rinity's Guatemala Mission Team arrived in Guatemala City on Saturday, May 3, 2025. For the first time, we had team members traveling from North Carolina, Jacksonville, Orlando, Tallahassee, and Panama City. With that many different flights, what could possibly go wrong? Our one traveler from Panama City was delayed leaving Panama City and missed his flight from Dallas to Guatemala City. Our three travelers from Asheville, North Carolina, were five hours delayed leaving Asheville and missed their connection from Miami to Guatemala City. But guess what? Everyone got to Guatemala City within two hours of each other! That was miracle number one of the trip. We were off to a great start.

After a harrowing four-hour bus ride from Guatemala City, we arrived in Panajachel, our home-base for the week. We checked into the Hotel California (not kidding) and enjoyed a wonderful meal at Porch de Salomon. (There may have been a glass of wine or a beer or two involved.) ## Guatemala Mission Trip 2025, continued

Sunday morning, we enjoyed a boat ride across Lake Atitlan to a lovely resort called Casa Del Mundo (House of the World). We were treated to an amazing brunch of freshly prepared meals full of local fruits, eggs, and vegetables. After brunch we had plenty of time to get to know each other while relaxing and enjoying the beauty of God's creation surrounding us with flower gardens and breathtaking views of the lake surrounded by dormant volcanoes. For a team where some of us had never met each other, we gelled pretty quickly and shared our excitement of the coming week. That was miracle number two of the trip.

Monday morning, bright and early, we shared breakfast and a devotional prepared by the Wesley Foundation team. They were so heartfelt and sincere, and turned our hearts and minds to the tasks ahead and to God's purpose in bringing us to this place.

## **Constructing a Home**

The construction team met and fell in love with the Hom Tax family. This family of five has been struggling in many ways. Father, Mr. Rafael, has epilepsy that requires daily medication. He works as a street vendor and has not been able to find other work due to his illness. Mother, Mrs. Francisca, helps support the family by selling sweets and jellies on market days. They do not have a refrigerator. When sales are good, they have a combined income of \$267 per month. Son Jose is 10 years old and is in the third grade. Son Leonardo is 9 years old and is in the second grade. Son Dilan is 1 year and 7 months old and is suffering from malnutrition. Porch de Salomon assists the family by providing Pediasure supplements for him. Rafael and Francisca struggle to cover the costs of their children's education due to the instability of their income. Their home is pieced together by sheet metal and tarps. The entire family sleeps in one room that is cold at night and very hot during the day.

The construction team labored all week digging footers for the foundation with pick axes and shovels. The ground is very rocky and the site had limited shade. They encountered a large boulder that required a group effort to remove by hand. The entire family, including the children, worked alongside the team. Dilan was the unofficial site supervisor making sure everyone was doing their job correctly. By the end of the week they had finished the footers, bent rebar, mixed and poured concrete, and started laying concrete blocks; remarkable progress in such a short time. That was miracle number three of the week.


But, more important than that progress on the house were the relationships formed between the team and the family. Imagine the trust and faith of Rafael and Francisca to believe that a group of gringos from America was coming to fulfill their lifelong dream of building a simple house that would protect them from the elements, keep them and their meager belongings safe, and provide their children a place to call home. For the first time, everyone would have their own bed to sleep in.

Despite the heat and the hard work, smiles were abundant throughout the week as dreams started to become a reality and prayers were answered. And, there may have been a gringos vs. locals soccer game or two. The team identified additional needs and stepped up to supply the family with groceries, pots and pans, bed linens, and other household goods, as well as money to purchase a refrigerator when the house is finished. The family was also presented with a Trinity prayer quilt. The money to build the house was raised in memory of Bill Celander and Ed Jonas. The house is expected to be completed and dedicated in August. That was miracle number four of the week.

## **Providing Medical Care**

The medical team provided medical care and medications to a total of 325 patients (mostly children) in three different villages during the week. The team treated a variety of ailments, including body pain due to the heavy work that they do daily, infectious diseases, diabetes, high blood pressure, congenital defects, malnutrition, and injuries. Many patients were referred for testing and follow up. In addition to medications, each patient was given vitamins, soap, a washcloth, shampoo, a toothbrush, and toothpaste.

By far the most common condition we saw was depression and anxiety, more that I have ever seen on previous visits. I met one woman who had 10 children. Her husband had abandoned them 10 years ago after the birth of their last child. She was left to care for the children alone with no means to support them. It's very hard to earn an income when you are trying to care for that many children. When I asked my translator what else was contributing to these issues, she said that it is due to the current immigration situation going on in the U.S. Many of the women in these villages have relatives in the states who are working and sending them money. They live in fear that those family members will be deported and they will lose their only source of income to feed and care for their children and families. Most of the women I met were illiterate. Despite the number of patients, we had enough medicine and toiletries for everyone. That was miracle number five of the week.

On Thursday, the construction team and the medical team came together and spent the morning at an adult daycare center, Des Años Dorados (Golden Years) in San Juan Chacaya where we helped them celebrate Mother's Day. It was a very festive occasion, with music supplied by an authentic Mariachi band, dancing, door prizes for the residents, and cake. It's hard to say who had more fun: the residents or the team. Suffice it to say that a good time was had by all.

Thursday afternoon it was time to say goodbye to the Hom Tax family. Many tears were shed and many prayers uplifted. On Friday we had a chance to unwind a little and enjoy a cultural tour across the lake in San Juan La Laguna, or go zip lining for the adventurous souls. Saturday morning we made our way back to Guatemala City for our flights home. We were tired, but our hearts were full and we will carry with us our memories of a truly miraculous week. Everyone made it home safely—miracle number six of the week.

