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Christmas season has arrived at the front steps of our hearts. For some, the arrival of yule tide began once the Hallow-een decorations were stashed away. For some, Thanksgiving needed the spotlight before Mannheim Steamroller invaded listening ears (full disclosure...my favorite Christmas music each season). Regardless of whatever category you find yourself in at the start of the Christmas season, you are now invited to join in anticipation for celebrating the birth of our Savior.

Recently, one of my children asked, "Dad, what do you enjoy more...Christmas morning or the time leading up to it?" What a great question! How would you answer that? Of course, the simple answer would be an immediate, "Christmas morning!" Yet, as you think about the anticipation of Advent, each day in December presents enjoyment if your soul is welcoming. Like a good movie you don't want to end, I find the time leading up to December 25th to be worshipful. When the decorations are put away and the music returns to a much wider variety, what will your memories look like?

Join me daily in slowing down the rapid pace of Christmas anticipation to savor the anticipation of the Incarnation. Each day, treat your soul to unhurried time with the Almighty. If needed, put your phone on DO NOT DISTURB, pour a cup of coffee, open God's Word, and warm your heart to His promises fulfilled. My hope is to assist in your journey of faith this month.

Brooke and I are blessed to have four children in our home. As you can imagine, the excitement of Christmas grows as days crawl closer to Christmas morning. Each year, we are blessed to experience Advent together. In 1865, Phillips Brooks, a 19th-century pastor from Boston traveled to the Holy Land. While in Jerusalem, he borrowed a horse and rode to Bethlehem to help with a Christmas Eve service. While there, he witnessed songs of praise and folks retelling the birth story with gladness in their hearts. Inspired, he returned home and wrote a carol for the children in Sunday School at Holy Trinity Church in Philadelphia, PA. Years later, these words still ring with excitement as we journey through this season.

O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by. Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light; the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

For Christ is born of Mary; and, gathered all above, while mortals sleep, the angels keep their watch of wond'ring love.

O morning stars, together proclaim the holy birth, and praises sing to God the King, and peace to men on earth.

How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is giv'n! So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of His heav'n. No ear may hear His coming, but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive Him still, the dear Christ enters in.

### WHAT IS ADVENT?

I still feel like a child during this time of year. Following Thanksgiving, my heart begins to beat with the rhythm of Advent. The word advent itself means "arrival" or "an appearing or coming into place." It is a time of preparation for the arrival of our Savior, born in a manger more than 2,000 years ago. It is a time for us to rejoice in the hope, love, joy, and peace from our Father in glory in the gift of His Son. Traditionally, we find these four words in the Advent candle wreath. I believe these words are more than a candle. They are embedded in our souls as promises in this world.

I wonder if you are new at this whole Advent idea. As a child, my idea of Advent was receiving chocolates each morning, leading up to Christmas day. Advent carries many traditions with many families. For the last few years, I have driven a jeep. One of our beloved members gifted our family with a duck Advent calendar. Yes, you read that correctly...each morning was a new duck for our jeep. The ducks served as a countdown to the glorious morning of Christmas. I cannot recall if the Christmas duck was the best duck of them all!

Advent is about the coming of Jesus into the world. The focus is onJesus. According to Hebrews 1:3, He is, "The radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of His nature." He is the One that came as a baby and died on the cross as a man, for the forgiveness of our sins and the assurance of our heavenly home. He came to give His life as a ransom for YOU. Let that Gospel truth flood your soul.

Today, pray for your heart to be prepared this month. Look with joy at Jesus, who gave himself to die for your sins and to grant you eternal life. Trust Him with every day of your life. Perhaps with some of you, that day begins now.


#### **DECEMBER 2** JESUS ABOVE ALL

The beginning of Hebrews provides a beautiful entrance to the majesty of Christ. As we begin another Advent together, let us make a goal together; this month is all about Jesus. As you read Hebrews 1, you will notice Jesus is superior to everyone and everything created. He is more glorious than any gift exchanged. event planned, vacation traveled, and house decorated. The excitement, the anticipation for Christmas begins when your heart is in awe of the majesty of Jesus. With that declared, are you ready for Christmas?

