The United Methodist Social Creed

We believe in God, Creator of the world; and in Jesus Christ, the Redeemer of creation. We believe in the Holy Spirit, through whom we acknowledge God's gifts, and we repent of our sin in misusing these gifts to idolatrous ends.

We affirm the natural world as God's handiwork and dedicate ourselves to its preservation, enhancement, and faithful use by humankind.

We joyfully receive for ourselves and others the blessings of community, sexuality, marriage, and the family.

We commit ourselves to the rights of men, women, children, youth, young adults, the aging, and people with disabilities; to improvement of the quality of life; and to the rights and dignity of all persons.

We believe in the right and duty of persons to work for the glory of God and the good of themselves and others and in the protection of their welfare in so doing; in the rights to property as a trust from God, collective bargaining, and responsible consumption; and in the elimination of economic and social distress. We dedicate ourselves to peace throughout the world, to the rule of justice and law among nations, and to individual freedom for all people of the world.

We believe in the present and final triumph of God's Word in human affairs and gladly accept our commission to manifest the life of the gospel in the world. Amen.

The words you just read are from The United Methodist Church's "Social Creed." This statement, first originated in the early 20th century as a response to – or perhaps a voice crying out for justice *in* a world that was facing societal, relational, as well as geopolitical challenges that threatened the wellbeing of the global community. As it has been updated in the 100+ years since to reflect continued relevance, it remains a valuable part of The United Methodist's theological and Christ-focused presence in the world.

My hope is that you've already read the "Social Creed" (unless you skipped over it to get to my article), but I want to encourage you to go back and read it again. I wonder, what stood out to you most?

Perhaps what stood out to you was the beginning words which sound much like the other Christian creeds we're familiar with. The United Methodist "Social Creed" begins with statements of belief about God as Trinity (Father, Son and Holy Spirit) and God's forgiveness toward us as a response to our sin and our repentance. I think it's important to note that our denomination has always held – and continues to hold to a fidelity to God's redemptive and restorative work in the world through God's Holy Spirit!

Or, perhaps what caught your attention most was the way the "Social Creed" addresses various social issues that have a timeless relevance in our world: our

intrinsic human worth; dignity in our work, living, and relationships; commitments to justice, the rule of law, and individual freedoms; and much more. While it may seem as though each of these hold selfevident importance, it is worth noting that we (both the church and secular society) regularly struggle with these concepts, particularly as we find ourselves, from time to time, abandoning our fidelity to Christ in exchange for a fidelity to idols – particularly idols which have earned broad social acceptance.

We confess that, at times, we celebrate and promote economics that base a persons worth on their ability to work/produce. Historically and even presently, we find that value is afforded to certain populations over others based on socioeconomic status, particular utility, and even racial/ethnic prejudice. We allow the sins of nationalism, xenophobia, and desires for homogony to dismiss the importance of the global community and the values of the beloved community that are present in the Kingdom of God. We prioritize comfort, profit and prosperity at the expense of environmental stewardship. We simply must confess that we have fallen short of Christ's command to love God and to love our neighbor as ourselves. We have work to do.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our confession.

Finally, I wonder if what caught your attention was the closing sentence: "We believe in the present and final triumph of God's Word in human affairs and gladly accept our commission to manifest the life of the gospel in the world." Here, we find ourselves recommitting to the incarnation of God's love present in Christ, and to being reflections of the grace we discover in the gospel – the good news. In a world full of hunger for good news, is there anything more refreshing than Christ's gospel in our worldly affairs?

The word "Creed" simply means "belief." As Christians, we simply cannot escape the fact that any proclamation of our love for Christ – our beliefs - must be met with a concern for the wellbeing of our neighbors and all of God's creation. It is my prayer that we will recognize that one without the other – love of Christ without care for God's creation – is not reflective of the fullness of the gospel. May we commit ourselves to the words of this "Social Creed" and pledge to live them out in our lives.



What does the Bible say?

Woe to those who make unjust laws, to those who issue oppressive decrees, to deprive the poor of their rights and withhold justice from the oppressed of my people. Isaiah 10:1-2

But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you...and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will have your welfare. Jeremiah 29:7

God has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; God has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. Luke 1;52-53



What does the United Methodist Church say?

We decry the widening gap between the rich and the poor and the concentration of wealth in the hands of ever smaller percentages of the global population. We lament that too many of the world's people lack the basic resources necessary for survival and pledge ourselves to work toward the eradication of the roots and effects of poverty. (The Economic Community, Economic Challenges, B. Poverty and **Income Inequality**)



National budgets are moral documents. They are a testament to national priorities. May it be that such budgets invest in life-giving and life-sustaining priorities, indeed, the things that make for peace. (2020/2024 **Book of Resolutions, #4111, The United Methodist Church and Peace)**

The challenges of establishing fair and just tax systems are global. While some nations offer stronger social safety nets funded through more equitable tax systems, everywhere the forces of power and privilege seek to change structures to their benefit, oftentimes at the expense of our poorest and most vulnerable brothers and sisters. In our world economy, too often those individuals and corporations with the most wealth are most able to avoid the social responsibility of taxes by finding exemptions in local tax law or by using varied nations' tax regulations. (2020/2024 Book of Resolutions, #2111, A Call for Just Tax Structures) The gap between the rich and poor continues to widen worldwide. The eighty-five richest people in the world control as much wealth at the poorest half of the world (source: Oxfam). As our Companion Litany to Our Social Creed states: "God cries with the masses of starving people, despises growing disparity between rich and poor...And so shall we." (2020/2024 Book of Resolutions, #2111, A Call for Just Tax Structures)

What do the facts say?

