Shortly after completely giving her life to Christ on December 2, 1873, Frances Havergal, at the age of 36, *"found herself spending several days with ten people in a house, some of them unconverted. Others were Christians, but not fully surrendered to Christ. "Lord, give me all in this house," she prayed. She went to work witnessing, and before she left, all ten were yielded Christians. On the last night of her visit, Frances – so excited to sleep – wrote this great consecration hymn, "Take my Life and Let It Be."*

In the years that followed, Frances frequently used this hymn in her own devotions, especially every December 2nd, on the anniversary of her consecration.

On one occasion, as she pondered the words, "Take my voice and let me sing/ always only for my King," she felt she should give up her secular concerts. Her beautiful voice was in demand, and she frequently sang with the Philharmonic. But from that moment, her lips were exclusively devoted to the songs of the Lord." (Morgan, Robert J. Then Sings My Soul: 150 of the World's Greatest Hymn Stories. Nashville: Thomas Nelson, 2003, pg. 191.)

As I read this story, I find myself reflecting on my own commitment to Christ. To be fair, I don't have a particular date in mind when I committed my life to be a faithful disciple of Christ, but I can certainly tell story after story of moments in my life when my commitment felt renewed and strengthened. Perhaps you can do the same, or maybe you're not sure you have made that commitment yet. Either way, I want to encourage you to consider this: *What does it mean to fully commit ourselves to Christ?*

For Havergal, this meant repurposing her gifts and talents, using her singing voice to sing songs of praise and help others do so, as well. Do you have gifts and talents that God might be inviting you to use for the sake of ministry?

For others, being fully committed to Christ means being willing to step outside of our comfort zones in order to serve how God is inviting us to serve. What comfort zones do we currently occupy, and how might they limit us from serving God as we're called?

Or, perhaps there's something else standing in your way. Sometimes, committing ourselves to Christ means overcoming an obstacle in our own lives. Rev. Jorge

Acevedo, a United Methodist Pastor in Florida, openly shares about Christ's transformation in his life, freeing him from a life of addiction that kept him from living fully as a disciple of Christ. Interestingly, his ministry has largely involved helping others who suffer from addiction discover a similar freedom. Is there something in your life that needs to change in order for you to fully commit your life to Christ? If so, remember that God doesn't wait for us to set ourselves free. Instead, God desires to be a part of setting us free.

Finally, others experience this commitment to Christ as a commitment to learning something new! While we may not know what we don't know, we do trust that God is always at work in teaching us. But are we willing to learn? What is God inviting you to learn?

Whether or not you feel you've fully committed yourself to Christ at one point, at multiple points, or over a span of time, perhaps this new year is an opportunity for you to fully consecrate your life to Christ? What is God inviting you to learn or to overcome? What is God inviting you to do, and what talents is God inviting you to repurpose?

This new year, I want to invite you to commit this verse to memory: **"Look! I'm doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it?"** – Isaiah 43:19

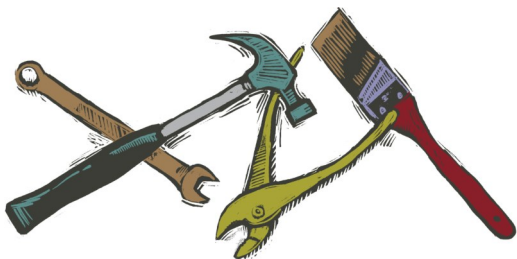

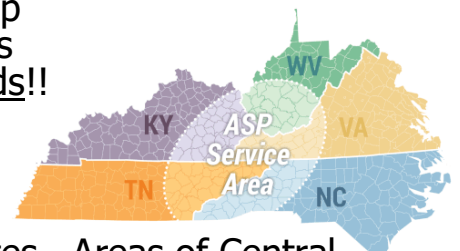

Happy New Year!

The new year brings renewed hope and new goals. As you set your goals for 2026, look for ways you can increase your commitment to **living faith, seeking justice and pursuing peace**. You don't have to look far to find opportunities. If you are not sure where to start or how to set a goal, reach out to the Church and Society Team, or grab a copy of the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church book in the library. As you read, think about how the principles align with things going on in the world. If there are areas of incongruity in our world (hint... there are many), think about how you can change it? The Church and Society Team has made a commitment to being more visible in the community in 2026 and advocating for change aligning with the 2025-26 legislative priorities of the UMC Church and Society. Won't you join us? United Methodist Advocacy Day in Lansing is on Wednesday, March 18th.

On 11/25/25, The General Board of Church and Society sent out an email with information about joining the call to boycott Chevron, reaffirming a commitment to human rights, peace, and international law following the UMC Social Principles. This is part of a global campaign to boycott Chevron products, including Chevron gas stations, Chevron auto supplies, and Chevron-sponsored events. This boycott is due to their significant partnership in the military blockade of Gaza that included the exploitation of Palestinian land and resources. If you want more information on how you can take part in the boycott, please reach out to a Church and Society Team Member. We will also have more resources available at the church regarding the boycott.

PEACE WITH JUSTICE

What does the Bible say?