We must guard our hearts this month and not get distracted with anything that has no eternal significance. Today is the beginning of a journey of praise. Our God is indeed faithful and true. Long ago, He spoke through the prophets and now...we hear His voice through the Son. He is indeed above all (John 3:31). His Name is above all names (Philippians 2:9). He holds all things together (Colossians 1:17). He is above all rule and authority (Ephesians 1:21). When we sing, when we give, when we travel, when we serve, and when we make memories with people we love during the Christmas season; may our hearts focus on exalting Jesus.

On rare occasions when I find myself in a store during the Christmas season, I'm humored by music played throughout the area. No other time in the year will songs be played, referencing the glory and majesty of Jesus. If I walked into a store in January, the music would fit the theme of the store. Yet, this month, I hear Jesus above all in certain songs. (And yes, I still do not like "Last Christmas"). I see nativity scenes throughout neighborhoods. I hear scripture cited at community events. I believe this month produces a hardwiring in our souls to place Iesus above all. Of course, not all of us do that. But what if you made that your ambition? What if this month, you invested each day in placing Jesus above all in your Christmas journey?

Today, embrace the beginning of Advent with the goal of placing lesus above all. Look at how you will spend each day until December 25th. Make it a priority to worship Him daily. My hope is for this to be the best Christmas ever in your faith journey!



### HE IS FAITHFUL

God is faithful to His promises. Can your word be trusted? Have there been times in your life when promises weren't kept? I remember years ago having a Christmas gift ruined days before Christmas morning. My parents were gracious to purchase a hammered dulcimer and had it hidden at a nearby friend's home. A few nights before Christmas during a dinner with a bunch of folks from church, one of the girls from the youth group shouted, "Dave, you are getting a hammered dulcimer for Christmas!" I was dumbfounded. I did not know how to react, but I remember going to bed that night full of annoyance and frustration. A promise was broken as she revealed the surprise. Promises kept are a glorious blessing. Promises broken create chaos and uncertainty. Christmas is all about promises kept by our gracious God.

When I think of Jesus born in Bethlehem, I see promises fulfilled. The Father sent the Son to shine brilliant light in a world of darkness. The Father sent the Son to rescue sinners from the curse from Eden. He came, conquered sin and death, rose again on the third day, ascended to glory, and is now at the right hand of the Father. The foundation of Christmas is the faithfulness of our God.

If you are feeling hurt or betrayed this season, turn to Jesus. If you are struggling to sing the next carol, trust in Jesus. If grief covers your soul like an unwanted frozen blanket, cry to Jesus. In Him, we have redemption (Ephesians 1:7). In Him, we have victory (1 Corinthians 15:57). In Him, we see unending faithfulness (2 Timothy 2:13). Join me this Christmas season in worshipping the Promise Maker and the Promise Keeper.

Today, share your pains, worries, and struggles with God. Spend time examining His faithfulness in the birth of Jesus. He made a promise to love, care, and deliver you from sin. Jesus fulfilled that promise. Rejoice today.




### FAMILY TIME


# THE WILD MAN

It is safe to categorize John the Baptist as a wild man. He wore a garment of camel's hair while supporting a leather belt around his waist. His diet consisted of locusts and wild honey (Matthew 3:4). Yet, this unusual character in the bible was used by God to prepare the way of Jesus. In Luke 1:5-17, you will see God's plan for John the Baptist. Read it more than once so the details of the birth foretold by the angel of the Lord will be in your mind as you read today's devotional.

John the Baptist was to Israel as Advent is to us. He prepared Israel for the message of the King. He went ahead of Jesus to proclaim Him in the wilderness as the Lamb of God (John 1:29). He would bring forth His Name and message, serving as the one to make many ready for the opportunity of salvation. As a humble messenger, Jesus called him great (Matthew 11:11). He came to serve and support the mission of glory on the earth. He was prepared and made sure many were as well.

Are you prepared for heaven? Do you know Jesus as your Lord and Savior? Are you living your life as a messenger of His, for the advancement of His kingdom on this earth? Perhaps this Advent year is your time to be a messenger? When I read of John the Baptist, I'm drawn by how God can use anyone for kingdom purposes!

Today, look at your life and how time is spent. Are you living on mission? Are you living with kingdom readiness? How can you serve today as a messenger of the Gospel for others? Take a page from John the Baptist's playbook as he dedicated his life as a voice in the wilderness...shouting for the world to hear of Jesus.



