LIFE GROUP LEADER'S GUIDE: 6 TIPS FOR A GREAT LIFE GROUP

Leading a Life Group is a chance to help others grow in their faith. Here's a quick guide to creating meaningful gatherings based on Bill Search's 6 Tips for a Great Small Group.

1. Use Curriculum

- Provides structure and biblical teaching.
- Review materials ahead of time and tailor them to your group.

2. Lead Great Discussions

- Create a respectful and open environment.
- Keep discussions focused and involve everyone.

3. Ask Great Questions

- Use open-ended questions to spark deeper thinking.
- Follow up with questions that encourage application.

4. Listen

- Show care by listening without interrupting.
- Reflect back what you hear to ensure understanding.

5. Study the Bible

- Keep God's Word central.
- Read Scripture together and discuss its meaning and application.

6. Pray Together

- Begin and end with prayer.
- Share specific requests and pray in smaller groups when needed.

RUTH: A STORY OF RESILIENCE AND REDEMPTION

OVERVIEW

The book of Ruth is a story of loss, loyalty, redemption, and God's quiet but powerful faithfulness. Set during the time of the Judges—a period marked by spiritual compromise and instability—Ruth reveals how God works through ordinary people, faithful love, and covenant promises to bring about redemption. Ultimately, Ruth points us to Jesus, our True Redeemer, who welcomes the outsider, restores the broken, and secures a future filled with hope.

This Life Group Study Guide follows the Ruth sermon series week by week. Each gathering is structured to engage the Head (biblical understanding), Heart (personal reflection), and Hands (faithful response), with same-gender Huddle Groups for deeper accountability and prayer.



RUTH WEEK 1

A FAMILY IN FAMINE

Opening Prayer

Lord, in seasons of loss and uncertainty, help us trust that You are still at work. Open our hearts to Your faithfulness, even when life feels empty. Amen.

Read the Text

Ruth 1:1–5

HEAD 1. What spiritual condition characterized Israel during the time of the Judges?

2. What losses does Naomi experience in these opening verses?

3. How does famine affect both physical and spiritual circumstances in this passage?

HEART 1. How do you typically respond when life feels unstable or stripped of security?

2. Where have you experienced disappointment that tested your trust in God?

3. How might you resonate with Naomi in the story of her loss?

HANDS 1. How can God meet you in your current season?

2. Where might God be inviting you to remain faithful despite uncertainty?

3. How can this group pray for you during this season, whether in good or bad circumstances?

HUDDLE Break off into same-gender huddle groups and discuss:

1. Where do you most feel spiritual famine right now, and what support do you need?



Ruth 1:6-14

HEAD

1. Why does Naomi describe her life as bitter?
2. What do Orpah and Ruth's decisions reveal about grief and loyalty?
3. How does Naomi interpret God's actions in her life?

HEART

1. When have you felt bitter toward God or life circumstances?
2. How do you usually process grief? With others or alone?
3. What does this passage stir in you about honesty before God?

HANDS

1. Where might God be inviting you to move from bitterness toward hope?
2. Who has God placed in your life as a reminder that you are not alone?
3. What step of trust could you take this week, even in the midst of uncertainty?

HUDDLE

Break off into same-gender huddle groups and discuss:

1. What bitterness do you need to name before God right now?



3. How can our group reflect God's welcoming love to those who might be outsiders?

HUDDLE Break off into same-gender huddle groups and discuss:

1. What holds you back from fully surrendering your future to God?

3. Where do you feel challenged by Boaz’s example of character?

HANDS

1. What does integrity and living a worthy life look like for you this week?
2. Where can men and women reflect Christlike strength and care?
3. How can this group encourage godly leadership?

HUDDLE Break off into same-gender huddle groups and discuss:

1. What does godly character look like in your current season of life? Where might you struggle to show godly character?

3. Where might God be expanding your compassion toward others who might be different than you?

HANDS

1. Who can you intentionally show kindness to this week?
2. How can you advocate for those who are overlooked within our church, community, or in your circles of influence?
3. What practical step can you take this week to reflect God's inclusive love?

1. How can you practice trust rather than anxiety this week?
2. Who can you encourage while waiting on God's provision?
3. What does faithful waiting look like for you?

1. What is hardest for you to wait on God for? And how have you seen God's answer in the waiting?



HEART

1. How do you respond when doing the right thing might cost you comfort, security, or reputation?
2. How have we seen God's covenant commitment to His people?
3. How have you seen God's faithfulness in your life recently?

HANDS

1. Where might God be asking you to choose faithfulness over comfort?
2. How can you honor commitments this week?
3. What does obedience look like in your relationships?

HUDDLE Break off into same-gender huddle groups and discuss:

1. What commitments are hardest for you to keep?



3. How will this series shape how you trust God moving forward?