Led by Christina Drouin, founder of the Center for Strategic Planning, ideas were discussed and recorded in small groups, then presented and prioritized by vote of the total group. Through breakfast and lunch and into the afternoon, Trinity's enthusiastic participants worked together, producing over 100 ideas for strategies and many more for initiatives to activate Trinity's refreshed Vision and Goals (approved by Church Council, April 9, 2025). After more focused work by the Strategic Planning Task Force (SPTF), all strategies and initiatives will be finalized to create a true action-oriented Strategic Plan to guide us forward for the next five years.

On Wednesday, May 28, 2025, 6:00 p.m., the SPTF presented the results of their work to date to Church Council. Following that presentation, work will commence to vet the many initiatives suggested by Trinity membership. This vetting work will conclude in the summer, creating actionable plans with attached timeline goals, just in time to motivate our stewardship campaign and successfully launch us into 2026.

They gathered together, found places to worship, and worked with United Methodist Churches in Tallahassee to continue forming and growing together. Trinity UMC held the memberships of Open Hearts United Methodist in Monticello, and Saint Paul United Methodist held the memberships of Abundant Grace United Methodist in Madison. They have been our mission churches for the past two years, and it has been wonderful to worship together.

# **Does It Ever Slow Down?**

often hear people say, "It's almost summer. Things will slow down now," referring to what is happening around church. One might think that after all of the renovations that were done in 2024 in preparation for Trinity's 200th celebration that things would slow down when it comes to the building and programs. One would be incorrect. Since the celebration, we have organized and accomplished a lot—with more to come.

We have gotten a fresh coat of paint on the first and second floor, door, and trim around the worship building. This would include around the Moor Hall entrances, the entrance to Duval Street, the choir room hallway, the parlor, the conference room hallway and the music hallway on the second floor. All of the restrooms have a new look in doors as well around these locations.

We have touched-up painting in the sanctuary to keep it looking fresh and new. Thanks to a generous donation, we've updated the furnishings in the parlor. Everything is color-coordinated now. It looks fantastic. Check it out! We have continued the "Let There Be Light" program by updating more of the building to new energy-efficient LED lighting. About 97% of the building has been completed to this point! Woo-Hoo! We have begun the process of weather-sealing the outside of the education building to keep moisture out and dryness in! These old bricks (circa 1949) have indeed seen their fair share of thunderstorms and hurricanes in their tenure here and are in need of a little TLC. The plan is to have the moisture barrier in place, set and cured long before the 2025 hurricane season. This will also enable us to continue proper upkeep in several of the children and adult classrooms. Every year there are several classroom air conditioners that are in need of replacing. This year is no different. With having 75 of them in the building, upkeep can be constant.

We have been renovating several third floor classrooms to be friendlier and more accessible. Room 303 will now be a comfy curriculum resource library and reading room. When this room is open, people will be able to find Bible study curriculum and will have a place to sit and review it to see if it's something they are interested in. Room 304 is now a well-needed storage room with several organizing storage racks. The area behind the stage in Moor Hall is now used for storage. There are plans to transfer this storage to room 304 and open the back of the stage of Moor Hall to include the existing outside windows. This would make the stage area larger. It would also make it possible to bring in more natural lighting and make it more aesthetically pleasing.

Plans are in the works for updating the family restroom, just off the Welcome Center. We are preparing to make it ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant with a larger door opening that would allow adequate clearance for wheelchairs. Let's not forget about the playground where most of our children play. It has been and is being addressed as well. We have replaced worn areas of the playground surfacing with new pour-in-place rubber surfacing around the trees, under the swings, and around the sandbox. We have renewed the "Children's Garden" with new colors and textures of plants to keep young minds and imaginations stimulated. (I am always careful to make sure that the things we purchase that will be around children are attractive and non-toxic!) The bench around the Children's Garden on the playground, which I built about 12 years ago, is in need of replacing. One discussion is installing a more maintenance-free, child-sized bench to be put on the playground-facing side and a short four-foot picket fence surrounding the remaining sides. There are plans in the works to replace the wood borders on the playground with something more permanent that would entail less continued upkeep. Concrete has been discussed as a viable option.

In addition to the extra "opportunities" listed above, there is still the normal upkeep and events that are continuing to happen: the every Wednesday morning Men's Daybreak breakfast; the Wednesday night Summer Series dinners that will continue every other week during the summer; VBS is happening!; the preschool is continuing with their summer programing; Youth Week; every Sunday worship; the Tuesday and Thursday BFC exercise classes; regularly scheduled meetings...and the list goes on.

So, to answer the question, "Does it ever slow down"? Not at Trinity!

# Meet Erin Casey: New Director of Trinity United Methodist Preschool

rin Casey is a Certified Early Childhood Educator with over twenty years of experience. Over the past school year, she's been teaching three-year-olds in Trinity's weekday preschool. That means that much like her predecessor Stacey Duggar, Erin began her time with Trinity as a teacher before moving into the role of director. Erin officially began her new role on May 27, but before she got too busy, she was gracious enough to sit down

for an interview.

#### Erin, tell us a little bit about your upbringing and background.

I was born in Little Rock, Arkansas, but my dad's job moved us around the south before settling our family in Clearwater, Florida, in time for me to finish high school. From there, I attended the University of Florida (Go Gators!) and earned my degree in Early Childhood and Exceptional Student Education. Over the last 20+ years, I have taught in many different preschool classrooms while raising my five children.

#### You've served our preschool so well this year as a teacher. Describe what you see as your new role as Director.