# SING LOUD!

It is no secret to my church family in Pensacola...I love Christmas music. I love the words of such powerful carols and the joy heard in familiar melodies. From Charles Wesley to Nat King Cole, music consumes my soul like light invading a dark room. A little secret...Christmas music is playing right now in October as I write these words for your reading in December.

Beyond just familiar tunes that stir your holiday spirit, think of this season as a time for praising the Name of our Redeemer. In today's scripture, we read of God's grace in drawing water from the wells of salvation. Isaiah opens our souls to join a chorus of praise for our God. As you get busy with this Christmas season, will you make time to praise the Lord? Will you proclaim His Name? Will you make Him known to others? Will you share of what He has done for you?

Let's join Isaiah's proclamation in shouting aloud and singing for joy today. One of my favorite lines of any Christmas hymn was written by Charles Wesley in 1739. Soak in these rich words.

Christ, by highest heaven adored, Christ, the everlasting Lord, late in time behold him come, offspring of the Virgin's womb: veiled in flesh the Godhead see; hail th' incarnate Deity, pleased with us in flesh to dwell, Jesus, our Immanuel.

I enjoy going for nighttime walks during the Christmas season. Listening to Christ-centered Christmas songs while looking at neighborhood lights serves as a great environment of worship. Sometimes life gets too complicated and worship is forgotten. Do your soul a favor today and worship.

Sing loud the praises to our King! If you are reading this today, please email me the song you chose for the day. I'd love to hear of your time of personal worship.

Today, put some Christmas music on. Read Isaiah 12:2-6. Rejoice in the joy of your salvation. Advent presents us an opportunity each day for reflecting and celebrating what matters most. Or I should say...who matters most. His Name is Jesus.

#### THE LIVING WORD

Jesus is the Word fulfilled. Scripture weaves in a beautiful tapestry of the eternality of Jesus. The baby we celebrate in the manger is the eternal Son of God who came as a man to save us from our sins. He is the author and perfecter of our faith (Hebrews 12:2). When we see the baby in the manger, we see the very author and redeemer of life. He came more than 2000 years ago to fulfill the promises made in the Old Testament. Here are some for your joy today.

**Jesus would be born of a virgin** (Isaiah 7:14) – fulfilled in Matthew 1:22-23, Luke 1:26-31

Jesus would inherit an everlasting kingdom (2 Samuel 7:12-13, Psalm 89:29, Isaiah 9:7) fulfilled in Luke 1:33, 2 Timothy 2:8

**Jesus would proclaim good news to the poor** (Isaiah 61:1, Micah 3:8) – fulfilled in Matthew 11:5, 21:14, Luke 4:18

**Jesus would offer physical healing** (Isaiah 35:5-6, 42:7-18, 53:5) – fulfilled in Matthew 11:5, Luke 7:22, John 9:6-7, 11:43-44


**Jesus would ride a donkey!** (Zechariah 9:9) - fulfilled in Matthew 21:5-11, Mark 11:1-11, Luke 19:28-40, John 12:12-19

**Jesus would be betrayed** (Psalm 41:9, Zechariah 11:12-13) – fulfilled in Matthew 26:14-16, Mark 14:10-11, Luke 22:47-48, John 13:18-30

**Jesus would provide atonement for sin** (Isaiah 53:1-12, Malachi 3:3) – fulfilled in Matthew 27:27-31, Mark 15:16-20, Luke 22:63-65, John 19:16-30, Romans 5:6-8, Hebrews 1:3

As you rejoice in the birth of Jesus, reflect on prophecies made in the Old Testament and fulfilled in the New Testament. Warren Wiersbe once said, "When the child of God looks into the Word of God, he sees the Son of God. And, he is transformed by the Spirit of God to share in the glory of God." Such powerful words to consider on this December 7th day. Rejoice today in the Living Word!

Today, look throughout Scripture to see Jesus. Read of the promises He fulfilled in Genesis 12:3-7, 14:18, 17:19, 22:8-18, and 49:10. That is just some in Genesis alone! The birth of Jesus revealed the faithfulness of our God. Rejoice in His faithful promises made and kept today.


