# PASTOR'S

POSTS

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ of St. Paul's. Where were you when Charlie Kirk was assassinated (9/10)? I remember when 9/11 happened. I was waking up preparing to go to class in St. Louis. I remember stopping and taking time to pray in church that morning and the pastor changed his entire message to pray for our country. Where was I when Charlie Kirk was assassinated? I was getting ready for Wednesday Night Church with all of our 5th-8th grade families. I preached that night about prayer and rewrote my message to remind everyone we should pray for justice and also that those who hate would repent and believe in Jesus and be saved. Admittedly, I don't think Charlie Kirk's assassination will change the world in the same way as 9/11 did, but I pray that it does help us to think about how we treat people we do not like: Jesus said, ""You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' <sup>44</sup> But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, <sup>45</sup> that you may be children of your Father in heaven." Matthew 5:43-45.

Taking Charlie Kirk's politics out of this discussion, we pray that our countries rhetoric would calm and people would be willing to hear each others points of view. For example, there is room to dialogue when it comes to economic, foreign, immigration, and even incarceration policies. Christians can take opposite points of view and still be Christians in these areas.

As Christians we do not debate our beliefs about one-man one-woman marriage, the sanctity of life from conception till God calls a person from this world, or even the concepts of gender beyond God's creation of male and female. However, the world does debate these concepts and it should not surprise us that we live in a culture similar to Bible times. In Rome it was common for an unwanted baby to be left out to die of exposure or a prominent politician to have a young boy as their homosexual partner. These were normal practices along with prostitution and pagan worship. We as a country used to be Christian in culture and so our response can be of anger and frustration. Yet, we dare not response with the sword or gun. Jesus said to Peter, "Put your sword back in its place," Jesus said to him, "for all who draw the sword will die by the sword." (Matthew 26:52) Remember, Jesus' solution for saving this sinful world was to die in their place.

Our first inclination is to solve such problems through government: However, we are starting to see neither political party is Christian. There are small elements of Christianity, but lessening year by year: This frustrates Christian democrats that do not understand how their party can embrace abortion and men playing in woman's sports based on a person's "feelings." This infuriates Republicans who watch their own party promote the mistreatment of foreigners and even ignore legitimate racism. Observationally, there are more Christians practicing on the right than the left, but this does not make the party itself Christian. Christians should vote and urge both parties in so far as they will listen to value life, to value marriage, etc. It is even more frustrating when we see anti-Christian philosophies being exposed like





Marxism that undermine belief in God and in authority. This is why St. Paul tells us to: "I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people— <sup>2</sup> for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness." 1 Tim. 2:1-2. So what do we do as Christians?

- . Try to live at peace with our neighbors and witness our faith.
- 2. Pray for institutions and governing bodies to allow free and peaceful sharing of ideas. For example as Christians we want to be able to share God's design for men and woman in a one man, one woman one flesh union called marriage. Likewise, we want to be able to share God's design for marriage to the best place for raising children that leads to less crime and better jobs over all. Our Christian faith when practiced is not just ideas, but we can show real statistics that are better the outcomes of Marxism, atheism, etc..
- 3. We can give a more guarded response on Social Media: In our fast paced, era of Tik-Tok, sound bites, and You-tube clips often only part of the story is told and as a result people are labeled as racist, homophobic, when in fact if they were at the event they would see the opposite is true. I've discovered you almost can't believe any political video on a first view. Before posting, make sure what you are willing to make the statement in front of thousands of people you do not know and likewise in front of your closest friends in person. Plus, you should research that the picture/video is legit and not a deepfake, and likewise the content is shown in context and not twisted to get a reaction. Wait a day before posting to make sure!

Where were you when Charlie Kirk was assassinated? Assassinations of people change things: If nothing else I pray that the world will see that Christians forgive even assassins. Why? Because Jesus died and rose for them. Jesus desires everyone to repent and come to the knowledge of the truth. 1 Timothy 2:4.


Traditionally celebrated the first Sunday in October, Lutheran Women in Mission Sunday can be celebrated any time.

# Pillars of the Faith

Because Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses, or thoughts, to a church door in Wittenberg, Germany, on October 31, 1517, many Christians remember that day and the major changes, or Reformation, that resulted.

Luther's theses contained three main pillars, which have stood for almost 500 years:

- 1. Sola Scriptura (Scripture Alone) The Bible is the sole authority in matters of faith, life and conduct. "All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16, NRSV).
- 2. Sola Fide (Faith Alone) Christians are justified, or declared righteous, only through believing in Jesus Christ as Savior. Although morality and good works are important, they alone cannot lead to salvation. "A person is justified not by the works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ" (Galatians 2:16, NRSV).
- 3. Sola Gratia (Grace Alone) Grace is God's unmerited, or undeserved, favor. Salvation is a free gift from our gracious God. "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God not the result of works, so that no one may boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9, NRSV).

**VERBUM DOMINI MANET IN AETERNUM** — Latin for "The Word of the Lord Endures Forever," this motto of the Lutheran branch of the Protestant Reformation comes from 1 Peter 1:25. Frederick the Wise, ruler of Saxony and one of Martin Luther's earliest and most influential supporters, had the VDMA symbol sewn into the right sleeve of the official garments worn at his court. The symbol also appeared on banners, flags, swords, and uniforms, representing the unity of the Lutheran laity in standing firm in their faith.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The Bible teaches that we should be of one mind in Christ Jesus (1 Peter 3:8). This does not mean we will always agree on everything. Some like the wall to be painted blue, others say institution white, but then again gray is the "in" color. We are free to have various opinions. But these opinions are but opinions, they do not change heaven what so ever. What does change heaven is sharing Jesus and His Word with unbelievers. Note, that the Reformation is about Christ alone, grace alone, faith alone, and scripture alone. These are uncompromisable principals. Convicting sinners with the seriousness of their sin followed by the undeserved love of his dying in our place taking our punishment does matter. This we agree!

St. Paul's has a history of having many opinions on matters. Please share them, but when it comes time to vote come together in unity and accept the final decision even if you do not agree. There was disagreement on the details of the remodeling of the office, and on the pew cushions. To be honest, when these matters are all settled and finished Jesus can be shared no matter what decision was made. In fact, it is my prayer the new office will indeed bring pastor, principal, and office staff together and that there is great unity in church and school. Likewise, I pray when all is said and done all of you will praise God together on cushions and wheel chairs have a place in the pews.

The bigger question is can we respect our leaders. You have wonderful leaders that are trying hard to be good stewards of the resources they have volunteered to do! Pray for them. Also, as they visit about how best to carry out the voters wishes and the question about how to shorten the pews, trust the process of your leaders. They are bringing up the petition about the pews, but understand no decision will please everyone, except that we will still love Jesus and each other afterwards!
