Where Do I Begin?

SALVATION | BAPTISM | SANCTIFICATION

Salvation: Beginning A Relationship with God

The journey to a relationship with God begins with a heartfelt prayer, often called the Sinner's Prayer, where you acknowledge your sins and seek God's forgiveness. By confessing your need for a Savior and inviting Jesus Christ to be the Lord of your life, you accept God's gift of salvation. This step is rooted in the belief that Jesus died for your sins and rose again, offering eternal life to all who trust in Him. Salvation is not earned by works but received through faith, as a free gift of God's grace, transforming your heart and giving you a new purpose in Christ.

If you would like to make Jesus Lord of your life you can pray a prayer like this...

"Father, I have sinned. I have not obeyed Your Word. I have tried to run my own life. I have ignored You and Your will for me. I have tried to decide for myself what is right and wrong. I deserve Your wrath and punishment. I am lost unless You save me. Thank You for sending Your Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, to pay for my sin and guilt. Thank You for raising Him from the dead and giving Him authority over my life. I receive Him as my Savior and Lord. I receive Your gift of eternal life in Christ. I will turn from my sinful life to serve You. You are my Creator and Redeemer."

Baptism: A Step of Obedience

Following salvation, baptism is an important act of obedience that publicly declares your faith in Jesus. It symbolizes the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ, as well as your own spiritual rebirth—dying to your old self and rising as a new creation in Him. Baptism doesn't save you, but it's a powerful testimony to others and a meaningful step in your commitment to follow Jesus. By being immersed in water, you express your dedication to living a life aligned with God's will, supported by a community of believers.

Sin STEP 1A

Sin is a central theme in the Bible, affecting our relationship with God and others. Understanding what sin is helps us grasp the need for repentance and God's grace.

Let's examine key scriptures to define sin, explore its impact, and discuss how we can live in alignment with God's will.

1. Sin is Missing the Mark

Romans 3:23

"For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."

2. Sin is Rebellion Against God

1 John 3:4

"Everyone who commits sin practices lawlessness; and sin is lawlessness."

3. Sin has Consequences

Romans 6:23

"For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

4. Sin in the Heart

Matthew 15:18-19

"But what comes out of the mouth comes from the heart, and this defiles a person. For from the heart come evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, sexual immoralities, thefts, false testimonies, slander."

5. God's Solution for Sin

1 John 1:9

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

Sin can be defined as going your own way, trusting and acting on your own opinions and feelings instead of on God's truth.

James 4:17

"So it is sin to know the good and yet not do it."

The Bible teaches that every human being is infected at the core with a sinful nature.

Romans 3:10-12

"There is no one righteous, not even one. There is no one who understands; there is no one who seeks God. All have turned away; all alike have become worthless. There is no one who does what is good, not even one."

Sin brings brokenness into our personal lives, our culture and the world. James 1:14-15

"But each person is tempted when he is drawn away and enticed by his own evil desire. Then after desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin, and when sin is fully grown, it gives birth to death."

Galatians 5:19-21

"Now the works of the flesh are obvious: sexual immorality, moral impurity, promiscuity, idolatry, sorcery, hatreds, strife, jealousy, outbursts of anger, selfish ambitions, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and anything similar. I am warning you about these things—as I warned you before—that those who practice such things will not inherit the kingdom of God."

- 1. Based on Romans 3:23 and 1 John 3:4, how would you define sin in your own words, and what does it mean to "miss the mark" or practice "lawlessness" in the context of your relationship with God?
- 2. Romans 6:23 states that the "wages of sin is death." What are some practical ways you see the consequences of sin manifesting in personal lives or society, and how does the promise of "eternal life in Christ Jesus" offer hope?
- 3. Matthew 15:18-19 emphasizes that sin originates in the heart. How can we guard our hearts against sinful thoughts and desires, and what role does God's grace play in this process according to 1 John 1:9?
- 4. James 4:17 describes sin as failing to do what is good when you know it. Can you share an example from your life or observations where knowing the right thing to do but not doing it led to negative outcomes? How can we better align our actions with God's will?
- 5. Galatians 5:19-21 lists specific "works of the flesh" that are contrary to God's kingdom. Which of these do you see as most prevalent in today's culture, and how can individuals or communities counteract these behaviors to live in alignment with God's truth?



Jesus STEP 1B

Understanding who Jesus is, lies at the heart of the Christian faith. His identity as the Son of God, Savior, and Lord shapes our relationship with God and our purpose in life.

Let's explore key scriptures to reveal Jesus' nature, mission, and significance, encouraging us to reflect on how we respond to Him.