- ~Doom to those who acquire house after house, who annex field to field until there is no more space left and only you live alone in the land. (**Isaiah 5:8**)
- ~They have treated the wound of my people carelessly, saying “peace, peace,” when there is no peace. (**Jeremiah 6:14**)
- ~Speak out for those who cannot speak, for the rights of all the destitute. Speak out, judge righteously, defend the rights of the poor and needy. (**Proverbs 31:8-9**)



What does the United Methodist Church say?

- ~We urge the church to care and work for systemic justice for all people affected by war, and to advocate for peacemaking and nonviolent conflict transformation in global and local conflicts. (**Social Principles, ¶ 163.F**)
- ~We affirm the important work of the United Nations in promoting peace and security, championing human dignity and human rights. (**Social Principles ¶ 163**)
- ~The United Methodist Church opposes continued military occupation of the West Bank, Gaza, East Jerusalem, and also the Syrian Golan Heights, the confiscation of Palestinian land and water resources, the destruction of Palestinian homes, the continued blockade of Gaza where over half the residents are children, the military detention of Palestinian children-often without trial, the continued building of illegal Jewish settlements, and any vision of a “Greater Israel” that includes the occupied territories and the whole of Jerusalem and its surroundings. (**2020/2024 Book of Resolutions, #4108**)
- ~In our call for an end to the Israeli occupation we affirm the church’s commitment to nonviolent responses to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and acknowledge the need to hear the voices of all those-Muslim, Christian and Jewish-harmed by the conflict, including the Palestinian Christians as voiced in the Kairos Palestine document. (**2020/2024 Book of Resolutions, #4108**)
- ~We ask all companies that profit from and/or support settlements through their business activities to examine these and stop any business that contributes to serious violations of international law, promotes systemic discrimination, or otherwise supports ongoing military occupation or attempted annexation. The United Methodist Church does not support a boycott of products made in Israel. Our opposition is to products made by companies operating in occupied Palestinian territories. (**2020/2024 Book of Resolutions, #4108, “Opposition to Israeli Settlements on Palestinian Land”**)



What do the facts say?

- Tens of thousands of civilians have been killed since the bombardment of Gaza that began after October 7, 2023.¹
- As of early 2023, there are 565 movement obstacles in the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, often between Palestinian cities and not Palestine and Israel.²
- 28,000 Palestinian structures have been demolished in the Occupied Palestinian Territories since 1967.³
- Most Gazans do not have access to safe drinking water, worsening with the recent hostilities. Moreover, 100 Palestinian villages pre-existing the founding of the state exist in Israel, but are not recognized by the Israeli government and receive no services (water, electricity, sanitation, roads, etc.) from the Israeli government.⁴

GBUMC Giving Tree 2025 A Huge Success!!

THANK YOU for your support of the Giving Tree this Christmas. Cathy Mitchinson set up the Sign Up Genius account and it was another successful experience, thank you Cathy! This year the FISH clothes closet received 121 pairs of girls socks, 97 pairs of boys socks, 272 pairs of girls underwear, 84 pairs of boys underwear, 15 pairs of boys jeans, 8 boys sweatshirts, and 22 pairs of boys sweatpants. The Methodist Children's Village received 23 gift cards totaling \$475.00. We also collected items for the Ennis Center for Children in Flint including 6 boxes of diapers, 15 deodorants, 11 shampoos, 3 conditioners, 5 body washes, 28 bars of soap, 3 Bible Bedtime stories, 2 lunchbox cards and 2 punch needle kits; Ennis is also receiving a \$200 check from Third Sunday Mission Funds for back-to-school items. 12 Residents of Medilodge (without family in the area) were given blankets, wooden Christmas trees and toiletry items. The GBUMC Prayer Shawl Ministry donated 24 hats for these FISH family children (14 girls and 10 boys). Additionally, each family received at least four gifts per child (over 100 gifts total) and a \$25 gas card from the sponsors listed below.

Helping people, changing lives: 3 health benefits of volunteering

Volunteers make an immeasurable difference in people's lives and often serve to help others. Did you know that volunteering can benefit your health as well?

Research has shown that volunteering offers significant health benefits, especially for older adults, including:

1. Improves physical and mental health. Volunteer activities keep people moving and thinking at the same time. Research has found that volunteering among adults, age 60 and over, provided benefits to physical and mental health. Volunteers report better physical health than non-volunteers. Research also has shown that volunteering leads to lower rates of depression and anxiety, especially for people 65 and older.

Volunteering reduces stress and increases positive, relaxed feelings by releasing dopamine. By spending time in service to others, volunteers report feeling a sense of meaning and appreciation, both given and received, which can have a stress-reducing effect.

Reduced stress further decreases the risk of some physical and mental health problems, such as heart disease, stroke, depression, anxiety and general illness. In addition, people who volunteer have lower mortality rates than those who do not, even when controlling for age, gender and physical health.

2. Provides a sense of purpose and teaches valuable skills. The work that volunteers provide is essential to everyday activities, giving volunteers a sense of purpose, especially when giving their time and talent in the areas they find meaningful. Older volunteers experience greater increases in life satisfaction and self-esteem.

3. Nurture new and existing relationships. Volunteering increases social interaction and helps build a support system based on common interests. One of the best ways to make new friends and strengthen existing relationships is to participate in a shared activity.