#### TELL THE GOOD NEWS!

Many years ago, before the invention of smart phones and social media, word of mouth carried news to others. Often, my youth group at church would go on winter trips after Christmas. I remember the excitement of sharing with my friends all the presents opened as we rode an uncomfortable bus. One Christmas, I received a super Nintendo from my parents. I remember running to my friends in the church lobby and yelling my good news. Of course, they responded with their own good news. Nobody had to force us to share our excitement. In fact, adults probably preferred we kept our voices down as we made the winter trek to the retreat center.

In today's time, it is easy to share good news. For example, if I were to post a life update about my family online, within minutes I would have folks commenting. Back in 2018, I shared online our news of moving to Pensacola to begin pastoring FBC Pensacola. An hour later, there were hundreds of comments on my Facebook post. Some comments were from people I've not spoken with in many years. Yet, the news travelled fast. After seven years, I can say it was really good news!

What news are you holding onto this Christmas? What hope defines your life? As Christ-followers, we have the best news of all time. Tim Keller describes the good news as, "Through the person and work of Jesus Christ, God fully accomplishes salvation for us, rescuing us from judgment for sin into fellowship with Him, and then restores the creation in which we can enjoy our new life together with Him forever." I love this definition. In the Gospel, we have the best news of all time. Christmas serves as a reminder of God's glorious faithfulness in Christ, born in the manger. Will you share this good news today?

Today, share the good news. Look into why the news is good! Salvation was born in Bethlehem. His Name is Jesus.



# LOOK UP

Tucked inside the Abrahamic covenant, you will discover two words, "Look up." When was the last time you looked up at the night's sky and marvel at God's creation? One of my favorite places to look up at night is in southern Illinois. When distance separates the city from the country, stars are better admired. It is truly glorious to see God's glory on display each night!

As I read Genesis 15:1-6 in preparation to write today's devotional, my mind went to the shepherds' scene in the field at night. In Luke 2:8-14, the shepherds experienced the glory of God fully displayed in the angels announcing the birth of Jesus. I imagine that night of stargazing turned into a worship service. In Matthew 2:9-11, the wise men followed the star all the way to Jesus. I like what Dr. James Kennedy stated, "The star of Bethlehem was a star of joy. When they saw the star, they rejoiced with exceedingly great joy. All true joy comes from Him." Just like in Abraham's experience, God revealed His faithfulness in the night sky.

Are you in a season of doubt or anxiety? Are you struggling to trust where God is leading and what He is doing in your life? Is it difficult to embrace this Christmas season, because of so many unanswered questions? Perhaps tonight, you can treat your soul to LOOK UP and see His glorious handiwork in the sky. As He knows each star by name (Psalm 147:4), He knows you. Put that truth into your heart and mind today.

Today, look up. See what God has done in placing the stars in the sky. He is the same God that is faithful to lead you today. Cast your worries to His attention. Exalt His Name by seeing what He has provided you in the Son.



### HOPE FOUND

The world was broken while the earthly parents of Jesus arrived at Bethlehem. Perhaps hope was hard to see as Mary and Joseph desperately searched for a place to stay. Sadly, as the story continues, we see no rooms left in the Inn. One of my favorite songs this time of year is *While You Were Sleeping* by Casting Crowns. The song has this powerful line:


Oh Bethlehem, what you have missed while you were sleeping, For God became a man and stepped into your world today, Oh Bethlehem, you will go down in history As a city with no room for its King while you were sleeping.

Just think about what transpired when these faithful soon to be parents arrived at Bethlehem. No place to sleep! No guaranteed roof over their heads or a dependable place to lay down. For most people, this is awful. For a pregnant lady, this is beyond awful. Yet, this was in the plans of God's great design for redemption. Micah 5:1-6 painted the picture before the scene occurred.

Rather than coming to earth amidst fanfare and in lavish settings, the King of Glory and God's own Son was born among animals. He came on a rescue mission; to save us from our sins and give us everlasting life. Jesus, the hope of glory, fulfilled the OT prophecies. Mary and Joseph, by God's grace and plan, experienced God's promises accomplished.

I'm not sure what is happening in your world today, but God knows. Trust Him and cling to His promises fulfilled in Jesus. Sin was paid, death was defeated, and redemption was poured out. Rejoice!

