take our sorrow, pain, and even our complaints to Him. He wants us to call on Him in times of trouble and at all times. God will answer our prayers according to His will and His all-knowing, discerning love.

According to that same all-knowing, discerning love, God laid the burden of a cross on His own Son. He sent Jesus our Savior to bear the heavy weight of a wooden cross for the sake of our salvation. Jesus, crucified for us, bore the even greater weight of our sins as He hung dying on the cross. Through His sacrifice and His resurrection, the burden of sin has been lifted from us. We are declared innocent because Jesus died for us. Without fear or hesitation, we can bring our wants and needs before the throne of God. We can be certain that our loving Heavenly Father, who gave His Son for us, knows "our inmost wants."

Through the weight of the crosses we must bear, God calls us to repentance and draws us closer to Himself. He already knows what each day will bring for us (see Psalm 139:16). He already knows how long our cross-bearing will last. Even our bitterness, fears, or doubts cannot cause our Heavenly Father to turn away because, in Christ Jesus, God "chose us for His own."

WE PRAY: Lord Jesus, help me to bear my cross and faithfully follow You. Amen.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. How does having burdens make us more sensitive to other people's plights?
- 2. Do you know someone who has a demanding situation in life to deal with, and who bears it well? What can you learn from them?
- 3. What comfort does it bring you to know that you are "fearfully and wonderfully made" by God? (See Psalm 139.)