1. Jesus is the Son of God

John 1:1, 14

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God... The Word became flesh and dwelt among us. We observed his glory, the glory as the one and only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth."

2. Jesus is the Savior

Luke 2:11

"Today in the city of David a Savior was born for you, who is the Messiah, the Lord."

3. Jesus is the Way, the Truth, and the Life

John 14:6

"Jesus told him, 'I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

4. Jesus is the Good Shepherd

John 10:11

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

5. Jesus is the King of Kings

Revelation 19:16

"On his robe and on his thigh he has a name written: King of kings and Lord of lords."

Jesus is fully God and fully human, sent to reconcile humanity to God through His life, death, and resurrection.

Colossians 1:15-16

"He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For everything was created by him, in heaven and on earth, the visible and the invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things have been created through him and for him."

His mission was to seek and save the lost, offering salvation to all who believe.

Luke 19:10

"For the Son of Man has come to seek and to save the lost."

Through His sacrifice, Jesus provides forgiveness and eternal life.

1 Peter 2:24

"He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree; so that, having died to sins, we might live for righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed."

Jesus calls us to follow Him, trusting in His lordship and living according to His teachings.

Matthew 16:24

"Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to follow after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me."

Peace STEP 1C

The Bible teaches that true peace comes from a right relationship with God, which is disrupted by sin but restored through Jesus Christ.

Let's explore how sin prevents peace, how God's grace offers forgiveness, and how we can live in the peace that surpasses understanding.

1. Sin Disrupts Our Peace

Isaiah 59:2

"But your iniquities have separated you from your God; your sins have hidden his face from you so that he will not hear."

2. God Promises Peace Through Christ

John 16:33

"I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."

3. Peace Through Confession and Forgiveness

1 John 1:9

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness."

4. Peace Through Trusting God

Philippians 4:6-7

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

5. Living in Peace with Others

Romans 12:18

"If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone."

Sin creates chaos and conflict, both within us and in our relationships.

The Bible describes peace as a gift from God, available through faith, repentance, and surrender to His will.

Psalm 29:11

"The Lord gives strength to his people; the Lord blesses his people with peace."

Sinful behaviors, such as selfishness, anger, or pride, rob us of peace, while trusting in God's provision and forgiveness restores it.

Colossians 3:15

"Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful."

STEP 2B

"Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, so that you may discern what is the good, pleasing, and perfect will of God."

5. Rely on the Holy Spirit for Guidance

John 16:13

"When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth. For he will not speak on his own, but he will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come."

6. Guard Against Distractions

Luke 10:40-42

"But Martha was distracted by her many tasks, and she came up and asked, 'Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to serve alone? So

tell her to give me a hand.' The Lord answered her, 'Martha, Martha, you are worried and upset about many things, but one thing is necessary. Mary has made the right choice, and it will not be taken away from her."

7. Approach with Faith and Expectation

Hebrews 4:12

"For the word of God is living and effective and sharper than any doubleedged sword, penetrating as far as the separation of soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart."

STEP 2C

"The entirety of Your word is truth, and all Your righteous judgments endure forever."

3. The Bible is Historically Reliable

Luke 1:1-4

"Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative about the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as the original eyewitnesses and servants of the word handed them down to us, it seemed good to me also, having carefully investigated everything from the very first, to write to you in an orderly sequence... so that you may know the certainty of the things about which you have been instructed."

4. The Bible is Preserved Through Time

Isaiah 40:8

"The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God remains forever."

5. The Bible Transforms Lives

Hebrews 4:12

"For the word of God is living and effective and sharper than any doubleedged sword, penetrating as far as the separation of soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart."

The Bible claims to be God's revelation to humanity, guiding us in truth and righteousness.

"Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth."

The Bible's consistency, fulfilled prophecies, and historical accuracy support its reliability.

2 Peter 1:21

"For no prophecy was ever produced by the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit."

The Bible addresses human needs, offering hope, guidance, and restoration through God's promises.

Romans 15:4

"For whatever was written in the past was written for our instruction, so that we may have hope through endurance and through the encouragement from the Scriptures."

Honoring God

STEP 3A

Honoring God is at the heart of a life rooted in faith. It involves aligning our thoughts, actions, and desires with His will, reflecting His character in all we do.

Let's explore what it means to honor God, the challenges we face, and how we can live lives that glorify Him.

1. Honoring God Through Obedience

1 Samuel 15:22

"Does the Lord take pleasure in burnt offerings and sacrifices as much as in obeying the voice of the Lord? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to listen than the fat of rams."

2. Honoring God with Our Worship

John 4:23-24

"But an hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and in truth, for the Father is seeking such people to worship him. God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth."