Today, remind yourself of God's promises. Take a tour throughout the Bible of promises made and kept. Spend some time in prayer, meditating on the promises of God.



### TIRED YET?


Are you tired yet? It is hard to believe ten days have passed this month. How much have you done so far? Would you consider yourself to be a Martha or Mary this Christmas season? (For more understanding of that question, read Luke 10:38-42). The Marthas of Christmas tend to be busy. Organizing gifts, cooking meals, making party plans, overscheduling, and nonstop decorating can consume each day. Are you a Martha? Jared C. Wilson cautioned, "Her busyness was a distraction from Jesus." Avoid the distractions this Christmas season!

Or, do you follow Mary's example? Are you carving out time to stop and rest in the presence and joy of the Lord? When was the last time you stopped what you were doing and enjoyed the power of the Gospel? Christmas presents great opportunities for worship and adoration. Avoid letting all the "To do lists" interfere with your awe in the Savior's birth. We can't afford to miss this season of wonder. C.H. Spurgeon once said, "Our hope in Christ is the mainstream of our joy." Hope becomes more alive when rest is applied to busy holiday planning.

Each Christmas season, my concern is busyness taking over and then January arrives. I do not want to look back and regret not soaking in peaceful, intentional time with the Redeemer. I believe Jesus is the Lord of the Sabbath (Matthew 12:8) and with that belief, I want to rest in Him today.

Are you tired yet? Choose what is necessary. Make time for what matters most. Learn the discipline of saying, "No" when needed. Your soul will thank you today as you find rest and joy in Christ. Advent is all about Him. Let today be about Him in your journey.

Today, stop and rest. Before you run your errands or continue with holiday planning, rest and focus on the purpose of Advent. His Name is Jesus!



#### AVOID FAMILIARITY

His Name is Jesus and He came to save. The instructions from Gabriel could not be clearer. As we are another day closer to Christmas, remember the power and grace found in His Name. It is easy for any of us to become too familiar with the birth story of our Savior and not see the magnitude of such statements like Matthew 1:21. Reading of Gabriel's announcement, the journey to Bethlehem, the birth, shepherds, wise men, etc. can become too routine if we aren't careful. Today, avoid familiarity.

Read the verse as if it is the first time the news has been announced. The silence from the Old Testament years is now over. Jesus, prophesied throughout so many years, is now on His way to arrival. It is important for our souls to avoid reading the nativity story without anticipation, love, and hope. Alistair Begg warns, "Each Christmas, we face the temptation to allow familiarity with the Nativity scene to breed complacency and to blind us to the awe-inspiring truth that as we look at the baby in a Bethlehem manger, we are looking in on God Himself in the form of a servant." Our God came to save. Our God came to restore. Our God came to redeem. His Name is Jesus.

Today, look with joy over the power of His Name. His Name defined His mission and gave us eternal life (Acts 4:12). Praise His Name today and avoid familiarity.

Today, reflect on the Name of Jesus. Read Matthew 1:21 and then see in the Gospels why His Name matters.

1 In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. 2 This was the first registration when Quirinius was governor of Syria. 3 And all went to be registered, each to his own town. 4 And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the town of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, 5 to be registered with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. LUKE 2:1-5

# THE JOURNEY


So often we read Luke 2 during Christmas time and skip over important details. The journey Mary and Joseph took together was an expression of both faith and obedience. As the chosen couple to bring the Christ into the world, they knew the journey would involve radical dependency on God's strength. Read Luke 2:1-5 and avoid skipping over the details. Allow the scene to capture your mind and heart.

How long are your car rides during the holidays? Do you drive long distances to see family and friends? A couple years ago, my in-laws moved from Yorktown, Virginia to Pensacola. I love having them just a few minutes away! Before their move to Pensacola, our drive each Christmas was quite a journey. From our driveway to their Yorktown driveway was 915 miles. On those long car rides, patience was greatly tested. We drove in the comfort of a van and the privilege of hotel lodging on the way. Mary and Joseph's journey...not so much.

The journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem would take 4-7 days, depending on weather and physical ability to traverse many hours. Many estimate it was close to a 90 mile journey. Mary, a young but very pregnant woman, showed great courage and trust in following the required census. Joseph, a man trusting God while loving his wife, showed great strength in the journey. They traveled as a team, led by the Spirit in preparation to deliver the Son.

