Hymn #28 is set to the tune played in our gathering music today.


In worship a congregation is called to listen to God and to respond in faith and prayer. The Call to Worship states our intention to make this worship time solely about the Lord God.

Mission Highlight

Arise Collective is a Raleigh-based non-profit whose mission is to equip women with the tools they need to heal, grow, and thrive, both in prison and in the communities to which they return.

Arise Collective (formerly Interfaith Prison Ministry for Women) was started by women at First Presbyterian Church Raleigh in 1980 when a Presbyterian Coordinating Committee of Presbyteries across the state came together to fund the first female chaplain in the North Carolina prison system. Over the next four decades, the organization has provided chaplaincy services and, more recently, transition education and reentry support for women, primarily in and around the North Carolina Correctional Institute for Women (NCCIW) and its minimum-security Canary unit, but now, supporting women incarcerated across the State. The organization became a 501(c)(3) non-profit in 2004.

Ultimately, Arise Collective envisions women who are thriving in communities that embrace their value and potential. Through empowerment as well as providing resources, opportunities, and support, Arise Collective believes in journeying with both incarcerated and formerly incarcerated women with compassion and fairness. By walking alongside women during their imprisonment as well as their reentry process, Arise Collective hopes that women can successfully reintegrate into society and lead fulfilling lives.

Serving prison time is often both traumatic and transformational. Women leaving prison face challenges such as health issues, substance use, lack of adequate education and job skills, limited housing options, and unreliable transportation as they reenter society. Even after women leave prison, they confront countless barriers to vote, access housing, and find employment. Arise Collective serves incarcerated and formerly incarcerated women in 4 program areas: chaplaincy services, transition education, reentry support, and community engagement.

The FPC Mission budget supports the mission and ministry of Arise Collective.