3. Honoring God in Our Speech

Colossians 4:6

"Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you should answer each person."

4. Honoring God with Our Lives

1 Corinthians 10:31

"So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God."

5. Honoring God Through Love

1 John 4:7-8

"Dear friends, let us love one another, because love is from God, and everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. The one who does not love does not know God, because God is love."

Honoring God means living in a way that reflects His glory, prioritizes His will, and demonstrates His love to others.

Psalm 29:2

"Ascribe to the Lord the glory due his name; worship the Lord in the splendor of his holiness."

The Bible teaches that honoring God requires intentionality, as our natural inclinations can lead us away from His purposes.

Romans 12:1-2

"Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship. Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will."

Honoring God impacts every area of our lives, from our choices to our relationships, shaping us to reflect His character.

Matthew 5:16

"In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven."

- 1. Based on 1 Samuel 15:22 and Romans 12:1-2, what does it mean to honor God through obedience, and how does this differ from simply following religious rituals or traditions?
- 2. John 4:23-24 emphasizes worshiping God "in Spirit and truth." What are some practical ways you can cultivate authentic worship in your daily life, and what challenges do you face in doing so?

The Old & New

STEP 3B

The Bible presents a contrast between the "old self" (our sinful nature) and the "new self" (the transformed life in Christ). This battle between the old and new shapes our spiritual journey, as we seek to live in alignment with God's will through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Let's explore key scriptures to understand this struggle, its implications, and how we can walk in the newness of life.

1. The Old Self: Bound to Sin

Romans 6:6

"We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body ruled by sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin."

2. The New Self: Created in Christ

Ephesians 4:22-24

"You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness."

3. The Battle Within

Galatians 5:16-17

"So I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the flesh desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the flesh. They are in conflict with each other, so that you are not to do whatever you want."

4. Victory Through Christ

Romans 7:24-25

"What a wretched man I am! Who will rescue me from this body that is subject to death? Thanks be to God, who delivers me through Jesus Christ our Lord!"

5. Living as the New Self

Colossians 3:9-10

"Do not lie to each other, since you have taken off your old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator."

6. The Role of the Holy Spirit

John 16:13

"But when he, the Spirit of truth, comes, he will guide you into all the truth. He will not speak on his own; he will speak only what he hears, and he will tell you what is yet to come."

7. The Call to Persevere

Philippians 3:12-14

"Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already arrived at my goal, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus."

The battle between the old and new is a daily reality for believers. The "old self" represents our sinful nature, prone to rebellion against God, while the "new self" reflects the transformed life made possible through Christ's sacrifice and the indwelling Holy Spirit. Though the struggle is real, God equips us to overcome through His grace, truth, and power.

- 1. Based on Romans 6:6 and Ephesians 4:22-24, what does it mean to "put off" the old self and "put on" the new self? How can you practically apply this in your daily life?
- 2. Galatians 5:16-17 describes the conflict between the flesh and the Spirit. What are some specific areas in your life where you feel this battle most strongly, and how can walking by the Spirit help you overcome these struggles?
- 3. Romans 7:24-25 expresses Paul's desperation and hope in Christ's deliverance. Can you share a time when you felt overwhelmed by your "old self" but experienced God's rescue? How does this give you hope for ongoing battles?
- 4. Colossians 3:9-10 emphasizes that the new self is "being renewed" in God's image. What role does growing in knowledge of God (through Scripture, prayer, etc.) play in this renewal process? How can you prioritize this in your spiritual walk?
- 5. According to Philippians 3:12-14, perseverance is key in the journey toward the new self. What are some practical steps you can take to "press on" and leave behind the patterns of the old self, especially when you face setbacks or temptation?



Prayer STEP 3C

Prayer is a vital part of the Christian life, a direct line of communication with God. Yet, many struggle with understanding how to pray effectively or feel intimidated by it.

Let's explore what the Bible says about prayer, its purpose, and how we can approach it with simplicity and confidence.

1. Prayer is Relational Communication with God

Philippians 4:6-7

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

2. Prayer is an Expression of Faith

James 5:15

"And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven."

3. Prayer Aligns Us with God's Will

1 John 5:14-15

"This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us. And if we know that he hears us—whatever we ask—we know that we have what we asked of him."

4. Prayer is Persistent and Humble

Luke 18:1-8

"Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up..." (The Parable of the Persistent Widow).

5. Jesus Models Prayer for Us

Matthew 6:9-13

"This, then, is how you should pray: 'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven..."

Prayer is simply talking to God, bringing our hearts, needs, and desires before Him while trusting His goodness and sovereignty.

Hebrews 4:16

"Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need."

The Bible teaches that prayer is not about complex rituals or perfect words but about a sincere heart seeking God.