Faith and obedience are not always easy. For some, 2025 has been a difficult year. Yet, here we all are at Advent, looking forward to celebrating the birth of our Savior. Today, look at the incredible journey by Mary and Joseph. See their willingness to go where needed for God to give us His Son. Their journey was arduous, yet they overcame. You can overcome as well.

Today, pray for strength in your journey. Perhaps the road to this Christmas has been difficult. You are in good company! God not only knows, but He guarantees strength and victory. Trust Him today. Rejoice, for the journey to Bethlehem gave us the blessing of salvation.



# GOING HOME



The shepherds were privileged to have a front row seat to the joy of the Lord. Christ was born. Joy arrived.


As you continue in this busy Christmas season, make sure your joy is set on the Good News of Jesus. The Gospel is the Good News. Jesus came, the deliverer of joy, to the lost and broken. We can celebrate this Advent season, because joy is possible. Jesus came to save sinners, and He will return again. We are not left in this world to walk aimlessly and without hope. Joy promises each of us a better story.

In 1719, Isaac Watts published a book of poems, based out of the Psalms. Taking the truth from Psalm 98, Watts wrote a poem in celebration of the joy of Jesus in the church and for the world. The original poem was not designed to be used as an Advent hymn, yet the church adopted it as a song of joy for the arrival of Christ. A century after the poem was written, parts of the poem were used to celebrate the birth of Jesus in the Advent. You may know these words:

Joy to the world, the Lord is come;
Let earth receive her King!
Let every heart prepare him room And heaven and nature sing!
And heaven and nature sing!
And heaven . . . and heaven . . . and nature sing.

Yes, joy arrived in the manger. We celebrate Him as the Savior of the world. His name is Jesus and He is where joy must rest. This Advent season, celebrate the good news of a great joy that is for... YOU.

Today, pray for your heart to rest in the hope of the Gospel. The good news that Jesus came, and He will return. He came to rescue you and to give you eternal life. This is joy like no other!



### IMPATIENT MUCH?

As a child, the month of December was oftentimes a long month of waiting. I remember seeing a few presents added under the tree every other day...leading up to the night before Christmas. I remember picking up mysterious wrapped boxes and shaking them with curiosity of what was inside. December was a month of waiting. I hoped for many things on Christmas morning. 

#### DECEMBER 17 THE GIFT OF CONTENTMENT



#### **DECEMBER 18**

#### TURN THE LIGHT ON!

One time, I did a complete flip over my suitcase in the middle of the night. That may have been one of many times I should've listened to Brooke and put the bags away after trips. Christmas declares Jesus came as the Light (John 8:12) that conquered darkness. Isaiah 9:2 points to the Son in John 1:5. I love thinking of Christ as the Light of the world. In Him, we have the light that never burns out (Matthew 5:16). Randy Alcorn adds, "This present world is still cursed with sin and suffering, but these obstacles can't trump joy or diminish the light that dawned at Christ's incarnation. He has already come, and with Him came light, hope, and redemption—the down payment of this world's final transformation, when we'll experience His brightness first-hand." Walk in His light today.

In the Gospel, the marvelous light of Jesus took away our darkness (1 Peter 2:9). Clinging to His light will make darkness flee on your faith journey. How shall we look at darkness today? Look at this layout.

Darkness deceives...light leads.

Darkness steals...light rescues.

Darkness hurts...light heals.

In Jesus, darkness has no victory. In Jesus, light is triumphant. In Jesus, we must shine the light all around the world. This light we carry is worth sharing this Advent season! Tomorrow, we will spend more time with that challenge.

Today, exchange the darkness for His light. Stop trying to survive on your own. Darkness hurts, but light heals. Trust and receive the healing gift of the Light of the World (John 8:12).

# FLASHLIGHT TAG


One of my favorite games growing up was flashlight tag. The rules are simple. One person has a flashlight and runs around in darkness, looking to shine on others. Once the last person is caught by the light, the game is over. The kid that brought the Streamlight stinger 2020 was usually picked last to be, "it." Rules were often broken as some would lie and pretend the light did not hit them. I still know them by name and pray they have changed their ways.