- Worldwide, health related expenses accounted for 15.5% of total government spending.
- Military spending by the United States each year is four times greater than the next highest spending country (China) and more than the military budgets of the ten highest spending countries combined.
- Since 1990, the number of people living in extreme income poverty has been reduced by more than one billion and yet over 20,000 children die each day due to poverty-related conditions. 3
- The wealthiest eight individuals in the world have amassed more wealth than the poorest 3.6 billion people in the world combined.
- Governments are losing \$500 billion in revenue each year as companies shift and shield profits to low-tax jurisdictions. 5
- The fifteen countries that comprise the Economic Community of West African States are losing an estimated \$9.6 billion in public revenue each year because of tax preferences given to foreign companies.

- Reflect on the assets and needs in your community. Where can your spending—and the collective spending of institutions and governments-support life-giving and life-sustaining priorities?
- Learn more about your government's tax and spending decisions. In the United States, visit the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities (cbpp.org) for the latest analysis of proposed legislation.
- Contact your elected officials and tell them that budgets are moral documents and should reflect our shared values by uplifting the common good, supporting the poor and vulnerable, building peace in communities and among nations.

15 Ways to Pray for Your Pastor. A UMC.org Feature by Joe Iovino

One of the best ways we can support our pastors and show them our appreciation is to regularly pray for them.

- 1. **Spiritual Lives**. Our pastors lives are important to their finding the wisdom, strength and guidance necessary to lead a church. Pray for your pastor's growth as a disciple of Jesus Christ, as the Holy Spirit works through them to serve your congregation and community.
- 2.**Time Management**. With all of their responsibilities, United Methodist pastors need to become masters of their calendars. John Wesley knew this back in the 1700s. He instructed the preachers, "Never trifle away time." Pray for your pastors to use time wisely, including blocking out occasions for Sabbath rest, prayer, work and family.
- 3.**Families**. Speaking of families, it is important to remember that our ministers may also be a spouse, a parent, and a child to parents who have needs. Remember to pray for your pastor's family.
- 4.**Preaching**. Delivering a great sermon (and the ones that are less than great) takes hours of study and preparation. Pray for your pastors as they prepare worship services, sacraments and sermons. May they have the words to communicate what God has placed on their hearts.
- 5.**Strength**. The work of a pastor requires reserves of spiritual and emotional strength. Ask God to bolster ministers' hearts and minds, especially on days when they feel weak, inadequate, or unqualified.
- 6. **Visiting Ministries**. Visiting people in hospital rooms, nursing homes, rehabilitation centers, memory centers, hospice units, homes and jail cells, is an important part of your pastor's job. Pray for his ability to connect with those who are struggling and share God's comfort, peace and hope.
- 7.**Leadership**. Pastors shepherd their congregations, lead individuals to Christ and guide the church as a witness to the work of God in our communities. Pray for your pastor's ability to lead your congregation.
- 8. **Decision-making**. Being a leader includes making difficult decisions. Sometimes that means making a call when the "right answer" is elusive. Other times it is about making an unpopular choice. Pray for God to guide your pastor's decisions.
- 9.Ministry with the poor. Pastors are called upon to help those who do not have enough food, rent money, or the ability to pay a utility bill. They also lead their congregations to do the same. Pray that your pastor has the wisdom and resources necessary to help those in need, and that he might represent Jesus well to those who feel forgotten.
- 10.**Communication**. We've all sent a note, email or text that is misunderstood by the recipient. Ministers reach out to so many people miscommunication is nearly impossible to avoid. Ask God to make your pastor's communication clear and for grace when he is misunderstood.
- 11.**Conflict**. Conflicts sometimes arise when people miscommunicate and disagree. Some conflicts are serious, while others are petty. Pray for your pastor's strength, wisdom, patience and discernment as they navigate the conflicts that arise.
- 12. **Vision**. United Methodist pastors help set the vision for their congregations. Pray that your pastor may clearly see where God is leading your church and for opportunities for ministries to grow in those areas.
- 13. **Finances**. Money worries can be a big distraction. Pray for financial peace for your pastor, both with the congregation's budget and his family finances.
- 14. **Health**. Your pastor's physical health is important. Pray for them to take time to care for their bodies through rest, exercise, and eating well.
- 15.**Encouragement**. Pray for your pastors to be encouraged today. Pray that they might know in their hearts the differences they make in the lives of individuals, in your congregation, and in your community.