Psalm 145:18

"The Lord is near to all who call on him, to all who call on him in truth."

Prayer transforms us, deepens our relationship with God, and invites His power into our lives.

Colossians 4:2

"Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful."

Live On Purpose

STEP 4A

Living on purpose means aligning our lives with God's will, pursuing His calling, and reflecting His love and truth in all we do. The Bible emphasizes that God has a unique plan for each of us, and living intentionally allows us to fulfill His purpose and bring glory to Him.

Let's explore key scriptures to understand how to live on purpose, the barriers we face, and how to walk in God's plan for our lives.

1. God's Purpose for You

Jeremiah 29:11

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

2. Called to Glorify God

1 Corinthians 10:31

"So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God."

3. Equipped for Good Works

Ephesians 2:10

"For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."

4. Overcoming Distractions

Hebrews 12:1-2

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith."

5. Living by the Spirit

Galatians 5:16

"So I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh."

Living on purpose involves trusting God's plan, seeking His guidance, and intentionally choosing actions that align with His truth.

Proverbs 3:5-6

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight."

The Bible teaches that God created us with intention, but sin, distractions, and self-reliance can pull us away from His purpose.

Philippians 3:13-14

"Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus."

Distractions and sinful desires can derail us from God's purpose, but His Spirit empowers us to stay focused.

Romans 12:2

"Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will."

- 3. Hebrews 12:1-2 mentions hindrances and sin that can entangle us. What are some common distractions or sins that keep you from living on purpose, and how can focusing on Jesus help you overcome them?
- 4. Proverbs 3:5-6 emphasizes trusting God over our own understanding. Can you share a time when relying on your own plans led you astray? How can submitting to God's guidance help you live more purposefully?

Disciple Making

STEP 4B

Disciple making is a central calling for every Christian, reflecting Jesus' command to spread His teachings and help others grow in faith. Understanding disciple making equips us to live out the Great Commission and build God's kingdom.

Let's explore key scriptures to define disciple making, its importance, and how we can actively participate in it.

1. The Call to Make Disciples

Matthew 28:18-20

"Then Jesus came to them and said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

2. Disciples Follow and Imitate Christ

Luke 9:23

"Then he said to them all: 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me.""

3. Disciples Bear Fruit

John 15:8

"This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples."

4. Disciples Love One Another

John 13:34-35

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

5. Disciples Equip Others

2 Timothy 2:2

"And the things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses entrust to reliable people who will also be qualified to teach others."

Disciple making involves intentionally guiding others to follow Jesus, grow in faith, and replicate this process in others' lives. It requires personal commitment, teaching, and modeling Christlike character.

Ephesians 4:11-12

"So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up."

The Bible teaches that disciple making is not optional but a core part of the Christian life, impacting individuals and communities for eternity.

Acts 1:8

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

Disciple making transforms lives by spreading the gospel and fostering spiritual growth.

Colossians 1:28-29

"He is the one we proclaim, admonishing and teaching everyone with all wisdom, so that we may present everyone fully mature in Christ. To this end I strenuously contend with all the energy Christ so powerfully works in me."

- 4. John 13:34-35 emphasizes that love identifies disciples. Share an example where love (or lack of it) impacted a relationship or community. How can showing Christlike love strengthen your efforts in disciple making?
- 5. 2 Timothy 2:2 highlights the importance of equipping others to teach. What steps can you take to mentor or train someone in their faith journey? How can you identify "reliable people" to pass on what you've learned, as Paul instructed Timothy?



Be The Church

STEP 4C

The call to "Be The Church" is a challenge to live out our faith actively, reflecting Christ's love, truth, and mission in our daily lives. The Church is not merely a building but the body of believers united in purpose to glorify God and serve others.

Let's explore what it means to embody the Church through our actions, relationships, and devotion to God's mission.

1. The Church as the Body of Christ

1 Corinthians 12:27

"Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it."

2. Called to Love and Serve

John 13:34-35

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

3. Equipped for Good Works

Ephesians 2:10

"For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."

4. Proclaiming the Gospel

Matthew 28:19-20

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

5. Living in Unity

Ephesians 4:3-6

"Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all."

Being the Church means living as a community of believers who actively demonstrate Christ's love, share the Gospel, and work together to fulfill God's purposes.

Acts 2:42-47

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

The early Church modeled devotion, generosity, and community, showing us how to live as the Church today.

Colossians 3:16-17

"Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

- 1. Based on 1 Corinthians 12:27 and Ephesians 4:3-6, what does it mean to you to be part of the "body of Christ"? How can you contribute to the unity and mission of the Church in your daily life?