As a Christ-follower, we can look at life in some ways like flash-light tag. Each day, we carry the light of our salvation (Psalm 27:1). All around us there are people walking in darkness. Christmas time serves as an open field of mission opportunities. Many hearts are drawn to generosity this time of year. With such love and compassion warming our hearts on cold winter days, why not shine His light on others? A simple invitation to attend the upcoming Christmas Eve service or a kind gesture to someone in need can open the door for gospel conversations. You don't have to go very far to see someone in darkness. For the glory of Jesus, we must shine the light all around the world...beginning in our neighborhood.

Light has a way of changing darkness into joy. In my neighborhood, there is a house that goes all out each year for Christmas decorating. Sometimes at night as I'm driving home with much on my mind, the holiday lights from this beloved house will transform my mindset. Such Christmas majestic illumination makes the nights so much better. Of course, I arrive home and feel challenged to put more lights up outside. After living in my house for over seven years, the lights are the same at our house.

I am so glad His light never fails. On difficult days, turning to John 8:12 fills my heart like light filling a dark sanctuary. Join me today in worshipping Jesus...the Light of the world.

Today, take the light and shine on others. Pray and ask God for opportunities to be used for kingdom growth. Call someone or write an encouraging note. Be kind to someone overworked in the stores. Help someone in need without any strings attached. Above all...share the Gospel today.



#### HOLDING LOVE

When you place your eyes on the baby in the manger, remember the love of God. The baby would grow to be a sinless man, who would take the wages of sin for us. He exchanged His righteousness for our unrighteousness. In Jesus, we have the perfect definition of love (Romans 5:8). As we prepare our hearts for Christmas, we must hold fast to the love of God through Jesus Christ.

I still remember holding all four of our children when they were newborns. I still remember seeing them for the first time and feeling a love that wasn't in my heart prior to their arrival. As I think about the manger scene, I wonder what Mary and Joseph experienced as they held our Savior for the first time. As any earthly parents have experienced, I imagine they had deep love in their hearts. I've heard it said that children will never understand how much their parents can love them. In the Gospel story, the baby held by Mary and Joseph would give them love that no parent could ever imagine. The baby was the Savior of the world. He was God's gift of love for our broken and sinful world.

Back in December 2009, I was in Atlanta serving at the Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Processing Center. As we were inspecting boxes prior to their final packaging, a song came on the speakers. At this time, Brooke was seven months pregnant with Eden. Any song about babies caught my attention that year! I still had so many questions in my heart of what it was going to be like to hold my baby girl. This song, by Ben Glover, Jason Ingram, and Joy Williams, has become one of my favorites each Advent season.

It's still a mystery to me, oh


How His infant eyes have seen the dawn of time

#### THE TWELVE WORD GOSPEL


On December 9, 1965...A Charlie Brown Christmas first premiered on CBS. Charlie Brown, frustrated with everyone's lack of preparation for the Christmas play yelled, "Isn't there anyone who knows what Christmas is all about?!" What happens next has changed lives for centuries. Linus answered Charlie's frustration by quoting Luke 2:8-14. One of my favorite parts of the Christmas season is watching this classic...and seeing Linus drop his security blanket as his heart is secure in the truth shared from Luke's Gospel.

I believe Charlie's question can also be answered in Titus 2:11. In just twelve words, Titus shares what Christmas is all about. The Greek word used for "appeared" is where our English word epiphany derives from. We celebrate this epiphany...God Himself came and graciously gave salvation. He came, not because of our worthiness, but because of our need. Alistair Begg said it well, "As baby Jesus was asleep in that manger, the shadow of the cross was already cast over the cradle." Christmas is all about the gospel of our Risen Savior.

Sometimes we can overcomplicate this time of year. As we are just days away from Christmas, calm your schedule some with Gospel reminders. Earlier this month, we examined the necessity of rest during the Christmas season. The twelve word Christmas message in Titus 2:11 can give clarity, guidance, and peace as last-minute shopping and planning wreaks havoc on anxious souls.

Luke 2:10 gave a message our world needs to hear today. Christmas is the arrival of good news that will bring great joy to all people. All need to hear this message. All need to be transformed by this message. All need to see such power and deliverance in Paul's twelve words to Titus. Like Linus, find security in God's promises. And it is quite alright to hold a blanket while you read.

Today, read the twelve words from Titus 2:11 more than a few times. This is what Christmas is all about.



#### REDEEMED BY LOVE

Matthew 1:5 includes Ruth in the genealogy of Jesus. Her life and connection to the Savior has fascinated my soul for years. Today, I included the entire story of Ruth in the scripture reading. It is well worth the time to read the entire text as the story of Ruth pushes us forward in anticipation for Christmas.

In Ruth's story, you will discover God directing Ruth, providing for her needs, giving fellowship, and purchasing redemption. As I read the story, I'm drawn to so many glorious conclusions. God included a Moabite in His eternal family. The invitation for mercy is for all. There is room for you in His family.

In this Christmas season, do not lose hope. Do not give up. Instead, turn to Jesus and rejoice in His promises. In Ruth's story, God transformed an entire family in Bethlehem when a baby was born. In the Gospel story, the world was transformed when the Son was born in the same city of David! In Ruth's story, the greatest king of the Old Testament would later come. In the gospel story, the King of Kings would come and redeem.

Isaiah 7:14 and Ruth go so well together. God with us. I love the power and comfort of those words. C.H. Spurgeon once preached, "God with us" is the laborer's strength. How could he preach the gospel, how could he bend his knees in prayer, how could the missionary go into foreign lands, how could the martyr stand at the stake, how could the confessor own his Master, how could men labor if that one word were taken away?... "God with us" is eternity's sonnet, heaven's hallelujah, the shout of the glorified, the song of the redeemed, the chorus of the angels, the everlasting oratorio of the great orchestra of the sky." God's faithfulness was found in the baby born in Bethlehem.


Today, rejoice, a child is born! Rejoice, a Son is given! Rejoice, redemption is yours.

#### DECEMBER 23 LESSONS FROM SHEPHERDS

I've always been a fan of the shepherds in the Christmas story. I can't get these guys out of my mind when this time of year arrives. God, in His matchless grace, gave the Gospel announcement to the lowest of society while they were at work...watching sheep in a field. The Gospel announcement was given to the least of these. In one scene, the majesty of God was displayed in the sky with a host of angels...to shepherds with a host of... sheep. As you look at this part of the story this Advent season, let it serve as a reminder that in this world, there are no elite. True, our culture may have political leaders and celebrities that draw much attention. Yet, in comparison to the power and majesty of Jesus, all of us are in the same category, broken people in need of redemption.

The shepherds took a great risk in their journey to see Jesus. It was a major financial risk, as they were willing to radically follow the will of God by leaving their field. Their reward in the journey was a front row seat to exalt the Savior. Can you imagine what transpired in their minds when they arrived to the manger scene?

What lesson can be learned from the shepherds? When God calls, will you follow? It may be a stirring in your heart for the mission field or a desire to leave the comforts of your routine to serve others. This Advent season, learn what it means to have faith-centered obedience from the shepherds. They trusted in the message and followed the path to the Savior. In return, they received the treasure of Jesus and a transformed life. I believe they became messengers after leaving Bethlehem.

On your journey, are you trusting the Lord with where He is leading? It may involve sacrifice, but the reward could be a front row seat to watch the Lord use you for kingdom impact.

Today, look at your current journey. Are you living with faith-centered obedience? Take a few minutes and ask God what lesson you need to learn from the shepherds today.

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. 2This was the first registration when Quirinius was governor of Syria. 3 And all went to be registered, each to his own town. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the town of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, 5 to be registered with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. 6 And while they were there, the time came for her to give birth.7 And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.8 And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. 9 And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with great fear. 10 And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. 11 For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. 12 And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." 13 And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying,

Give those thoughts and concerns a much-needed break and focus on the story. Our God was faithful to His promises when the Savior was born. He is faithful today to His promises as well. Christmas Eve is a reminder of God's faithfulness. Christmas Eve is a reminder of God's redeeming love for broken people. Do your soul a favor and rejoice in the story today.

Today, pray for your focus and excitement to center on Jesus above anything or anyone else. Soak in the truth of Luke 2. Sing Christmas hymns and prepare for the celebration tomorrow.
